Undergraduate Admissions Information and Requirements

Undergraduate Freshman

If you are interested in taking classes through our traditional daytime program and are working towards or have already received your high school diploma or GED, you should apply to Jacksonville University as an incoming freshman. High school students who have earned dual enrollment credit and have not yet graduated from high school should apply as an incoming freshman. Applicants are evaluated on a rolling admission basis.

How to Apply

1. Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply or through the common application at apply.commonapp.org.
2. Request official high school transcripts or GED scores.
3. Request official SAT and/or ACT scores if you would like them to be considered for an admission decision. JU is a test optional school.
4. Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

- Be sure to include JU's school code (001495).

- Fill out the FAFSA as early as October 1st of your senior year.

- This form needs to be updated every year.

5. If you plan to major in one of our Fine Arts programs, you will be required to audition or submit a portfolio for admission consideration.

Admissions Standard for Freshman Applicants

We invite all students to apply to Jacksonville University.

The middle 50% range of entering freshman is:

- GPA: 3.45
- SAT (math and evidence-based reading and writing): 1030-1220
- ACT (composite): 23-25

Applicants are recommended to have successfully completed the following high school courses before they enroll at Jacksonville University:

- English: four years
- History and Social Science: three years
- Natural Science: three years
- Mathematics: three years
- Foreign Language: two years (or college level courses up to the 102 level, which can be taken at JU in the first year of enrollment; policy took effect Fall 2019)

4+1 Bachelors/Master of Business Administration (MBA)

This program is designed for highly-motivated high school students entering Jacksonville University with interest in **any** major who at least have a cumulative high school GPA of 3.30 and SAT Math and Evidence-Based Reading and Writing scores totaling at least 1170 (ACT 24). If qualified, students will be conditionally admitted to the FLEX (Full-time) MBA program when they apply as a high school senior. Students must maintain at least a 3.00 cumulative GPA in their undergraduate studies to maintain their acceptance in the FLEX MBA program.

Qualified students seeking the 4+1 Bachelors/MBA will be required to complete an online FLEX MBA application prior to November 1st of the student's senior year. The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT) or Graduate Record Examination (GRE) test requirement will be waived upon submission of a JU undergraduate GPA of 3.0 or higher. An application will not be recognized as complete until the Davis College of Business & Technology Graduate Admissions office has received the following:

- a resume
- a statement of purpose
- a transcript showing the final grades of the fall semester courses for that senior year

Any student not meeting the entering GPA and SAT requirements as a new freshman may still apply for the FLEX MBA program. They must maintain a GPA of at least 2.5 and obtain an acceptable Graduate GMAT or GRE test score. The GMAT or GRE score would need to be taken during the first term of the senior year.

Undergraduate Transfer

If you are interested in taking classes through our traditional daytime program and have previously registered at another regionally accredited college or university as a matriculated student, regardless of credit earned, you should apply to Jacksonville University as a transfer student. Applicants are evaluated on a rolling admission basis.

How to Apply

1. Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply.
2. Request official transcripts from each college or university you have attended. If you have fewer than 24 transferrable semester hours, the Office of Admissions will also require an official copy of your high school transcript or GED test scores.
3. Request official SAT and/or ACT scores if you would like them to be considered for an admission decision. JU is a test optional school.
4. Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
 - Be sure to include JU's school code (001495).
 - This form needs to be updated every year.
5. If you plan to major in one of our Fine Arts programs, you will be required to audition or submit a portfolio for admission consideration.
 - Please visit www.ju.edu/cfa/auditions-andportfolio-reviews for more information.

Transfer of Credits

- Academic courses completed at institutions which are approved by a regional accrediting agency are acceptable to transfer provided they are comparable to courses offered at JU and were completed with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better. Classes with a grade earned of "C-" with quality points of fewer than 2.0 are not accepted for transfer credit.
- Grades recorded as "P" for Pass, "CR" for Credit, etc., will be transferred only if the previous institution's registrar provides verification that the work was completed with a "C" (2.0) or better grade. A "P" grade will be accepted for transfer for Physical Education Activity classes.
- Students desiring transfer credit for courses completed at another institution may be required to provide a copy of the catalog from that institution so that an evaluation of transfer credit may be made.
- Transfer credit for nursing courses counted toward BSN major requirements must be approved by nursing faculty prior to acceptance into the program.
- Credit may be granted for Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Aviation certificates if the holder is enrolled in one of the aviation programs and takes at least two aviation flight courses at Jacksonville University.
- Occupational/vocational college-level courses are not generally accepted as transfer credit at Jacksonville University.
- Any work transferred to Jacksonville University will be entered on the JU transcript as hours earned only and will not be used in computation of the grade point average.
- A maximum of 60 semester hours or 95 quarter hours of transfer credit will be accepted from community college.
- The final 30 semester hours toward a bachelor's degree must be completed at Jacksonville University.
- Graduates of a regionally-accredited college or university who earned an Associate of Arts (AA) degree or Baccalaureate degree (in the case of a second-degree seeking student) should contact the JU Office of Admission for details about the transfer of college credit. In most cases, a regionally-accredited AA or Baccalaureate curriculum satisfies JU's general education, or Core Curriculum, requirements under the Articulation Agreement. However, students pursuing the Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Communications, English, or Film are required to satisfy the Global Studies requirement of the JU Core. Elementary education majors have additional core requirements; please see degree plan for course information.
- Graduates of a regionally-accredited college or university who earned an Associate of Science degree or an Associate of Applied Science, must have completed the courses below as part of their Associate degree, or must complete them at Jacksonville University upon acceptance and during their first year at JU to be covered by the Articulation Agreement:
 - English – College level English course, three credits
 - Social Science – College level Social Science courses, three credits
 - Science – College level Science courses, three credits
 - Mathematics – College level Mathematics course, three credits
 - One 3-credit hours course from Economics, Fine Arts, History, Humanities, International Studies, or Philosophy
 - Minimum grade of "C" is required for transfer

Notes:

- All nursing applicants must meet the 2.5 GPA nursing admission requirement to qualify for the Articulation Agreement, or may be eligible after their 2.5 GPA admission academic conditions are met, to qualify for the Articulation Agreement.
- If any of the courses under the Articulation Agreement are failed while completing at JU, the Articulation Agreement will not apply and the student must satisfy all of the JU Core Curriculum requirements.

- If any of the above criteria is not met in the Associate degree, the Articulation Agreement will not apply and the student must satisfy all of the JU Core Curriculum requirements.
- Concealment of previous course work completed at a college or university, whether intentional or not, is cause for cancellation of admission and registration.
- When an undergraduate student submits official transcripts, has been admitted, and paid the \$400 tuition deposit, the credits are evaluated for transferability to Jacksonville University. If admission applicants have a question concerning transfer credit, they should contact the Admission Office at (904) 256-7000.
- Limited or provisional credit also may be accepted from specialized or special purpose institutions, including the United States Armed Services, provided the work is applicable to JU undergraduate degree programs and is recommended in appropriate publications of the American Council on Education. For further information, see Credit for Military Service below in this section.

Undergraduate Non-Degree

If you are interested in taking courses for college credit, without seeking a degree from JU, you should apply to Jacksonville University as a non-degree seeking student. Applicants are evaluated on a rolling basis.

As a Non-Degree Seeking Student, you will only be able to attend Jacksonville University for one term (after one term, you may apply as a degree seeking candidate). You may take up to 12 credit hours for the one term.

How to Apply

1. Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply.
2. Request an official transcript from the most recent institution you have attended.
3. Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

- Be sure to include JU's school code (001495).

Undergraduate Non-Degree/Transient

If you are interested in taking courses for college credit, without seeking a degree from JU, and need to transfer credit back to your home school, you should apply to Jacksonville University as a non-degree/transient student. Applicants are evaluated on a rolling basis.

As a Non-Degree/Transient Student, you will only be able to attend Jacksonville University for one term (after one term, you may apply as a degree seeking candidate). You may take up to 12 credit hours for the one term.

How to Apply

1. Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply.
2. Request a transient form from your home school.

If you are a transient student, it is important to provide a transient form from the "home" college or university in which you are enrolled. The transient form from the "home" institution must provide in writing (from your Academic Dean or Advisor) that the "home" institution will accept the course from Jacksonville University as a substitute for the "home" institution course. The form must specifically indicate the Jacksonville University course number and title and indicate specifically the course number and title it will be substituted for at the "home" institution. You may take up to 12 credit hours for the one term.

Undergraduate International

International students must meet similar requirements as freshmen or transfer candidates, as the case warrants. The following information details the process and additional admission documents required for undergraduate international students. Language proficiency requirements for graduate international students are available under the academic programs in this catalog or may be obtained through the program administrators.

How to Apply

Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply.

Academic Records

Certified true copies of the original or official high school transcripts and diploma or leaving certificate are required. Only records that are equivalent to college or higher will need a NACES approved evaluation.

Demonstrated English Proficiency

Demonstrated English proficiency is required of all international students. Students whose first language is not English or who are from a country where the medium of instruction is NOT English may demonstrate proficiency by submitting official copy of score reports, certificates or transcripts of one of the following:

- The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) with a minimum score of either 550 on the paperbased exam or 79 on the Internet-based exam
- The International English Language Testing System (IELTS) with a minimum of a band 6.0
- Pearson Test of English Academic (PTE Academic) with a minimum score of 53

Exceptions to the English language proficiency testing requirements described above may be made on an individual basis. Students whose first language is not English may demonstrate proficiency by submitting original copies of score reports, certificates, and transcripts or through a combination of other assessments, including, but not limited to the following:

- high school transcripts showing completion of a minimum of two years at an institution where instruction is in English and demonstrating significant language achievement through rigorous coursework
- completion of at least 24 semester credits at an accredited college or university in the United States
- completion of English composition or an equivalent course, with a grade of "C" or higher, at an accredited college or university in the United States
- completion of the new College Board SAT Evidenced-Based reading and writing tests with acceptable minimum scores of 500
- completion of the ACT with reading and writing scores of 21 or higher
- transcripts showing the successful completion of an ESL (English as a Second Language) program at a regionally accredited college or university and the completion of a course in English Composition equivalent to ENGL 103 with a grade of C or higher

Note: International students who meet admission requirements with the exception of English language proficiency and need additional English language training prior to entering as a full-time degree seeking student may be considered for Jacksonville University's English Language Program (ELP). Admission to ELP does not guarantee admission to Jacksonville University degree programs. (See the JU ELP description (p. 70), program requirements, and outline at the end of this Undergraduate International section).

SAT or ACT Scores

International students are not required to submit SAT or ACT scores. However, students applying to the Honors Program or to the Freshman Direct Nursing Program will need to submit official SAT or ACT scores. Applicants intending to play intercollegiate sports at JU must submit SAT or ACT scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

Letter of Recommendation (optional)

One letter of recommendation may be submitted by the headmaster, principal, director, president, or dean of students at the previously attended institution, or by another educator able to evaluate the applicant's ability to succeed at Jacksonville University. All recommendations must be in English or be accompanied by an original, certified true English translation.

Transfer Verification Form

A photocopy of all pages of the student's I-20 or DS-2019, F-1 visa, I-94, and identification page from the passport are also required.

Financial Statement

International students at JU are required to show financial resources more than the minimum cost for tuition, living expenses, and insurance during an academic year (9 months).

Transfer of Credit from Foreign Institutions

To transfer credits from a foreign institution, applicants must submit an official NACES evaluation.

The outside agency of choice for evaluation of foreign credentials is World Education Services (WES). Applicants may, however, use the services of any member of the National Association for Credential Evaluation Services (NACES). The applicant is responsible for the cost and the timeliness of the credential evaluation. Applicants should note that all documents become the property of Jacksonville University and will not be returned to them.

International Transient Students

International transient students currently attending U.S. institutions need to submit the following materials:

- Apply online at www.ju.edu/apply.
- Submit a photocopy of all pages of the current Form I-20 or DS-2019, visa and I-94.
- Submit academic records - Certified true copies of the original or official transcripts, and diploma or leaving certificate (if available).
- Mail application documents to:

English Language Program (ELP)

(This program has been placed on teach out. No new applications are being accepted.)

The English Language Program (ELP) is open to international students who intend to enter U.S. programs. The English Language Program methods are based on current research in the fields of second language acquisition, language teaching, learning, and assessment. We offer English instruction that prepares international students for using English in an academic, social, and professional context with the understanding of the culture.

NOTE: The completion of the ELP does not guarantee acceptance to JU. It should not be confused with the English Language Proficiency policy for International Students' Acceptance.

Program Descriptions

(This program has been placed on teach out. No new applications are being accepted.)

- Full time English Language Program: Classes meet on campus and follow the Jacksonville University Calendar. International students may receive a form I20, to obtain a student visa to study in the program.

The JU ELP offers English classes that are designed according to the latest research in teaching English as a second language. Students will have the opportunity to:

- take English language proficiency placement testing and be placed at their own English language proficiency level classes.
- take classes in reading, writing, grammar, academic listening/speaking, and vocabulary provided in five different levels.
- start at their own level in each skill, whether beginning, intermediate, or advanced and progress to a higher level at the end of each session.
- learn from highly qualified, well prepared instructors.
- study in small classes, averaging less than 15-20 students.

Levels and Classes

The JU ELP is divided into five levels:

- Level I - Beginner (TOEFL Score Below 40)
- Level II - Advanced Beginner (TOEFL Score 41-50)
- Level III - Intermediate (TOEFL Score 51-60)
- Level IV - Advanced Intermediate (TOEFL Score 61- 69)
- Level V - Advanced (TOEFL Score 70 and above)

Class structures and schedules will be flexible to meet the needs of the learners and make the best use of resources.

Skills

Listening and Speaking: Students will develop proficiency in vocabulary, names and titles, contextualized speech, and use of idioms. More advanced levels will focus on specifics of listening for understanding and note-taking, oral presentation and more complex summary of content, ideas and discussion.

Reading: Students will be exposed to and gain proficiency in reading and understanding content-specific texts. The focus will be to increase students' reading strategies for comprehension and ability to analyze texts. Advanced skills will include enhancing reading speed and critical reading strategies.

Writing: Students will advance their ability to express their ideas in written form. Special attention will be paid to organization, summary, essay and the ability to appropriately use and cite sources of information.

Grammar: Students will develop proficiency with verb tenses, subject-verb agreement, possessives, prepositions, article and quantifier use, adjectives and adjectival clauses, direct and indirect objects, conditional, passive and adverbial clauses.

English Language Program Important Notes:

- Attendance requirement to maintain student visa status.
- Fulltime student status in the ELP requires an attendance rate of 80 percent or higher in all classes to remain in good standing for a student visa.
- Students must take 12 credit hours to keep fulltime student status. Generally this means that students will take four to six courses each term covering the language skills areas at their placement proficiency.
- A minimum of a "C" (2.0) average and/or performance on standardized assessment tool for all work taken in ELP to demonstrate proficiency levels.
- All ELP courses are created for ELP students, open classroom seats maybe offered to students outside the English Language Program, only with Director permission.
- All ELP course descriptions may be found in the Course Descriptions section at the back of this catalog.

Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences Admission

Undergraduate Admission to the Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences

In addition to the University undergraduate admissions requirements, the Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences' programs may have additional admissions requirements that students must meet for program consideration. Please refer to the specific program to determine what additional admissions requirements there may be once admitted to Jacksonville University

Keigwin School of Nursing Admission

Traditional, Accelerated BSN, And RN-BSN Program Admission

Admission to the Keigwin School of Nursing is a selective process. Students complete one application and submit all required materials to the Office of Admission.

The satisfaction of minimum requirements does not automatically guarantee admission to the Keigwin School of Nursing. Only a limited number of students may be admitted into the nursing major each year. Transfer credit for nursing courses counted toward the BSN will be evaluated on an individual basis and approved by the Associate Dean of the nursing program.

In order to be considered for admission to the Keigwin School of Nursing, the applicant must meet the following general requirements:

- Submit an online application for admission at www.ju.edu/admissions/apply-to-ju.php.
- Traditional students are required to have met all the JU Core Curriculum requirements, or an Associate of Arts degree from a regionally accredited institution, or other Associate degree that satisfies the Articulation Agreement (Refer to Undergraduate Transfer in the Office of Admissions section of this catalog for information on JU's transfer credit policies regarding Associate degrees).
- Accelerated BSN students are required to have a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution.
- Submit all supporting materials by the appropriate deadline; including transcripts and three (3) letters of recommendation.
- All prerequisite requirements must be completed prior to the start of Nursing courses. Two JU core courses can be remaining at the start of the Nursing curriculum but must be completed in the first summer semester.
- Credit received on the basis of CLEP or Advanced Placement may be included to meet some of the prerequisite requirements as appropriate under JU policies. Nursing prerequisite courses with less than a "C" grade may be repeated once, and no more than two courses may be repeated. Exceptions to this requirement may be requested by letter to the Undergraduate Nursing Committee.
- All students who submit International transcripts, or whose first language is not English must also take the TOEFL and score 540 on the paper-based exam, 207 on the computer-based exam, or 76 on the internet based exam.
- Have a minimum 2.5 cumulative undergraduate GPA.

The Keigwin School of Nursing will admit pre-licensure students in the fall, spring and summer semesters. RNBSN students are admitted on a rolling calendar basis. Specific application filing deadlines and fees will be established and advertised on the website. Students who are accepted to the Keigwin School of Nursing are required to respond in writing with confirmation of attendance. If written confirmation is not received another student will be admitted in their place. Applications are accepted after deadline dates on a space-available basis.

General Nursing Admissions Information

Alternative Credits

In order to meet prerequisite course requirements, students may use alternative credits such as CLEP, AP, IB or DSST. They must have been approved by Jacksonville University. A maximum of 30 credit hours may be awarded for alternative credits.

Credit for RN Licensure

Registered Nurses receive a maximum of 30 credits towards the RN-BSN degree for successful completion of the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses.

Freshman Admission to Nursing Program

A limited number of students will be admitted to the Nursing program as incoming freshmen. In addition to Jacksonville University's admission requirements, the criteria for freshman admission into the nursing program includes:

- high school GPA - 3.5
- high school Chemistry, Biology, and Algebra with a 'B' or equivalently weighted AP course grade
- SAT - 1170 or equivalent ACT - 24
- The priority deadline to apply and submit materials is January 1st.

Traditional BSN Program

In addition to the Keigwin School of Nursing admission requirements, additional requirements to this program include:

- Completion of all Jacksonville University undergraduate Core courses*, **OR** an Associate of Arts (AA) degree from a regionally accredited college or university, **OR** other Associate degree that satisfies JU's Articulation Agreement.

- Completion of BSN prerequisite courses**:
 - Human Anatomy and Physiology I
 - Human Anatomy and Physiology II
 - Chemistry (must include a lab)
 - Microbiology
 - Nutrition
 - Human Growth & Development
 - Elementary Statistics

*Students can begin NUR courses with up to two outstanding core courses with the requirement of completion of all core courses prior to the 2nd semester junior NUR courses.

Accelerated BSN Program

In addition to the Keigwin School of Nursing admission requirements, additional requirements to this program include:

- The 12 month options require a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution. 16 month option requires an associate degree or a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution.
- Completion of BSN prerequisite courses*:
 - Human Anatomy and Physiology I
 - Human Anatomy and Physiology II
 - Chemistry (must include a lab)
 - Microbiology
 - Nutrition
 - Human Growth & Development
 - Elementary Statistics

Foreign Physician students may challenge certain courses by examination.

RN-BSN Ground Based and Online Programs

In addition to the general admission requirements listed above, admission requirements to this program also include:

- Graduation from a nationally approved Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) or diploma nursing program.
- RN-BSN students must have a Registered Nurse license from the United States; licensure in the state of Florida is not required.
- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.
- RN-BSN applicants with a minimum cumulative GPA less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale may be admitted under academic observation if they meet other general admission requirements. When a student under academic observation does not successfully complete the first four Jacksonville University courses (excluding NUR elective) with a GPA greater than or equal to 2.5, they may be dismissed from the program.
- Students with an Associates of Arts (AA) degree from a regionally accredited college or university, or other Associate degrees that satisfy JU's Articulation Agreement, may matriculate into the nursing program, waiving the university core requirements. In addition to all nursing courses, students must also complete with a grade of "C" (2.0) or higher:
 - Chemistry with lab (four credit hours)
 - Human anatomy and physiology (six to eight credit hours)
 - Microbiology (four credit hours)
 - Nutrition (three credit hours)
 - Statistics (three credit hours)
 - Growth and development across the lifespan (three credit hours)
- All students who submit International transcripts, or whose first language is not English must also take the TOEFL and score 540 on the paper-based exam, 207 on the computer-based exam, or 76 on the internetbased exam.

- Students with more than one BSN level course failure in another BSN program are not eligible for admission.

International Student Applicants for RN-BSN Program and Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Nursing Informatics

- International student applicants for specifically designated cohorts of the RN-BSN program and postbaccalaureate certificate in Nursing must have an active unencumbered U.S. RN license and meet all other admission criteria.

Readmission Application for Returning JU Students

Information for students applying for readmission to the University:

- A former JU student who was not enrolled at the University for 1 academic year (fall, spring, and summer) must apply for readmission. Applications for readmission must be submitted as early as possible to the Office of the Registrar.
- A student who has not completed classes in a year will be moved to the current catalog and must complete the JU Core Curriculum and Major requirements of the new catalog.
- If an undergraduate student was enrolled at another institution during the period since last enrolled at JU, an official transcript of all courses attempted must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar. Students will be allowed to register for one semester to submit their transcript. During the semester, a Registrar Hold will be placed on the student's record that will prevent future registration and release of the JU transcript. The Hold will be removed upon receipt of the official transcript from the institution.
- A student who terminates enrollment at JU while in a probationary or suspended status and who subsequently completes course work at another institution prior to being readmitted does so at the student's own risk. Such course work will be used to determine whether or not to readmit the student. If the decision is made to readmit the student, appropriate transfer credits will be awarded at the time of readmission. In the case of a suspended student, transfer credit will not be awarded for course work completed during the period of suspension from Jacksonville University.

Scholarships

Undergraduate freshman, transfer, and international applicants are automatically screened for an academic scholarship once they have been admitted.

JU Academic Scholarship

Students are automatically screened for an academic scholarship once they have been admitted to JU. The academic scholarship ranges between \$10,000 and \$25,000 per year for traditional undergraduate students and is based on a holistic matrix of the student's cumulative GPA and test scores, if submitted, coupled with class ranking and high school ranking.

JU Talent Scholarship

The talent scholarship is for students who are interested in majoring in one of our Fine Arts programs. An audition or portfolio review is required for program consideration. If you are admitted into the program, you may be awarded a talent scholarship in addition to your academic scholarship. To find out more about audition dates, please visit www.ju.edu/cfa/auditions-and-portfolio-reviews.

JU Honors Scholarship

If you have been admitted to JU and are eligible to apply to the Honors Program, the Office of Admission will e-mail an Honor's application to you, inviting you to compete for this prestigious scholarship. The application is also available at www.ju.edu/honors. Students must have a minimum 3.8 weighted GPA and either a 1290 SAT (math and evidenced-based reading and writing) or a 27 ACT (composite score).

Students who are chosen to be part of the Honors Program will earn an additional \$2,500 merit scholarship.

JU Alumni Scholarship

Admitted students who have immediate family (parents, grandparents and siblings) who graduated from Jacksonville University will be screened for the \$1,000 JU Alumni Scholarship. To be considered for this scholarship, please be sure to fill out the alumni section of the undergraduate application with all required fields.

Next Steps for Admitted Undergraduate Students

Deposit

Pay the \$400 tuition deposit. (Deposit does not apply to Accelerated Degree Students)

In order to move forward with the registration process (registering for classes and housing) you must pay the \$400 tuition deposit at www.apply.ju.edu/apply/status. If you will be using military benefits, your deposit may be waived. Please contact the veteran's department for more information.

JU adheres to the National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) enrollment deposit deadline of May 1st. Priority is given to students who submit their enrollment deposit by May 1st. Admitted students should pay their enrollment deposit by May 1st for the fall semester.

Deposits received prior to May 1st for the fall semester are fully refundable if the University is notified in writing prior to May 1st that the applicant is canceling his or her enrollment. Deposits made after May 1st for the fall semester are nonrefundable. Enrollment deposits for the spring semester and/or summer semester are nonrefundable.

Jacksonville University has a residency requirement for undergraduate students. For the first three years of college, students must live on campus. Students who live in Duval County are exempt from this requirement, but must complete an exemption form. Other exemptions may apply. Final Transcripts

Jacksonville University requires official, final transcripts from each institution you have attended. Your enrollment is not complete until all official, final transcripts and test scores are on file. Please be sure to submit AP, IB, AICE, or CLEP exams as well as military transcripts, if you would like an evaluation of those credits.

Please note: if you have earned college credit from a regionally accredited institution, or if you have received alternative credit, an official transfer equivalency report (TER) will be completed for you after your tuition deposit has been received.

Payment Policies

Payment Of Student Accounts

Registration is scheduled prior to the beginning of each term on dates specified in the academic calendar. Refer to the Academic Calendar on the University website at www.ju.edu/registrar/current-academic-calendar. At the time of registration, each student must pay in full the total charges for the semester or session, less approved financial aid. Charges include tuition, room, board, student health insurance, travel fees for study abroad, and flight fees (if applicable).

Early registration is a privilege in which each currently enrolled student may participate if his or her current semester account is paid in full or any un-posted financial aid for the current semester has been approved and all documents have been completed. The early registration periods are listed in the Academic Calendar on the web.

Past due balances should be paid in full in order to participate in early registration beginning in October for the Spring term, and beginning March for the Fall term. Detailed Student Account Statements may be accessed via the JU Student Portal via WebAdvisor or Parent Access to the Web at any time. *Students and parents are encouraged to check their student account statement online regularly. Charges resulting from (but not limited to) fines and penalties, registration activity, prorated room and board, or updated financial aid awards can generate at any time throughout the semester.*

Jacksonville University has the right and may employ any or all of the following actions in order to collect unpaid student account balances: using written, electronic, or verbal means of contact as the law allows, including, but not limited to, contact by manual calling methods, prerecorded or artificial voice messages, emails, and/or automated telephone dialing systems, contact by telephone at any telephone number associated with the account, currently or in the future, including wireless telephone numbers, and authorization to record telephone calls regarding the account in assurance of quality and/or other reasons. Failure to pay a student account by the published deadline(s) may result in the account being placed with a collection agency and/or for legal action. If such action(s) is/are taken, students will be required to pay all collection fees (up to 33%) & costs, attorney fees & costs, and/or any other fees/costs incurred as the result of the collection of any amount not paid.

Traditional Term Payment Deadlines

- Fall charges – August 1st
- Spring charges – December 1st
- Summer charges - May 1st

Checks or money orders should be made payable to Jacksonville University and, if mailed, addressed to Jacksonville University, Attn: Bursar's Office, 2800 University Boulevard North, Jacksonville, Florida 32211- 3395. A service charge between the minimum of \$25 and up to five percent of the face value of the check will be assessed by the University to the student's account for any check returned by the bank, including those "drawn on uncollected deposits." Checks returned for insufficient funds must be redeemed with cash or a cashier's check promptly in order to avoid legal action or administrative dismissal of the student from the University. The University reserves the right to require payment by means other than check if an item is returned for any reason.

Visa, American Express, MasterCard and Discover are accepted. Electronic Payment (credit cards and ACH bank drafts) can be made online via WebAdvisor or Parent Access to the Web.

Tuition Payment Plans

JU Tuition payment plans (available to ALL students) are term specific. Prior to applying, a student must be fully registered for classes in the coming term. They must also have completed their housing and meal plan contract with the Residential Life Office, if applicable. A new application is required each term and a participation fee of \$50 will be assessed for each new plan. Applications for future term payment plans will be available at the appropriate times. Tuition Payment Plans cannot be used for past due balances.

The amount to finance will be determined by the total amount of tuition, room (if applicable), board (if applicable), and student health insurance (if applicable) less Financial Aid (scholarships, grants, and/or loans), PrePaid or 529 plans, sponsorships, etc. Financial Aid and other resources must be in a status that is considered a pending resource; these are indicated on your Financial Aid Award Letter or on your Student Account Statement as an anticipated or disbursed credit. In order for your monthly payment to calculate correctly, all financial aid documents, certifications, verifications, loan entrances and promissory notes must be completed.

If you are participating in a study abroad, please be advised that travel expenses cannot be financed through a tuition payment plan. Payment in full is required. This includes but is not limited to, the payment or financing of your total tuition, room board, and student health insurance (if applicable), as well as payment in full for your travel expenses directly to JU to bring your term balance to \$0.00.

If you are an Aviation Management and Flight Operations (AVO) Major, please be advised that flight fees cannot be financed through a tuition payment plan. Payment in full for your flight course is required to authorize a "clearance to fly." A "clearance to fly" includes, but is not limited to, the payment or financing of your total tuition, room board, and student health insurance (if applicable), as well as payment in full for your flight course directly to JU to bring your term balance to \$0.00.

Payment is due by the 15th of every month. Plans are available for Fall and Spring terms only. Monthly Tuition Payment Plans for the Fall term will be divided over a six month period with due dates of May 15th, June 15th, July 15th, August 15th, September 15th, and October 15th. A \$50 non-refundable fee is charged upfront to participate and may be included in your first monthly payment. Likewise, monthly Tuition Payment Plans for the Spring term will be divided over a six month period. Payment due dates are November 15th, December 15th, January 15th, February 15th, March 15th, and April 15th. Again a \$50 fee is charged upfront to participate. Note that the length of your repayment term will depend on when you apply for a payment plan. Your first payment will be the next day 15 available. For instance, if you submit your application on June 25th for a Fall payment plan, the next available payment date will be July 15th; therefore, your balance will be divided into four monthly payments (July through October), rather than six.

Payments are subject to change based on registration activity, room and board adjustments, OR any changes to your financial aid package. Monthly statements will be mailed to the student's permanent address on record unless otherwise specified on the application. Account Status is also available on the web via WebAdvisor. Don't forget our WebAdvisor for Parents feature which allows students to create accounts for parents and/or guardians. This will allow them to see grades, make payments, view schedules and more. Payments may be mailed, made at the Cashier's Window, or processed online. Please specify when making a payment online that your payment is for your tuition payment plan. Delinquent payments will result in the cancellation of the payment plan and the accrual of finance charges based on the past due balance at the time of cancellation.

Reapplying for Financial Aid

Students receiving financial aid must reapply every year. In order to be able to deduct anticipated aid from semester charges, it is necessary to apply early and return all requested paperwork promptly.

Applicants for any type of student financial assistance should file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) no later than April 15th for the following Fall semester (visit www.fafsa.ed.gov for further information). The Office of Student Financial Assistance processes applications on a first-come, first-served basis. Awards to new incoming students are sent out beginning in February and March; awards to continuing students are sent out beginning in February and subject to revision following the posting of Spring semester grades.

Although the Office of Student Financial Assistance accepts and processes new applications on a rolling basis throughout the academic year, it cannot guarantee that processing will be complete for paperwork that is received after August 1st for the Fall semester and December 1st for the Spring semester. If the Office of Student Financial Assistance is unable to confirm a student's aid eligibility prior to the payment due date(s), the student will be responsible for payment in full on or before the payment due date(s) and will be reimbursed once the aid is processed.

Campus Debit Card

A student's Jacksonville University identification card also serves as the JU Dolphin 1Card - a "debit card" to use for purchases on-campus, as well as at various participating vendors off-campus. The card may be used at the campus bookstore, campus laundry facilities, copy and vending machines, etc. For students enrolled in one of the University's meal plans, the card is swiped for each meal or meal equivalent and the card system automatically tracks remaining meals available according to the plan.

Students may also use money deposited on their Dolphin 1Card ("Dolphin Dollars") to purchase food at the various eateries on-campus. Any cash balance remaining on the card will roll over to the next semester; however, the balance of a meal plan will not carry over. Please visit www.judolphin1card.com for further information and to register your account.

Refund Information

Fees, other than tuition, board, and campus residential charges, are not refundable, except by withdrawal during the 100 percent refund period or in cases of cancellation by the University of student registration or courses. No tuition refund will be made in cases of suspension or dismissal. A student is officially withdrawn only after his/her withdrawal is acted upon by the Registrar.

University and Course Withdrawals

Upon withdrawal from the University, any refunds due will be released only upon surrender of the Student Identification Card. A written request must be submitted to the Bursar's Office before a refund check will be processed.

When a student officially withdraws or reduces his or her class load, credit for tuition charges will be made based on the following percentage schedules:

- **Fall and Spring Traditional Semesters**
 - First week of classes - 100%
 - Second week of classes - 75%
 - Third week of classes - 50%
 - Fourth week of classes - 25%
 - After fourth week of classes - None
- **Summer Traditional Terms**
 - First week of classes - 100%
 - After first week of classes - None
- **Eight-Week Accelerated Terms - On Campus**
 - First two weeks of classes - 100%
 - After second week of classes - None
- **Eight-Week Accelerated Terms - Online**
 - First week of class - 100%
 - Starting second week of classes - None
 - Refunds of credit balances from financial aid will be available after aid is posted to the tuition account. Financial aid begins to be posted at the end of the drop/add period.

First-time students attending JU and continuing students who completely withdraw from the University and received Title IV aid (i.e., Pell Grant, SEOG, College Work Study, Perkins Loan, Stafford Loan or whose parents borrow on the PLUS Loan program) will have refunds calculated according to Federal law. Students withdrawing under these provisions should refer to the Title IV refund policies.

Approval, Withdrawal and Refund Policy

Students Called to Active Duty or Deployment

When students are called up for active service or deployment during the term and cannot continue attending class(es), they will be offered the opportunity to withdraw from their class(es), regardless if the withdrawal date has passed. Tuition paid using Tuition Assistance (TA) will be refunded/billed as per the printed refund schedule. Tuition paid by the student will be refunded at 100%. Such students will be required to submit a copy of their orders or a letter from their Commander or the Base Educational Officer informing the school of the call to active service or deployment that will prevent them from attending class.

Tuition Appeals Committee

If a student feels he or she has an extenuating circumstance which justifies an exception to the refund policy, he or she may appeal to the Tuition Appeals Committee. Appeals can be submitted to to bursar@ju.edu.

Campus Residence Charges

When a student officially withdraws from the University, credit for residential and board plan charges will be made based on the following percentage schedules. No refund will be made in cases of suspension or dismissal.

- **Fall and Spring Semesters**
 - First week of classes - 80%
 - Second week of classes - 60%

- Third week of classes - 40%
- Fourth week of classes - 20%
- After fourth week of classes - None
- **Summer Terms**
- First week of classes - 80%
- After first week of classes - None

Flight Fees

JU's contractual agreement with L3 Airline Academy does not contain a 100 percent refund policy on flight fees. The L3 Airline Academy agreement requires the University to pay in advance all flight fees. Therefore, students registering for courses involving flight training must pay all flight fees at the time of registration. If a student drops the flight course during the drop/add period, the student is still liable for the flight fees that are not refunded by L3 Airline Academy. Flight course fees are subject to change without notice due to changing FAA requirements and price changes by L3 Airline Academy.

Master of Arts and Master of Science in Marine Science (M.A./M.S.) Admission

Admissions requirements include:

- A \$50 non-refundable application fee.
- A bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution.
- A completed graduate admission application form.
- An overall undergraduate GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale
- Three letters of recommendation.
- Submission of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) score report.
- Submission of a two page Statement of Research and Professional Goals.
- Applications should be submitted by February 1st. Applications completed after that date will be considered on a space available basis.

In addition to all program admission requirements listed above, all international student applicants must meet the JU Admissions requirements as outlined under **International Students**.

Admission to the MA/MS in Marine Science program is selective and limited to those students who demonstrate potential for successfully completing the program. The decision is based on evaluation of the student's undergraduate program and grades earned, work experience (if applicable), letters of recommendation, statement of research and professional goals, and the personal interview.

An undergraduate degree in Marine Science is not necessary for admission to the MA/MS in the Marine Science Program, however, all applicants must be accepted by the Graduate Review Committee (GRC) to either the MS/MA in the MSC Program and must demonstrate adequate potential to successfully complete graduate level courses in the field of marine science. Students whose undergraduate specialization is not in Marine Science may be required to take additional undergraduate courses in order to qualify for advanced study. Each student will either have a thesis committee (MS) or an academic advisor (MA). The advisor/committee will assist the student in developing an academic plan and must approve all work done in pursuit of the degree.

Students not meeting entrance requirements outlined above may be admitted as non-degree seeking and be allowed to six semester hours of graduate level MSC course work at JU. Students must receive permission from the instructor before taking additional 500-level MSC courses at JU until they meet all admission requirements.

- All applications and official transcripts of undergraduate as well as graduate work must be on file in the Office of Graduate Admission prior to initial registration.
- Any exceptions to the preceding requirements must be approved by the Director of Marine Science Graduate Studies.

Master of Science in Clinical Mental Health Counseling Admission

The MS-CMHC degree is a full-time cohort program with a specialization in clinical mental health counseling and an emphasis in marriage and family therapy. The program uses a hybrid curriculum with didactics online (50%) and experiential face-to-face (50%). Students are admitted to the program annually in the fall semester only. It is anticipated that the cohort will consist of up to 24 students. The admissions timeline is distinct and will allow for competitive admission.

Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) Admission

The entry-level Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) degree is an applicant program seeking candidacy status for accreditation by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE)*. The program is 36 months (105 graduate credit hours) of professional coursework and fieldwork presented in a full-time day format, starting in May each year.

Admission to Candidacy - A student may be admitted to candidacy for the degree only if all admissions materials have been filed with the Office of Admission. All application materials must be submitted by March 31st for the summer semester beginning in June of the same year.

General Admission Information

Orientation

Orientation is a required program for new Freshmen students. JU may offer alternative orientation sessions for military, transfer, and graduate students. Orientation involves planned interactive sessions integrating new students into the Jacksonville University community. Orientation provides students the opportunity to acquaint themselves with the JU campus and to get to know some of its students, faculty, and staff. New students participate in a series of workshops led by upperclassmen, faculty, and professional staff that introduces them to the JU curricular and co-curricular programs.

Medical Information and Immunization

The University assumes no responsibility for student illnesses or accidents occurring either on campus or off campus; therefore, the University strongly encourages students to obtain and maintain health, major medical, and accident insurance coverage through either a personal or family policy. Please note that in certain instances, HMO coverage may not be sufficient or accepted by local health and medical providers. For students who do not qualify for coverage under a private policy, JU offers coverage through a school-sponsored plan.

JU requires that full-time traditional undergraduate students who do not have hospital/medical insurance coverage participate in this plan. International students are also required to participate in the plan. Those attending JU for the first time must pay the first year premium in advance with their tuition and fees.

Twelve-month coverage extends from the reporting date August 1st to July 31st. Insurance coverage will be billed on a yearly basis through graduation. Any student who maintains private coverage is required to complete a waiver online.

Jacksonville University requires that all new, accepted traditional undergraduate students complete and return the University's Medical and Immunization Form to the Office of Admission as part of the application process. The immunization portion of the form, if applicable, must be completed and signed by a licensed physician or an appropriate health care provider. Documentation is required to certify that a student's immunizations include measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis B, tuberculosis, tetanus, and diphtheria. Students living on campus are required to show documentation of a meningitis vaccination or sign a waiver declining the vaccination. Students born before 1957 are considered immune to measles. If these forms are not submitted, a registration hold will be placed to prevent registration for the student's second term at Jacksonville University.

Disability Related Information

Jacksonville University provides reasonable accommodations to students with disabilities who need such assistance under the Americans with Disabilities Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

Disability categories can include, but are not limited to, visual, physical, hearing, speech impairments, learning disabilities, and other impairments such as cardiovascular and circulatory conditions, psychological disorders, blood serum illnesses, diabetes, and epilepsy.

A student with a visible or non-visible disability who requests "reasonable accommodation" to his or her condition should provide medical and/or psychological documentation of the disability to the Student Life Office. It is preferable and recommended that documentation be provided immediately after acceptance to the University. Notice of a disability, but not the medical documentation, may be provided by the Student Life Office to any administrator, dean, and/or professor on a need-to-know basis, but only after consultation with the student.

Specialized services are provided through the Student Life Office. Students must request "reasonable accommodations" in a timely manner so that faculty can plan for those accommodations. Students with disabilities are also responsible for maintaining the same academic levels as other students attending class, maintaining appropriate behavior, and providing timely notification of any special needs.

Services provided may include special arrangements when needed (change of rooms, referrals to tutors), letters of classroom accommodation based on medical recommendations and student suggestions and experience, and individual counseling or referral for counseling. Recommendations for "reasonable accommodations" in the classroom may include priority seating, change of classroom, tape recording of lectures, extra time for tests, quizzes, assignments, alternative test formats, etc.

Alternative Credit

Recognizing the rigor of Advanced Placement (AP), College Level Examination Program (CLEP), International Baccalaureate (IB), Defense Activity for Nontraditional Education Support (DANTES), University of Cambridge's Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE), portfolio credit, and military credit programs, Jacksonville University awards up to 30 credits for successful work in these programs. Minimum scores are listed under each program and information on specific classes accepted for credit is available from the Admission or Academic Advising offices and on the JU Website on the Registrar's Office Web page. All alternative credit must be posted to the transcript prior to completion of 90 credits.

- **Advanced Placement Program (AP)** - Credit may be awarded for scores of 3, 4, or 5, depending on the subject. Each academic department sets individual policies on which scores may be awarded credit, and how that credit will be awarded. In addition, students will receive credit applicable toward graduation with University Honors if, on applicable Advanced Placement examinations, they score one point higher than the minimum required for credit.
- **College Level Examination Program (CLEP)** - Credit may be awarded for scores of 50 or greater on each subject test and a score of 500 or greater in the general tests. Credits awarded for the CLEP general test will be counted as 100 and 200 level courses. The general examination may not be counted as 300 or 400 level courses. A student may receive credit only once for one course, either by completing the course or by completing the examination. A student may take a course or examination more than once to improve a grade average. In counting credits toward graduation, a course may be counted only once for credit.
- **International Baccalaureate Program (IB)** - Credit may be awarded for scores of 4, 5, 6, or 7 on the Higher Level Examinations only. In addition, students will receive credit applicable toward graduation with University Honors if, on an International Baccalaureate examination, they score one point higher than the minimum required for credit.
- **Dantes Subject Standardized Tests (DSST)** - Credit may be awarded for scores of 50 or greater on each subject test. In addition, students will receive credit applicable toward graduation with University Honors for grades of 'A'.
- **University of Cambridge's Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE)** - Jacksonville University will award credit for AICE. Grades of A - E may be accepted for credit.
- **National Examination in World Languages (NEWL)** - World language credit will be awarded for scores of 3, 4, or 5 in Arabic, Korean, Portuguese, and Russian.
- **Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Examination (CAPE)** - Credit may be awarded for scores of I through V. Each academic department sets individual policies on which scores may be awarded credit, and how that credit will be awarded. In addition, students will receive credit applicable toward graduation with University Honors if, on applicable Advanced Placement examinations, they score one point higher than the minimum required for credit.

Disclosures

Professional Licensure Disclosure

Jacksonville University participates in the **National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA)**, which allows us to offer online programs to students in member states. However, completion of an academic program offered by Jacksonville University does **not guarantee** eligibility for professional licensure or certification in any state.

Professional licensure requirements vary by state and profession, and they may change over time. If you are considering an academic program that leads to professional licensure (such as nursing, counseling, education, or other regulated fields), it is your responsibility to:

- Review the specific licensure requirements for the state in which you intend to seek licensure.
- Confirm with the appropriate licensing board or agency that the program meets the requirements for licensure or certification in that state.
- Contact your program director or advisor at Jacksonville University for guidance and resources related to licensure pathways.

Nursing Licensure Disclosure

Jacksonville University's Keigwin School of Nursing offers programs designed to prepare graduates to pursue professional nursing licensure. However, professional licensure requirements for nurses vary by state and are determined by each state's Board of Nursing.

- Jacksonville University is **approved by the Florida Board of Nursing**, and our programs meet the educational requirements for licensure in the State of Florida.
- For states outside of Florida, Jacksonville University **cannot guarantee** that its nursing programs meet all educational requirements for licensure.
- Students who plan to seek licensure in a state other than Florida are responsible for reviewing that state's licensure requirements and confirming eligibility directly with the applicable Board of Nursing.

Student Responsibility

Before enrolling in a nursing program at Jacksonville University, students who reside outside of Florida or intend to practice in another state should:

- Review that state's licensure requirements through the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) website.
- Contact the Board of Nursing in their state of residence or intended practice to verify whether Jacksonville University's program meets licensure requirements.
- Reach out to the Keigwin School of Nursing for assistance in understanding licensure pathways.

Important Note

- Completion of a Jacksonville University nursing program does not by itself guarantee eligibility for licensure or certification in any state.
- Some states may require additional clinical hours, coursework, or testing.
- Licensure requirements are subject to change at the discretion of state boards. Students should regularly confirm requirements with the appropriate licensing agency.

University Profile

Jacksonville University is a distinctive institution built on engaged learning, the integration of thinking with doing, and the combination of professional preparation with a strong liberal arts foundation. As an intimate, comprehensive, independent university community, JU provides personalized service, close student-faculty interaction, and an extensive array of educational and co-curricular programs, including select graduate programs designed to build on the campus' unique location and strengths. We help students realize their full potential and prepare them for lifelong learning and growth through our investment in them as individuals.

As a private and independent institution, the University offers a balanced approach to coeducational higher education, combining the best attributes of the liberal arts and sciences tradition and professional studies. As a result, students are equipped to succeed in meaningful careers, advance their studies at the graduate level, and function as well-educated and engaged global citizens. This balanced educational approach allows students to respond confidently to evolving personal and professional opportunities. Jacksonville University offers a rigorous curriculum that addresses the diverse interests, curiosities, educational, and intellectual needs of the total person. While its Core Curriculum exposes students to the broad spectrum of human thought and accomplishment, each major offers specialization for specific career or life pursuits.

As a community that prizes personal interaction among faculty, staff, and students, Jacksonville University recognizes the importance each individual brings to campus. Domestic and international students are admitted with the expectation that they will successfully complete meaningful academic work; faculty offer exceptional instruction while undertaking impactful research and discovery; and staff enhance the learning environment and overall community by supporting the institutional mission and our students. Our institution operates through shared governance and works to ensure the academic freedom of all community members.

Located on the banks of the St. Johns River in the historic Arlington neighborhood, Jacksonville University is located in a vibrant, urban setting, rich with opportunities for students to engage in applied learning while also providing community-oriented service. Located in a diverse area with students from across the globe, the JU residential community aims to prepare students for leadership roles in an increasingly complex and interconnected world.

Jacksonville University is a community in which students, faculty, and staff will be individually recognized and prepared for lifelong success—where knowledge, experience, and compassion come together to benefit all.

The Stein College of Arts and Sciences, the Davis College of Business & Technology, the Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences, the College of Law, the Marine Science Research Institute, and the Public Policy Institute conduct JU's traditional undergraduate and graduate academic programs. Offering more than 50 undergraduate majors, the University confers the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Music Education. Pre-professional studies are available for students interested in dentistry, law, medicine, pharmacy, and veterinary medicine. The Aviation Program is offered in cooperation with Acron.

Graduate programs in Business, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Exercise Science, Health Informatics, Implant Dentistry, Law, Marine Science, Medical Sciences, Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Orthodontics, Speech Language Pathology, and Visual Arts infuse the community with highly skilled professionals who are instrumental in strengthening the local economy, improving the quality of elementary and secondary education, and meeting the health care requirements of our citizens.

The Stein College of Arts and Sciences offers the Master of Arts/Master of Science degree in Marine Science. Students may pursue a 5-year combined Bachelor of Science/Master of Arts degree in Marine Science. The College also offers the MFA in Visual Arts.

The Davis College of Business & Technology has a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A) offered in both traditional and executive programs. The Davis College of Business & Technology also offers a Master of Science in Organization Leadership, a Master of Science in Applied Business Analytics, and a Doctor of Business Administration degree program. A 4+1 undergraduate degree/Master of Business Administration degree is offered through the Davis College of Business & Technology. Also, dual Masters degrees are offered in cooperation with the Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences, and the Public Policy Institute. Through the School of Aviation, a Master of Science in Aviation Leadership is available online.

The Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences offers a Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.) with cognates in Clinical Nurse Educator, Health Quality and Safety, Nursing Informatics, Leadership in Healthcare Systems, Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner, Family Nurse Practitioner, Psychiatric Mental-Health Nurse Practitioner, and a dual degree program with the Davis College of Business & Technology: Master of Science in Nursing & Business Administration, as well as Master of Science degrees in Speech-Language Pathology, Health Informatics, Medical Sciences, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, and Respiratory Care. The college also offers the Doctor of Nursing Practice degree in both a post MSN to DNP program and a BSN to DNP program, and a new Doctor of Occupational Therapy, which started in the Summer of 2018. The School of Orthodontics offers a combined Orthodontics Certificate and Master of Science in Dentistry, a combined Comprehensive Oral Implantology Certificate and Master of Science in Dentistry, and a Fellowship in Clinical Orthodontic Research.

The Public Policy Institute offers a unique interdisciplinary Master in Public Policy degree. Additionally, the Institute offers the following dual degrees: a Master of Public Policy/Master of Business Administration (MPP/MBA) degree in cooperation with the Davis College of Business & Technology; and a Master in Public Policy/Master of Arts in Marine Science (MPP/MA) or Master of Science in Marine Science (MPP/MS) degree in cooperation with the Marine Science Research Institute.

The strength of our programs is a function of the University's nationally recognized faculty, some of whom are honored by such organizations as the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, the Pew National Fellowship Program, the Fulbright Scholarship Program, and the American Council on Education. Each of Jacksonville University's full-time professors is committed to classroom teaching.

A low student-to-faculty ratio assures students of individual attention and meaningful interaction with professors and classmates. JU's average class size is 16. Although JU faculty place high priority on teaching, they also pursue research and writing projects, not as ends in themselves, but as means to maintain and enhance the quality of instruction. This concern for students is an incalculable advantage to those who seek an academic environment that is both stimulating and supportive.

Jacksonville University embraces diversity, including geographical and cultural diversity. Half of our students hail from out-of-state, mostly from the east coast. Our current population represents 49 states and territories, including Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and 46 foreign countries. In the traditional undergraduate program, women comprise 61% of JU's student body; men, 39%. Approximately 93% of JU's traditional undergraduate student body attends full-time and the majority of our students live on campus.

Jacksonville University maintains a legacy of service to the community. It has been an ardent supporter and provider of cultural and educational programs that enhance the quality of life for Florida's First Coast.

History

Jacksonville University's modest beginnings in 1934 included "an opportunity for citizens of Jacksonville and vicinity to obtain a standard collegiate education without leaving the city" and "to fill the need for a center of culture for Jacksonville." The William J. Porter University opened its doors as a two-year community college. Within a year, the institution was renamed Jacksonville Junior College to identify more accurately with its city and programs.

The College's first ten years were a struggle for survival, but by 1944, the first full-time president and faculty had moved into the Kay Mansion in Jacksonville's fashionable Riverside area. With returning World War II veterans swelling the student ranks and projected enrollments increasing, plans for another move were soon underway.

In 1947, the Board of Trustees commissioned a master plan for development of a new campus in suburban Arlington. In 1950, the College relocated to its present site in its first permanent structure, the Founders Building. With the decision to expand into a four-year program in 1956, Jacksonville Junior College became Jacksonville University. Shortly thereafter, the Jacksonville College of Music merged with the University. In 1961, JU was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and the College of Music was renamed the College of Fine Arts due to the addition of programs in drama, art, and fine arts.

In May 1967, the College of Arts and Sciences was established by combining the academic divisions of business administration, education, humanities, science and mathematics, and social sciences. The Davis College of Business opened in 1979. Graduate studies leading to the Master of Business Administration degree began the following year and the Doctor of Business Administration degree started in the fall 2014. The Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences is home to the Nursing program (BSN, MSN, DNP degrees and post graduate APRN certificate programs) as well programs and degrees in the areas of Kinesiology, Communication Sciences Disorders, Health Informatics, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Occupational Therapy, and Sport Management.

In 1983, JU established its Division of Aeronautics, now the School of Aviation. The division now offers careers in aviation management or aviation management plus flight operations. The Davis College of Business added the Executive MBA program in 1984. In 1986, an adult studies program was established as the College of Weekend Studies under the administrative supervision of the Davis College of Business. This program is now the JU Adult Degree Program.

In 2003, the School of Orthodontics was established and is now part of the Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences. The two-year Advanced Education Program in Orthodontics and Dentofacial Orthopedics received full accreditation without reporting requirements from the Commission on Dental Accreditation in August of 2006. The initial program offering consisted of a C.A.G.S., Certificate in Advanced Graduate Studies. Currently, a one-year Fellowship in Clinical Orthodontic Research program and a combined Certificate in Orthodontics and a Master of Science in Dentistry is offered.

In 2012, JU created a Public Policy Institute (PPI), offering the first and only Master of Public Policy (MPP) program in the state of Florida. PPI seeks to prepare graduate students for leadership roles in the public, private, and non-profit sectors through the in-depth study of public policy. As the Institute celebrates its sixth year, the development of core skills in policy analysis, quantitative methods, management, and leadership spans across multiple program offerings, including dual degree combinations with Master of Business Administration and Master of Science.

In Fall 2017, Jacksonville University returned to its roots in Downtown Jacksonville establishing Jacksonville University Downtown at 76 S. Laura Street. JU Downtown was created with the adult working professional in mind and with the belief that a high-quality university education should not be limited by bricks and mortar, geographic proximity, or traditional classroom hours. The downtown campus is home to the Nathan M. Bisk Center for Professional Studies. The mission of the Center for Professional

Studies is to collaborate with Jacksonville University's academic units to develop and provide quality, rigorous educational programs utilizing online, hybrid, and cohort delivery models. The center serves to support students in achieving their academic and professional goals, support faculty utilizing innovative pedagogy, and support the community by ensuring graduates are workforce ready.

As part of JU Downtown, the Center shares the Downtown campus vision. Jacksonville University believes that education shapes every aspect of a person's life, brings communities together to solve complex problems, and creates the vision for a future filled with innovation. The Downtown Campus and the Center for Professional Studies aims to connect citizens of Jacksonville to global society through higher education. In Spring 2022, JU created its fifth college--the College of Law--to begin welcoming students to its Downtown Campus in Fall 2022. Further, the Davis College of Business was rebranded as the Davis College of Business & Technology while the Linda Berry Stein College of Fine Arts became the Linda Berry Stein College of Fine Arts & Humanities to accurately reflect a reorganization of academic programs.

In Fall 2024, Jacksonville University opened its permanent College of Law on West Forsyth Street. Continuing its commitment to downtown Jacksonville, the College of Law is the only Law School in the region. The unique location provides students with direct access to the county and federal court systems and access to the Courthouse Law Library. The College of Law celebrated its first graduating class in the Spring of 2025.

Accessibility for the Mobility Impaired

Jacksonville University recognizes its obligation to have classrooms accessible to persons with mobility impairments. Generally, if a classroom is inaccessible, another classroom on the first floor of the same building will be used to make a class accessible to a mobility impaired student. Staff members who have offices located on the top floors of an inaccessible building will meet with students on the first floor of the building they are located in, if the need arises.

The Disability Support Services Office will coordinate the relocation of classes and is also the point of contact for students and staff who are mobility impaired.

Disclaimer Notification

Jacksonville University intends to adhere to the rules and regulations, course offerings, and financial charges as announced in this Catalog and in other publications. The University, nevertheless, reserves the right to withdraw any subject or course, to change the academic calendar, to change rules affecting the admission and retention of students or the granting of credit or degrees, or to alter its fees and other charges, whenever such changes are desirable or necessary. Attendance at Jacksonville University is a privilege that may be forfeited by anyone whose conduct is inconsistent with the traditions, policies, or regulations of the University.

Jacksonville University has decided to implement early rescission of the gainful employment rule as offered by the DOE secretary's authority under section 482 (c) of the HEA to designate the regulatory changes to subpart Q and subpart R of the Student Assistance General Provisions at Title 34 part 668 of the Code of Federal Regulations for early implementation.

In choosing to early implement the rescission of the gainful employment regulations, JU will not be required to report GE data for the 2018-2019 award year to NSLDS, which will be due October 1, 2019. Additionally, JU will not be required to comply with the current requirements in 34 CFR 668.412 (d) and (e) that require institutions to include the disclosure template, or a link thereto, in the GE program promotional materials and directly distribute the disclosure template to prospective students, which will be required starting on July 1, 2019. JU will no longer be required to post the GE Disclosure Template and may remove the template and any other GE disclosures that are required under 34 CFR 668.412 from their web pages. Finally, JU will not be required to comply with the certification requirements for GE programs under 34 CFR 668.414.

Disruptive Classroom Behavior Policy

Disruptive behavior is prohibited. Disruptive behavior includes but is not limited to conduct that interferes with or obstructs the teaching or learning process. Civil expression of disagreement with the course instructor, during times when the instructor permits discussion, is not itself disruptive behavior and is not prohibited.

1. Temporary Removal of Student from Class or Other Educational Experience:

When any student, acting individually or in concert with others, obstructs or disrupts, or attempts to obstruct or disrupt any teaching, or any other activity authorized to be discharged on behalf of the University or held on the University's premises, the student may be asked to stop the disruptive behavior by an instructor or staff of the University. If the student continues, an instructor/staff member is authorized to tell the student to leave the area or classroom and, if the student will not leave, call Campus Security. The instructor/staff member must immediately call Campus Security (904-256-7585), without prior request to the student, if presented with an unsafe situation, threatening behavior, violence, knowledge of a crime, or in other appropriate circumstances.

2. Withdrawal of Student from Class or Other Educational Experience:

When a student disrupts a class or other educational experience, if the student's behavior or lack of preparation is detrimental to the educational experience of others, or if the student is compromising the learning environment, the instructor may take action to withdraw the student from the class or educational experience as a result of this significant and/or repeated behavior.

To do this, the instructor shall:

- provide the student written notice of intent to withdraw the student from the class or educational experience, with an explanation of the instructor's reason(s), and provide a copy to the instructor's unit administrator (or, when there is no unit administrator, to the dean of the instructor's college or school).
- schedule a meeting with the student and the unit administrator (or, when there is no unit administrator, with the dean of the instructor's college or school) to occur within three business days of the notice. At the meeting, the student may have one advisor present.
- bar the student from the class or educational experience pending the result of the meeting, and the written notice should advise the student if there is such a bar.
- decide whether to withdraw the student from the class or educational experience following the meeting. If the student is not withdrawn, the student will be provided the opportunity to complete all assignments/exams that may have been missed.
- recommend his or her grade if the student is withdrawn. The student may appeal this decision within three business days in writing to the academic dean or designee. During the student's appeal, the student remains withdrawn from and is barred from attending the class. The academic dean or his/her designee's decision on this appeal is final.

3. Referral to Student Life:

Instructors, faculty members, academic deans, and/or unit administrators are also encouraged to report student conduct issues to the Student Life office. This reporting ensures that any other student code of conduct related behavior is appropriately addressed with the student.

Intellectual Property Policy

Scope of the Policy:

- This policy applies to all faculty, staff, and students (hereafter noted as "author/inventor" unless specifically designated) at Jacksonville University whether associated with the University in a full- or part-time capacity.
- This policy also covers non-employees (consultants, subcontractors, etc.) of Jacksonville University who participate in research, teaching, scholarship, or supportive activities provided for by the University on or off campus.
- This policy applies uniformly across Jacksonville University without regard to the individual's rank, status, or department.

Intellectual Property Subject to this Policy

- Copyright – An original work of expression by an author, artist, composer, or programmer. Education-related examples include but are not limited to:
 - journal articles, books, course syllabi, lectures, printed instructional materials, manuals, examinations
 - novels, short stories, poems, theses
 - artwork, graphic designs, sculptural works, photographs
 - dramatic compositions, choreographic works, musical arrangements
 - audiovisual works, motion pictures, videotapes
 - computer programs, computer controlled multimedia, websites
- Patent – A unique invention, process, design, or plant. Examples include but are not limited to: devices, electrical circuits, computer software, medical devices, manufacturing processes, new bacteria, newly discovered genes, methods of doing business, and uniquely shaped or ornamented articles or objects.

1. All rights and ownership reside exclusively with the author or inventor of the Intellectual Property if:
 1. The Intellectual Property was generated as a result of individual effort and initiative.
 2. The Intellectual Property is a pedagogical, scholarly, artistic, or aesthetic work that is not part of a directed assignment from the University. Unless otherwise specified in a sponsored agreement, such as a grant or contract award document, contract or another policy (see Section "C"), the author or inventor retains the copyright in pedagogical, scholarly, artistic, or aesthetic works produced through the normal usage of sabbaticals, release time, and professional development grants through University programs.
 3. Only incidental use of University facilities and resources was involved in producing the Intellectual Property. This includes instructional technologies that might be associated with online courses where the technology simply supplies a delivery mechanism and does not contribute to the authorship or creative process.
 4. The Intellectual Property is course material, such as syllabi, websites, recordings of classroom activities, assignments, and tests, that is developed at the University by the author or inventor, unless grant or other outside funding sources indicate otherwise. The university shall be permitted to use such Intellectual Property for internal instructional, educational, and administrative purposes, including satisfying requests of accreditation agencies for faculty-authored syllabi and course descriptions.
 5. The Intellectual Property was created by a student, not employed by the University, solely for the purpose of satisfying a course or degree requirement, including papers, theses, articles, music, or art. This does not apply if the student was employed, specifically assigned, and/or funded by the University or through a sponsored agreement issued to the University (see Section "C"). Intellectual Property created by students in connection with course assignments or in response to surveys administered by the University shall be available for the university to use for internal instructional, educational, and administrative purposes, including the assessment of student learning outcomes.
2. In the case that the Intellectual Property is an "Individual Effort", a written disclosure to the Office of the Provost and Chief Academic Officer is not necessary.
3. Jacksonville University will be granted royalty-free license to use the Intellectual Property for internal instructional, educational, and administrative purposes as long as the individual is employed by the University.

2. University Assisted Effort

1. When the University provides the significant use of University resources to assist in developing the Intellectual Property, the University is entitled to certain rights and privileges.
2. "Significant Use of University Resources" is defined as the use of University resources that is over and above the normal level of funding, release time, sabbatical, library resources, research assistance from librarians, students, and/or graduate assistants, secretarial or clerical assistance, word processing equipment, databases, and equipment already owned or licensed by the University, specialized facilities, or other support services for the production of Intellectual Property typically provided by the University. The normal usage of sabbaticals, release time, and professional development grants by the University shall not constitute the "Significant Use of University Resources" unless specified by the University in the terms of the sabbatical, leave, or grant.
3. As early as possible in the creation of the Intellectual Property, preferably before the author or inventor meets the criteria regarding the "Significant Use of University Resources," the author or inventor shall disclose in writing the facts surrounding the creation of the Intellectual Property to the Provost and Chief Academic Officer (hereafter Provost).
4. The written disclosure will include the names of the author(s)/inventor(s), a description of the Intellectual Property, a discussion of the circumstances that led to the development of the Intellectual Property and the University's involvement, an explanation of what needs to be done to secure protection for the Intellectual Property, and a discussion of what is to be done with the Intellectual Property and its possible benefit to the University.
5. If the Provost determines that the significant use of University resources will be required to develop Intellectual Property, the University and the author or inventor will negotiate a contract outlining rights and responsibilities. The contract should, at a minimum, describe the work; set any deadlines and reporting requirements; allocate the rights of each to publish, promote, revise, or otherwise use the work; delineate what rights, if any, the author/inventor retains for attribution, future use, or revision rights; and articulate the division of royalties or revenues, if any, from the sale of resulting products of Intellectual Property.

6. If an agreement between the author/inventor and the Provost is not reached within 60 days of receipt of the written disclosure, the Provost will convene an Intellectual Property Committee that will recommend what action should be taken by the University. The committee will consist of two faculty members or staff of the Provost's choosing, two faculty members or staff of the author/inventor's choosing, and a fifth faculty member or staff agreed upon by the other four members. After receiving the committee's recommendation, the Provost will forward his/her final decision in writing to the author/inventor, all within the 60-day period. The decision may include one of the following:
 1. The University will release all ownership rights for the Intellectual Property to the author/inventors. The University will not require repayment of any expenditure made by the University in developing the Intellectual Property.
 2. The University will release all ownership rights for the Intellectual Property to the authors/inventors. However, the University will require repayment of all expenditures made by the University in developing the Intellectual Property. Repayment will come out of any royalty income that might be received by the authors/inventors.
 3. The University will retain partial ownership of the Intellectual Property with royalty income to be distributed as given below. University funds will be used to further develop, publish/patent, market, and protect the Intellectual Property from infringement.
 4. The University will require an additional 60 days to have the Intellectual Property evaluated by technical development consultants to ascertain whether there would be sufficient interest and financial return to justify continuing the development of the Intellectual Property and its protection. By the end of the 60-day period, the University will inform the author/inventor in writing which of the above three options was the final decision. If the University decides to retain partial ownership, the work will commence immediately and continue at a reasonable pace. Steps will be taken to maintain and limit the disclosure of patentable materials. Royalties derived from the marketing or licensing of the Intellectual Property will be distributed as follows:
 1. All of the revenue generated by the Intellectual Property will first be used to recover the documentable costs associated with developing the Intellectual Property, seeking its protection, and marketing.
 2. Remaining income will be distributed as follows:
 1. Inventor(s) or their heirs: 50% of gross royalties
 2. Inventor(s)' Department: 20% of gross royalties
 3. University: 30% of gross royalties
3. University Initiated, Assigned, and Supported Efforts ("Work for Hire")
 1. All rights and ownership of Intellectual Property reside with the University if:
 1. The Intellectual Property was generated as a result of a "work for hire," which is specifically assigned or commissioned to the individual by the University or arising out of duties for which the individual was specifically employed.
 2. The Intellectual Property resulted from the simultaneous or sequential contribution of numerous faculty, staff, and/or students over an extended period of time without a prearranged understanding of ownership.
 3. The Intellectual Property was created by a student acting as an employee of the University and working on a project as part of responsibilities as an employee.
 2. Under special circumstances, the University may share royalty income with the author or inventor of the protected Intellectual Property. Such an arrangement would require approval by the President in consultation with the Provost and other officers.
 3. An individual who gains professional expertise through such Intellectual Property may engage in professional activities (consulting, presenting at conferences, publishing, etc.) that may result in additional compensation.
 4. Any "Work for Hire" will be designated as such by the University and will require a written contract signed both by the employee or student and the University prior to beginning the work on Intellectual Property. In the absence of a written contract, any Intellectual Property developed by the individual remains the copyright of that individual.
4. Sponsor Supported Efforts from Outside the University
 1. Where the terms and conditions provided in the sponsored agreement give total or partial ownership to the University, the following additional considerations will apply:
 1. If the funding proposal to develop Intellectual Property was initiated and written by an individual or group of faculty or staff for the purpose of conducting research or developing instructional materials, the University's portion of the ownership of any Intellectual Property and resulting royalties shall be shared between the University and the involved individuals using the formula outlined above under "University Assisted Individual Effort." The individuals provide the creativity associated with the development of the protected Intellectual Property.
 2. If the funding proposal was initiated by the University and written by faculty or staff expressly for that purpose, the University shall retain all rights and ownership. This can be considered a "work for hire."
 2. Intellectual Property purchased with funds provided by the outside funding agency or foundation shall remain the property of the University unless stipulated differently in the sponsorship contract.
5. Any provision in this policy may be changed by written agreement among all parties prior to the granting of Intellectual Property rights. The author or inventor voluntarily may transfer the Intellectual Property, in whole or in part, to the University. Such transfer shall be in the form of a written document signed by the author or inventor.
6. This policy will not be applied retroactively from the date that it was passed by the Faculty Assembly (April 11, 2012).

Non-Discrimination

Jacksonville University is an equal opportunity institution in accordance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Americans With Disabilities Act. JU's policy is to recruit, retain, and promote qualified students, faculty, and staff regardless of a person's race, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, age, marital status, national origin, disability, or status as a disabled veteran.

Public Law and Order

Jacksonville University is chartered by the State of Florida as a private, nonprofit, and independent institution of higher learning. The University seeks carefully to abide by all rules of law, whether local, state, or national.

JU expects the entire University community – trustees, faculty, administration, staff, and students – to live as good citizens governed by law. The University will officially take cognizance of illegal acts that may be committed by members of the academic community.

Sexual Harrassment

Jacksonville University is committed to creating and maintaining an educational and employment environment free of objectionable or disrespectful behavior or communication that interferes with the activities or performance of a student or employee, or creates a hostile, intimidating, or threatening environment. The University prohibits sexual harassment, which is defined by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission as:

Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment, enrollment, or education;
- submission to or rejection of such conduct is used as the basis for employment or academic decisions affecting that individual; or
- such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or academic experience or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work or academic environment.

Violations should be reported to any member of the Office of People and Culture (non-students) or to the Student Life Office (students).

Student Conduct

All students will be held responsible for conforming to all local, state, and federal laws and for behaving in a manner consistent with the best interests of the University as an educational institution and of the student body.

The University ethos and all rules and regulations are expressed in this Catalog and/or "The Green Pages" Student Handbook found at www.ju.edu/greenpages. All students are expected to be thoroughly acquainted with the contents of both and to abide by all University rules, regulations, and standards.

University Withdrawal

A student who wishes to leave the University before the end of the current semester must complete the Complete Withdrawal Form with all appropriate approvals. Withdrawal from the University may require cancellation, refund or repayment of all or part of a student's financial aid package. Such a student also may be entitled to a refund of a portion of tuition and fees.

Failure to officially withdraw from the University will result in a failing grade in each course in which the student is enrolled, thereby jeopardizing chances for readmission or transfer to another institution.

If a student wishes to withdraw from the University before the beginning of classes for any semester or term, he or she must complete the institutional complete withdrawal form with all appropriate approvals. **In all cases, withdrawal is not effective until the date the completed form or a withdrawal letter is received by the Registrar's Office.**

Scholarships and Financial Assistance

Jacksonville University offers students a comprehensive financial assistance program that is administered through the JU Office of Student Financial Assistance. Financial assistance may be granted on the basis of academic or talent qualifications or on the basis of calculated financial need. The financial assistance programs are administered in accordance with University equal opportunity guidelines and the federal definition of demonstrated financial need. Any student who applies for admission to Jacksonville University may request financial assistance, although all new students must be accepted for admission before financial assistance may be awarded. In most cases, students receiving financial assistance must maintain at least half-time status and satisfactory academic progress. Most federal, state, and institutional grant assistance is restricted to students who are completing their first bachelor's degree.

While Jacksonville University welcomes students from other countries, those who are not United States citizens or are not permanent residents of the U.S. are not eligible for federal and state need-based financial assistance offered through the JU Office of Student Financial Assistance. Prior to a student's enrollment, the Office of Admissions provides a special Financial Information Sheet for International Students. U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services policy requires international students to furnish evidence that they will have sufficient funds for their education in the United States.

This information is accurate as of the publication date of this Catalog. However, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures are subject to change by the University, the Federal government, and the states. When this occurs, updated requirements take precedence over the information contained herein, and reasonable efforts will be made by the University to communicate such changes to the affected students. Jacksonville University reserves the right to cancel or amend any portion of a student's financial assistance award at any time. Awards may also be canceled or amended in the event that anticipated funding becomes unavailable.

Financial Aid

All new and returning students requesting assistance are required to submit the FAFSA. **JU's federal school code is 001495.** Students should file electronic initial and renewal FAFSAs.

Applicants are urged to submit their forms as soon after October 1st as possible. You must apply annually. All aid packages are annual, and disbursed equally between semesters of attendance.

All applications for financial assistance, and all related paperwork including applications for the Federal Direct Student Loan, must be received in the Office of Student Financial Assistance **four weeks prior to the start of the semester/term in which enrollment is to begin.** Information received after that date may not be fully processed before the start of classes. Payment or payment arrangements for fall are due by August 1st, for spring by December 1st and summer by May 1st. If you expect to use financial aid you should plan to have the entire process completed prior to the deadlines for payment.

Forms necessary to complete the financial assistance process are available in the Office of Student Financial Assistance or online at www.ju.edu/financialservices/help/forms.

Loans and Federal Programs

Federal Pell Grants

Eligibility and award amount are determined on the basis of the FAFSA. Award amounts vary each year. Awards are available to eligible students who enroll for at least three credit hours per semester.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

This is a federal grant for students with high financial need. Because funds are limited, awarding and award amounts will vary depending on the University's annual allocation.

Federal College Work Study

Campus jobs may be awarded to full-time students as part of their financial aid packages to help meet need. Students are restricted in the number of hours they may work per semester and the maximum amount they may earn. Because funds are limited, awarding and award amounts will vary depending on the University's annual allocation.

Subsidized Federal Direct Student Loans

This is a need-based federal student loan with a fixed interest rate that is set yearly. Therefore, the rate can vary depending on the date of disbursement. Funds are available from the U.S. Department of Education. Interest is paid by the federal government on behalf of the student as long as the student maintains half-time enrollment. Students make no payments until six months after ceasing at least half-time enrollment. Normal repayment is over ten years.

Unsubsidized Federal Direct Student Loans

This loan is similar to the Subsidized Federal Direct Student Loan, however it is available to students regardless of financial need. The interest rate is fixed and is set yearly, therefore the rate can vary depending on the disbursement date of the loan. Interest begins to accrue and payments may be required while the student is enrolled. Students must submit a signed and completed application/promissory note to the U.S. Department of Education in order to receive the funds and, if applicable, complete entrance loan counseling. Repayment begins six months after the student ceases at least half-time enrollment.

Federal Direct PLUS Loans for Graduate and Professional Students

This is a credit-based federal loan available to graduate students. Graduate students may apply to borrow an amount up to the cost of education minus financial aid. The interest rate is fixed and is set yearly, therefore the rate can vary depending on the disbursement date of the loan. The loan will be deferred while the borrower is enrolled in school at least half-time and the borrower may request forbearance to align repayment with Federal Direct Student Loans. Students must complete the FAFSA and first apply for annual loan amount maximum eligibility under the Federal Direct Student Loan program. Students must submit a signed and completed application/promissory note and, if applicable, complete entrance loan counseling to receive funds.

Federal Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS)

This is a credit-based federal loan available to parents. Parents may apply to borrow an amount up to the student's cost of education minus financial aid. The interest rate is fixed and is set yearly, therefore the rate can vary depending on the disbursement date of the loan. Parents must submit a signed and completed application/promissory note to the U.S. Department of Education (www.studentloans.gov) and, if applicable, complete entrance loan counseling in order to receive the funds. The FAFSA is required for PLUS Loan approval.

State Programs

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

This state program provides lottery-funded scholarships to Florida high school graduates in recognition of high academic achievement. The Florida Department of Education's Office of Student Financial Assistance selects students, and notification of eligibility is sent to high school graduates in the months following their graduation from high school. Students who receive the Florida Bright Futures Scholarships are financially liable for withdrawals that occur after the end of drop/add in any semester. Recipients will be ineligible for future awards until repayment has been reported to the state by the reporting school.

There are two levels of Bright Futures Scholarships available for use at JU: Florida Academic Scholars and Florida Medallion Scholars. The University does not participate in the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars program. Each level has specific criteria for both initial eligibility and renewal. However, to be eligible for an initial award from any of these programs, a student must:

- Earn a high school diploma or equivalent
- Be enrolled for at least six semester credit hours
- Not have been found guilty of a felony charge
- Apply for a scholarship during the final semester of high school. High school guidance offices or the Florida Department of Education have applications.

Florida Academic Scholars

To be eligible for Florida Academic Scholars, a student must:

- Have achieved a minimum 3.5 weighted GPA (based on the Statewide Scholarship Weighting System) in the 15 high school credits required for admission to state universities
- Have test scores of at least 1290 SAT Reasoning Test (based on the combined Critical Reading and Mathematics sections only)
 - or 29 ACT (excluding the writing section)
 - or earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma
 - or be named a scholar or finalist in either the National Merit or National Achievement Programs sponsored by the National Merit Corporation

A 3.0 cumulative GPA is required for renewal, but 2.75 or above would allow the student to renew at the level of the Florida Medallion Scholars. Recipients must successfully complete a minimum of 24 credits annually for renewal.

Florida Medallion Scholars

To be eligible for the Florida Medallion Scholars, a student must:

- Have achieved a minimum 3.0 weighted GPA (based on the Statewide Scholarship Weighting System) in the 15 high school credits required for admission to state universities
- Have test scores of at least a 1170 SAT or 26 ACT

A 2.75 cumulative GPA is required for renewal. Recipients must successfully complete a minimum of 24 credits annually for renewal.

Effective Access to Student Education (EASE)

This grant provides tuition assistance not based on need to Florida residents for attendance at eligible independent nonprofit Florida colleges and universities. Requirements for EASE are:

- Must be a state resident for one year prior to the start of classes and be resident for other than educational purposes
- Must enroll full time; i.e., 12 or more credits per semester. Students must successfully complete a minimum of 12 credits for each semester of award receipt and maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA for renewal.

Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG)

The annual value of the award varies from year to year based on legislative appropriations. The maximum value of the award is \$2,610, but individual awards may vary based on availability of funds. This is a need-based grant for Florida residents who meet the state's eligibility requirements.

Florida Minority Teacher Scholarship

This collaborative performance-based scholarship program between community colleges and private universities and colleges provides a \$4,000 scholarship for minority students who are enrolled as juniors or above in a state-approved teacher education program in one of Florida's public or private universities or colleges. Awards are available to eligible African-American, Hispanic, Asian-American/Pacific Islander and Native American/Alaskan Native students, as well as dislocated military personnel and dislocated defense contractor employees. Initial applicants must complete Form MTES-1, which is available from the Florida Office of Student Financial Assistance or the JU Office of Student Financial Assistance. Students are eligible to receive the award for a maximum of three consecutive years. The Florida Fund for Minority Teachers will notify all applicants nominated for a scholarship of the status of their applications.

State Prepaid Program

Funds paid into State Prepaid College Programs can generally be withdrawn and used for private institutions without penalty.

Withdrawals and Refunds

Students who receive Title IV federal student aid funds and who withdraw, drop out, are dismissed, cease attending classes, or take a leave of absence prior to completing 60% of a semester are subject to Federal Return of Funds requirements. The applicable Title IV financial assistance programs include Federal Pell Grants, Federal SEOG Grants, Federal Perkins Loans, Subsidized and Unsubsidized Federal Stafford Loans, and Federal PLUS Loans. For those students, the Office of Student Financial Assistance recalculates federal financial aid eligibility based on the following formula:

Percentage of financial aid earned = number of days completed through the withdrawal date ÷ total number of days in the semester.

The withdrawal date is defined as the actual date the student began the institution's withdrawal process, the student's last date of recorded attendance or the midpoint of the semester for a student who leaves without notifying the institution. An example of the withdrawal and refund policy follows.

For Example - For a semester that begins on August 30th and ends on December 15th (with no scheduled breaks), the denominator used to determine the amount of federal student aid earned by a student who withdraws fully would be 105 days. The 60% point of the semester would be October 31st. A student who withdraws on October 1st (day 33) would have earned 33/105, or 31.43%, of the federal student aid disbursed for the semester. The Office of Student Financial Assistance will recalculate the student award and return 68.57% of the federal student aid to the federal student aid programs. If \$1,000 in Federal Stafford Loan funds were disbursed, the University would be required to return \$686 to the federal government of the funds. The student would then owe Jacksonville University \$686, plus any other unpaid charges due.

The Return of Title IV Funds requirement is part of the Higher Education Amendments of 1965 as reauthorized in 1998 and applies to any student who received Title IV funding, as described above. Return of funds to the federal programs is not the same as Jacksonville University's institutional policy on refunds and withdrawals and may result in a balance due the University even when the account balance was zero at the time of withdrawal.

The Return of Title IV Funds requirement does not apply to students who withdraw from one or more classes, but continue to be enrolled in at least one class during the semester. It does not apply to state or institutionally funded financial assistance. For students who withdraw fully during one of the institution's published refund periods, any institutional awards previously distributed will be prorated in proportion to the amount of charges to be refunded. Students who fail all coursework during a particular semester, are subject to Return of Title IV Funds based on last date of academic activity. Proof of academic activity beyond 60% of the term is needed in the Office of Student Financial Assistance to prevent the Return of Title IV Funds for the coursework failed.

Any individual who receives student financial assistance and is considering withdrawal from the University should contact the Office of Student Financial Assistance to determine the effect of withdrawal on aid eligibility and/or charges.

Verification

In some instances student and/or families may need to supply the Office of Student Financial Assistance with documentation regarding tax filing status, income earned, and household size. This information is required to receive federal, some state and need based institutional financial aid. The Office of Student Financial Assistance will notify the students of required documents by email and/or mailed letters. The deadline to turn in such documentation is the end of the academic term in which you are enrolled.

Therefore, the rules, regulations, policies, and procedures governing Jacksonville University and Jacksonville University College of Law are subject to amendment and any such amendments take effect immediately, unless otherwise noted. A student is expected to abide by all requirements as they are amended. Making academic progress is a student’s personal responsibility. Students should carefully read this handbook and all Jacksonville University policies and correspondence and consult regularly with appropriate Jacksonville University personnel for additional information.

Duties assigned in this Handbook to the Dean, an Associate or Assistant Dean, or the Chair of the Academic Standards Committee may, in the event of that individual’s unavailability, be performed by a designee. This designation shall be made by the individual being replaced, by the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, or by the Dean.

To the extent not covered in this Handbook, the COL adopts the academic standards and policies applicable to all students at Jacksonville University. Where inconsistent with other University policies, this Handbook serves as the policy of record for COL students.

A. Graduation Requirements

A. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

1. REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

1.1. To be considered for graduation and eligible for a J.D., a student must satisfy all of the following requirements:

1.1.1. Satisfactorily complete and receive course credit for 90 hours of course work with a cumulative GPA of 2.3. At least 64 of these credit hours must be in courses that satisfy the Minimum Number of Regularly Scheduled Classroom Sessions Requirement. See § II.A.2.

1.1.4. Complete the Pro Bono Requirement. See § II.A.3.

1.1.5. Have paid all balances owed to the COL and to Jacksonville University

1.1.6. Absent good cause, not have a pending criminal case or an investigation under the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct

1.1.7. Not be subject to any of the Conditions for Dismissal. See § II.I.4.1 (Academic Dismissal).

2. MINIMUM NUMBER OF REGULARLY SCHEDULED CLASSROOM SESSIONS

2.1. In accordance with ABA standards, a student pursuing a J.D. must complete a minimum of 64 credits of coursework in courses that require attendance in regularly scheduled classroom sessions.

2.2. Not all credits a student may earn towards the 90 credits required for graduation will count towards this requirement. Credits that will not count towards the 64-credit requirement include credits earned through co-curriculars (e.g., law review, moot court, mock trial), credits earned in a course in any other degree program at Jacksonville University, and credits earned in an externship or a clinic. Students should address questions as to whether a particular course will satisfy this requirement to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs or the Registrar.

2.3. A student must submit to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs an Application to Study at Another Institution before enrolling in any courses outside the COL. The Associate Dean will determine whether those credits should count toward the J.D. program and/or the requirement in this section A. See § II.C.5 (Credits for Study At Another Institution).

3. PRO BONO

3.1. The COL is committed to providing students with substantial opportunities to participate in pro bono legal services, including law-related public service activities, as defined in Standard 303 and Interpretation 303-3 of the ABA Standards and Rules of Procedure for Approval of Law Schools. The Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice will maintain and make available to students information regarding opportunities for pro bono legal services, including law-related public service activities.

3.2. Students must complete 30 hours of pro bono legal services, which can include law-related public services. These services must be completed before the deadline by which all graduation requirements are to be completed. All hours must be regularly submitted to the Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice.

3.3. If a student is currently participating in an externship, work performed at that externship site will not satisfy this requirement unless (a) the student satisfies all the requirements for externship credit; (b) the student receives permission from the student's externship supervisor or course instructor (as the case may be) to accumulate pro bono hours while participating in the externship; and (c) the student notifies the Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice.

3.4. Students are encouraged to perform additional pro bono work. This additional work can be additional pro bono legal services, law-related public service, or some other service for a charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental, or educational organization in matters that are designed primarily to address the needs of individuals of limited means. A student who accumulates 60 or more aggregate hours of required and additional pro bono work will be recognized at the COL commencement ceremony.

4. TIME TO EARN DEGREE

4.1. A student may not complete the J.D. program in a period of less than 24 months of starting classes.

4.2. A student completing the J.D. program on a full-time basis must complete the program of study within 72 months of starting classes. The Academic Standards Committee may waive this requirement for good cause.

4.3. If, within a period of 24 consecutive months, a student who has begun the J.D. program does not complete at least 1 course at the COL will be deemed to have withdrawn from the COL. Before resuming classes, such a student must seek readmission in accordance with the Withdrawal Policy. See § II.H.4 (Withdrawal from the College).

B. Attendance Policies

B. ATTENDANCE POLICIES

1. GENERAL

1.1. The COL expects each student to attend all scheduled class sessions of the courses in which the student is enrolled, including any 1L class sessions scheduled during Orientation Week.

1.2. A student enrolled in an externship course or who is receiving co-curricular credit is subject to the attendance requirements provided in the course syllabus.

2. FIRST-DAY ATTENDANCE

2.1. The COL expects each student to attend the first class session of each course in which the student is enrolled.

2.2. Penalties, including an administrative drop, may be assessed for nonattendance. See § II.E.4.3 (Administrative Drop for Nonattendance).

3. INSTRUCTOR AND STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

3.1. Course instructors must take attendance for each class meeting and update the roster weekly via Jacksonville University's system. At the end of the drop/add period for each term, the course instructor must verify the accuracy of the attendance roster for each course.

3.2. A course instructor is not required to notify any student of the student's total number of absences. Each student should maintain a record of the student's attendance for each class session.

3.3. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs shall check the attendance records weekly.

4. ABSENCES

4.1. Excessive absences may result in a student being administratively withdrawn from a course. See § II.E.4.5 (Administrative Course Withdrawal).

4.2. The COL recognizes that some absences may be unavoidable due to illness, personal and family emergencies, law-school- or university-sponsored activities, religious or cultural observances, and other compelling reasons. The COL encourages students to communicate with their course instructors regarding these absences and to do so in advance to the greatest extent possible. Because the COL assumes that a student will have a compelling reason for any absence, the COL will not generally require documentation.

4.3. A student who has flu or flu-like symptoms, a contagious or serious illness, is caring for another person suffering from the flu or a contagious or serious disease, or has an exigent circumstance that might result or require missing several class hours shall consult with the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs as soon as possible to discuss class attendance accommodations. The Associate Dean will determine the maximum permissible number of absences in each of the student's courses; the Associate Dean may request that the student provide appropriate documentation. In most situations, it will not be reasonable for a student to be absent from more than 30% of the class hours. The Associate Dean's determination is final.

5. INSTRUCTOR POLICIES

5.1. A course instructor may, with adequate notice to students, impose attendance policies stricter than those detailed in this part B.

5.2. With advance notice to the student, a course instructor may reasonably penalize a student who is in violation of the instructor's attendance policy unless the absences were approved by the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. Penalties may include (but are not limited to) precluding the student from taking the final examination or from submitting the final paper or project.

5.3. A course instructor may consider failure to attend or to be prepared for class when determining a student's final grade in a course, consistent with policies detailed in the course syllabus.

6. VIRTUAL ATTENDANCE

6.1. A student who has received advance approval in writing from the course instructor to watch an in-person class session via virtual means or who attends a class session that is offered virtually (e.g., a class moved online due to a building closure) is present for attendance purposes and will not be marked absent if, in the course instructor's judgment, the student's virtual attendance and participation satisfies the requirements for attendance in that instance.

6.2. If the course instructor determines that the virtual attendance does not satisfy the requirements for attendance, the student will be marked absent.

6.3. No student may attend more than 30% of classes via virtual means, including any class sessions conducted fully via virtual means, unless such attendance has been approved as a disability accommodation.

7. DISTANCE EDUCATION ATTENDANCE

7.1. This policy applies to any COL course offered primarily through distance education. See § II.C.3 (Distance Education).

7.2. The course instructor will determine class attendance on a weekly basis. To be considered as having attended, a student must (a) read and prepare all assignments given by the course instructor; (b) watch any lectures or other presentations provided on the distance education site; (c) participate on the distance education site as required by the course instructor; and (d) complete any other course requirements.

7.3. Failure to Participate

7.3.1. Failure to participate in a distance education course in a given week may only be excused by the course instructor in consultation with the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

7.3.2. If the failure to participate is excused, the student may be required to complete additional work to make up for the absence or the student's grade may be reduced for the absence, both in the course instructor's discretion.

7.3.3. A student whose failure to participate in any distance education course in a given week is not excused will receive a grade of WX in the course, and the student will not receive a refund of tuition paid for that course. See § II.F.5.6 (Grade of WX).

7.4. Withdrawal and Failure to Attend

7.4.1. The COL's course withdrawal policies apply to courses taught via distance education. See § II.E.4 (Adding, Dropping, and Withdrawing from Courses).

7.4.2. If a student withdraws from a distance education course, the COL's standard tuition refund policy will apply.

7.5. Registering to take a class via distance education acts as a certification that the student will perform the work for the class without outside assistance, except as approved by the course instructor in writing. Representation that work done in a distance education course is one's own when it is not constitutes dishonesty, which is a violation of the COL Honor Code and the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy.

8. FEDERAL FINANCIAL AID

8.1. A student who receives federal financial aid should consult the policies related to that type of aid for more information related to attendance requirements. Federal regulations require financial aid recipients to maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress toward a degree program to continue receiving federal financial aid. See § II.I.6 (Satisfactory Academic Progress). Federal regulations also require Jacksonville University to return federal financial aid under certain circumstances when a student withdraws or is on a leave of absence. These regulations are complex, and any student who has questions or concerns should contact the Financial Aid Office.

C. Academic Credit Policies

C. ACADEMIC CREDIT POLICIES

1. CREDIT HOURS

1.1. Requirements for a Credit Hour

1.1.1. The COL adheres to federal-law and ABA definitions of a credit hour. The COL will not offer a course that does not meet the requirements of ABA Standard 310.

1.1.2. At least 42.5 total hours, accumulated through some combination of direct instruction and out-of-class work, are required for a credit hour.

1.1.3. Direct instruction time and out-of-class student work are determined in the aggregate over a semester or term.

1.2. Direct Instruction. Direct instruction, for purposes of this section C.1, includes regularly scheduled classroom time, any time allotted for monitored examination, and any time allotted for mandatory course instructor-led review sessions or mandatory course instructor-student meetings.

1.3. Out-of-Class Student Work. Out-of-class student work includes student work required to complete traditional reading assignments, writing and/or research assignments, group problems, and/or any non-traditional out-of-class assigned student work, as well as the hours of student work required to prepare adequately for classes and examinations (monitored or take-home) and to complete take-home examinations.

1.4. Credit Hours for Courses

1.4.1. The voting members of the Law Faculty, upon the recommendation of the Curriculum Committee, will establish the number of credit hours for each course.

1.4.2. To make this recommendation, the Committee normally looks at the number of credit hours suggested in the course proposal and reviews the course syllabus, reading assignments, and assessments to determine compliance with ABA Standard 310. If it appears the direct instruction time or out-of-class preparation time may be insufficient, the Committee will request that the course proposal or syllabus be modified to comply with the applicable standards prior to approval.

1.4.3. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs shall monitor this policy to ensure consistency and compliance with ABA standards.

1.5. Course Scheduling

1.5.1. General

1.5.1.1. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs shall schedule regular class meetings to ensure a minimum of 750 minutes of classroom instruction per credit hour.

1.5.1.2. To the extent that this schedule is disrupted, resulting in fewer than 750 minutes of classroom instruction, the course instructor must schedule at least one of the following outside of regularly scheduled class meetings to account for the deficit: (a) a monitored exam; (b) a mandatory course instructor-led review session; (c) mandatory course instructor-student meetings; or (d) another similar mandatory session involving direct instruction.

1.5.2. Types of Courses

1.5.2.1. Fall and Spring Semester Courses: A 3-credit course will ordinarily meet for 180 minutes each week for a total of 2,250 minutes of direct instruction over 12.5 weeks, followed by an examination period. A student is expected to spend a minimum of 6 hours on out-of-class work per week during the semester, plus an additional 6 hours or more on preparing for or completing end-of-semester exams or other assessments.

1.5.2.2. Summer Term Courses: A 3-credit course will ordinarily meet for 300 minutes each week for a total of 2,250 minutes of direct instruction over 7.5 weeks, followed by an examination period. A student is expected to spend 90 hours on out-of-class work during the term.

1.5.2.3. Short Courses: A 1-credit course will ordinarily meet for 750 minutes of direct instruction over 1 week. A student is expected to spend 30 hours on out-of-class work during the time period over which the course extends.

1.5.2.4. Seminar (Paper) Courses: Seminar courses, with the consent of and after consultation with the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, may be scheduled in a way that results in fewer than 750 minutes of classroom time, but no fewer than 42.5 hours of combined direct instruction and out-of-class work, consistent with ABA Standard 310, in recognition of the additional time required to prepare a substantial paper.

1.5.2.5. Externships, Co-Curricular Activities, and Directed Research: For externships, co-curricular work activities, and directed research, a credit hour requires an appropriate combination of direct instruction and out-of-class work equivalent to a minimum of 42.5 total hours, consistent with ABA Standard 310.

1.6. Work Associated with Credit Hours

1.6.1. Course instructors shall design courses that require at least 42.5 total hours of work per credit hour through a combination of direct instruction and out-of-class work.

1.6.2. For COL purposes, direct instruction time is calculated in 50-minute "hours" per credit over 15 weeks, or other equivalent for more-condensed courses. All direct instruction time is calculated at this rate. All other academic time is calculated in 60-minute hours.

1.7. Documentation

1.7.1. Documents establishing compliance with this policy, including course syllabi, will be maintained on file with the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs for 7 years.

1.7.2. Course syllabi should state the expected number of hours of out-of-class work required for the course.

2. DIRECTED RESEARCH

2.1. A student may enroll in a course of Directed Research under the supervision of a faculty member who will evaluate the student's directed research project. Such a student will receive credit commensurate with the time and effort required and the anticipated quality of the student's educational experience.

2.2. Project Proposal

2.2.1. Proposal Form

2.2.1.1. To participate in a Directed Research course, a student must obtain a proposal form from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

2.2.1.2. The form will ask for (a) the student's name; (b) the supervising faculty member's name and signature; (c) the number of credit hours proposed; (d) grading standards; (e) a summary of at least 300 words of the proposed project and an estimated word count of the final project; and (f) a proposed timeline for the project, which must include agreed upon deadlines for project milestones: outlines, drafts, and final submissions.

2.2.2. Completing the Form

2.2.2.1. The student must complete the form in consultation with the faculty member who will supervise the research. The faculty member may provide guidance to the student during the development of the project.

2.2.2.2. Before approving the proposal, the supervising faculty member must agree with the research proposal, the grading standards, and the credit hours.

2.2.3. Submitting the Form

2.2.3.1. The supervising faculty member must send the approved proposal to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs by the end of the drop/add period in the semester during which the project will be completed.

2.2.3.2. Late submissions will not be accepted.

2.3. Award of Credit

2.3.1. To receive credit for a Directed Research course, a student must submit, no later than the agreed-upon deadline and to the supervising faculty member, written work consisting of a completed research paper or memorandum of law containing either criticism of the law relating to the topic area or synthesis of legal source materials into a statement of the law in the topic area.

2.3.2. The Credit Hours Policy in section C.1 will apply to Directed Research Courses.

2.4. Writing Requirement. Directed Research may not be substituted for the upper-level writing course. See § II.A.1.1.2.2.

3. DISTANCE EDUCATION

3.1. The COL is committed to the innovative development and delivery of its curricular offerings. To that end, and in accordance with ABA Standard 306 and 311(e) and Definitions (7) and (8) of the ABA Standards, the COL will offer students the flexibility to use advanced technology to receive some academic instruction leading to the J.D. degree.

3.2. Definitions

3.2.1. Distance Education: Distance Education is instruction in which students are separated from the course instructor or each other for more than one-third of the course and the instruction involves the use of technology to support regular and substantive interaction among students and between the students and the course instructor. This may be accomplished either synchronously or asynchronously.

3.2.2. Asynchronous Format: An asynchronous format is one in which a course instructor provides students with technology-assisted learning resources, and students engage these resources independently or in collaboration with classmates to complete a lesson by a designated time. Students and course instructors may use tools such as assessments, email, discussion boards, listservs, wikis, and other technologies to communicate without having to be in the same virtual or physical space at the same time.

3.2.3. Synchronous Format: A synchronous format is one in which a course instructor and students are in different physical locations, but conduct two-way communication with virtually no time delay, allowing class participation and course instructor-student communication in real time.

3.3. Course Requirements. All Distance Education courses must satisfy the following requirements:

3.3.1. Opportunity for regular and substantive interaction between the course instructor and student and among students;

3.3.2. Regular monitoring of student effort by the course instructor and opportunity for communication about that effort;

3.3.3. Learning outcomes for the course that are consistent with ABA Standard 302 and the COL's Learning Outcomes;

3.3.4. An effective process for verifying the identity of students taking the course, but also protecting student privacy; and

3.3.5. A course instructor who will be reasonably available to students either in person or through technology outside of regularly scheduled synchronous, or asynchronous session.

3.4. Course Approval. Courses that have been approved through the regular course approval process may be delivered as Distance Education courses with the approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. The Associate Dean shall ensure that Distance Education courses satisfy the requirements set out in this section C.3. This paragraph does not impact the regular process for the approval of new courses regardless of the courses' delivery method, except in the case of Distance Education courses, which must also satisfy § C.3.3 (Course Requirements).

3.5. Student Responsibilities

3.5.1. A student enrolled in a Distance Education course hosted or approved by the COL is bound by the COL Student Handbook, the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct, and the corresponding codes or policies of any host or co-hosting program or institution. Specifically, a student shall act professionally and courteously in a Distance Education course and shall refrain during all Distance Education activities from dishonest, abusive, or disruptive conduct. A student who violates this provision may be subject to sanctions as authorized by the applicable codes and policies. Violations include but are not limited to

3.5.1.1. Falsifying presence or participation in Distance Education activities.

3.5.1.2. Using applications, programs, or services to perform or assist in performing Distance Education work in violation of the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the provisions of the course syllabus; receiving assistance from other persons in the performance of Distance Education work in violation of the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the provisions of the course syllabus.

3.5.1.3. Copying or using without permission or attribution any online or other source.

3.5.1.4. Using Distance Education facilities or activities to knowingly harm another Distance Education participant.

3.5.1.5. Manipulating or interfering with Distance Education program facilities or activities without authorization.

3.5.2. A student enrolled in a Distance Education course hosted or approved by the COL bears responsibility to anticipate and address actual or potential technology issues by taking reasonable actions or precautions, including but not limited to

3.5.2.1. Securing access to a back-up electronic device and or software in case of primary device or software failure.

3.5.2.2. Performing assignments expeditiously and not delaying until a submission deadline.

3.5.2.3. Submitting work in a format specified by or acceptable to the course instructor.

3.5.2.4. Upon discovering a technology issue, taking reasonable measures to immediately notify the course instructor and the Associate Dean of Students of the problem or, if immediate action is not feasible, to provide such notice as soon as reasonably possible.

3.6. Limitations on Distance Education Credits

3.6.1. In accordance with Definition 8 of the ABA Standards and ABA Standard 311(e), a student may take a maximum of one-third of the credit hours required for the J.D. in Distance Education courses, or a maximum of 30 credit hours toward the 90 units required to graduate.

3.6.2. 1L students are not eligible to receive credit for Distance Education courses.

3.6.3. A student may enroll in non-required, non-Florida-Bar-Exam-subject Distance Education courses offered at other ABA-approved law schools only with prior permission of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, and only if any such course is offered on a basis consistent with the COL's Distance Education Policy.

3.7. Blended Courses

3.7.1. Courses in which students and course instructors are separated from each other for one-third or less of the course are not governed by this policy and are not included in the maximum number of Distance Education units that students may take. See § II.C.3.6 (Limitations on Distance Education Credits).

3.7.2. Course instructors may use Distance Education tools, such as virtual lectures, without the Associate Dean's approval so long as course instructors do not exceed the limits that would categorize a course as a Distance Education course.

3.8. Attendance Policies. The Distance Education Attendance Policy is found in section B.7 (Distance Education Attendance).

4. COURSEWORK COMPLETED PRIOR TO MATRICULATION

4.1 Credit for the J.D. degree is given only for course work taken after the student has matriculated in a law school's J.D. program of study except for credit granted to transfer students for courses completed at another law school pursuant to the College of Law's admissions policies (See Student Handbook, D(3.3)).

4.2 The College of Law does not grant credit toward the J.D. degree for work taken in a pre-admission program.

4.3 Credit may be granted toward the J.D. degree for non-J.D., graduate level coursework with prior approval from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. Credit earned toward a graduate degree prior to before matriculation in the J.D. program may not be credited toward the J.D. degree.

5. CREDITS FOR STUDY AT ANOTHER INSTITUTION

5.1. A current COL student must obtain prior written approval from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to take any course at another institution. The Associate Dean will determine whether those credits will be counted towards the credit hours required for the J.D. program and whether those credits will satisfy any specific degree requirements. See § II.A.2.3 (Minimum Number of Regularly Scheduled Classroom Sessions).

D. Admission Policies

D. ADMISSION POLICIES

1. STANDARDS FOR ADMISSION

1.1. Mission. The standards for admission to the COL advance the COL's mission as expressed in its mission statement.

1.2. Goals. The COL seeks to admit students who demonstrate academic excellence, integrity, and commitment to the legal profession. The COL is committed to enrolling students with diverse backgrounds and viewpoints.

1.3. Holistic Evaluation. The COL evaluates holistically all information that an applicant provides; however, the COL weighs substantially the numerical indicators of success in legal education (undergraduate GPA and LSAT scores). When deciding whether to extend an offer of admission, the COL considers the result of each LSAT administration for which the Law School Admissions Counsel reports a result to the COL as part of the application. Other considerations include writing samples, personal statements, initial or subsequent addenda that address challenges that may have impacted the applicant's prior academic performance, letters of recommendation, graduate school or other professional training (including any GPAs earned in such programs), and other information that demonstrates an applicant's preparation and potential for the successful pursuit of a J.D., passage of the bar examination, and competent and ethical practice of law.

1.4. Character and Fitness. When determining an applicant's potential for the competent and ethical practice of law, the COL will carefully consider each applicant's character and fitness. In addition to a bar examination, there are character, fitness, and other qualifications for admission to the bar in every U.S. jurisdiction. Because the law school application of a candidate for admission to a jurisdiction's bar will be considered by the examiners for that jurisdiction prior to that candidate's admission, candor in the character and fitness portion of the COL application is paramount. Applicants should determine the requirements for any jurisdiction in which they intend to seek admission by contacting the jurisdiction. Addresses for all relevant agencies are available through the National Conference of Bar Examiners. Applicants should also contact COL admissions counselors with any questions about what should be disclosed when answering character-and-fitness questions on the COL's application.

2. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

2.1. All applicants to the COL must submit:

2.1.1. Completed application for admission;

2.1.2. Personal statement;

2.1.3. Resume or Curriculum Vitae;

2.1.4. 2 letters of recommendation;

2.1.5. Character and Fitness evaluation;

2.1.6. Official Law School Admissions Test (LSAT) score(s); and

2.1.7. Official transcripts for all colleges and universities attended.

2.2. Applicants may provide additional materials including addenda, GRE Scores, and LSAT writing samples.

3. TRANSFER APPLICANTS

3.1. Applicants. The COL welcomes transfer applicants with superior academic records in law study.

3.2. Application Requirements

3.2.1. A transfer applicant's previous law study must have been undertaken at an ABA-accredited law school.

3.2.2. A transfer applicant must submit:

3.2.2.1. Completed application for admission;

3.2.2.2. Personal statement, including an explanation of the reason for transfer;

3.2.2.3. Resume or Curriculum Vitae;

3.2.2.4. Official Law School Admissions Test (LSAT) score(s);

3.2.2.5. Official transcripts for all colleges and universities attended, including all law programs in which the applicant has been or is currently enrolled; and

3.2.2.6. Letter of good standing from the dean of the law program where the applicant has completed or will complete the first year of law study.

3.2.3. Transfer applicants must abide by the general admissions deadlines.

3.3. Transfer of Credits

3.3.1. If a transfer applicant is admitted, the Registrar and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs will identify which courses and credits will transfer and disclose this information to the applicant at the time of acceptance. The Registrar and the Associate Dean will also evaluate whether the student has completed the courses required of a 1L student at the COL. To the extent that a transfer student has not completed those courses, his or her offer of admission will set forth the 1L courses that the student must complete.

3.3.2. The following policies apply to all transfer credits.

3.3.2.1. A student may transfer up to 30 credit hours from an ABA accredited institution.

3.3.2.2. A grade of C (not C-) or higher must be earned for transfer of credit. Courses taken pass/fail will not be awarded credit.

3.3.2.3. Credits will be applied to the equivalent COL course(s).

3.3.2.4. A student may appeal a transfer-of-credit decision in writing to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

3.3.2.5. Transferred courses will not factor into a student's COL GPA or class rank. Courses will be recorded with a grade of TR.

3.3.2.6. Credits earned 10 years or more from the time of enrollment will not be accepted.

3.4. Class Rank for Transfer Students. The COL ranks each class of students and determines tertile and/or quartile thresholds at the end of the 1L year and at the end of each fall and spring semester thereafter based on each student's cumulative GPA, excluding courses completed at other institutions. During the fall semester of the 2L year at the COL, transfer students will not have an official rank, tertile, or quartile. They will be ranked for the first time after all grades have been entered at the conclusion of the fall semester of the 2L year.

3.5. Space Limitations. Transfer applicants will be accepted only to the extent that vacancies exist in the second-year class.

4. APPEALS

4.1. All admissions decisions by the Admissions Committee are final.

E. Advising and Registration

E. ADVISING AND REGISTRATION

1. ADVISING AND COUNSELING

1.1. General Advising

1.1.1. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs advises students regarding registration and graduation requirements.

1.1.2. Each student is assigned a full-time, permanent member of the Law Faculty for advising. Advisors are accessible to students through regular office hours and by email.

1.2. Professional Development

1.2.1. The Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice counsels students regarding career and professional development.

1.2.2. Students may also seek advice or counsel regarding these issues from other members of the Law Faculty and staff.

1.3. Academic Success Counseling

1.3.1. All 1Ls must participate in mandatory counseling with the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep during each semester of the 1L year.

1.3.2. Failure to successfully participate in counseling may result in an advising hold that must be cleared by the Associate Dean before students can be registered for courses in the following semester.

2. FULL-TIME STATUS

2.1. The COL J.D. program is a full-time program.

2.2. A student must enroll in at least 15 credit hours in each fall and spring semester.

2.3. For good cause and with approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, a student may be permitted to enroll in fewer credits in a fall or spring semester.

3. MAXIMUM CREDIT HOURS

3.1. Without permission from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, a student may not enroll in more than 16 credit hours in a fall or spring semester or more than 6 credit hours in a summer term.

3.2. First-Year Students

3.2.1. A 1L student must take the 1L courses and may not take additional courses during either semester except for good cause and with approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

3.2.2. A 1L student who seeks to take an additional course must submit a written request to the Associate Dean. The request should identify the course in which the student hopes to enroll and should explain in detail the reasons why the overload should be granted.

3.2.3. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

4. ADDING, DROPPING, AND WITHDRAWING FROM COURSES

4.1. General

4.1.1. The general drop/add deadlines for the fall and spring semesters and summer and winter terms are listed on the Jacksonville University academic calendar, which is maintained by the Registrar.

4.1.2. Failure to attend a course for which the student is registered will be considered absence from the course.

4.1.3. A student who no longer wishes to attend a course must formally withdraw from the course.

4.2. Adding Courses

4.2.1. A student may not add a course if the number of classes already missed equals or exceeds the number of absences a student is allowed under the applicable the attendance policy or the attendance rules in the course instructor's syllabus, whichever is most strict.

4.2.2. A student may not add an externship course without the written permission of the Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice.

4.3. Administrative Drop for Nonattendance

4.3.1. Students are expected to attend the first class session of each course for which they are registered.

4.3.2. A student who fails to attend the first class session may be automatically dropped from the course unless the student has first notified the course instructor or the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs of the anticipated absence.

4.3.3. If agreed upon by the Registrar and the course instructor, a student dropped from a course in this manner may be re-added if the student can still meet the attendance requirements for the course and the course does not have a wait list. If the course has a wait list, the student will be placed at the end of that list and will only be added if space allows.

4.4. Student-Initiated Drop or Course Withdrawal

4.4.1. Required Courses: A student may not drop or withdraw from a required course without the written permission of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. Permission to drop or withdraw from a required course will be granted only for good cause or as may be required by applicable law. See § II.A.1.1.2. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

4.4.2. Elective Courses: After the relevant drop/add deadline, a student may withdraw from an elective course only for good cause shown in a written request submitted to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

4.4.3. Externship Courses: The last day a student may drop or withdraw from an externship course will be prescribed in the externship application and policies. A student may not drop or withdraw from an externship course without the written permission of the Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice.

4.4.4. Student in the Final Semester: After the relevant drop/add period, but during the semester in which a student expects to graduate, a student may withdraw from any course not needed to fulfill a graduation requirement if all of the following conditions are satisfied: (a) for any externship course, the student has obtained the written permission of the Assistant Dean of Student Development and Practice; (b) the course is not needed as part of the student's Academic Plan or other requirement arising from Academic Probation; (c) the student submits the request to withdraw in accordance with the Registrar's withdrawal deadlines; and (d) the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs agrees to the request. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

4.5. Administrative Course Withdrawal

4.5.1. For good cause and in accordance with the applicable policies, the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, in consultation with the course instructor(s), may administratively withdraw a student from one or more courses. See § II.H.5 (Administrative Withdrawal).

4.5.2. Unless otherwise approved as a disability or special accommodation, a student who fails to attend at least 80% of the total class hours in a course will not have attended sufficient class hours to earn credit and may be administratively withdrawn from the course by the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

4.5.3. A student who is administratively withdrawn from a required course must repeat that course no later than the next time it is regularly scheduled. A student does not have the right to require that the course be offered any earlier than the next time that the course is regularly scheduled.

4.6. Transcript Notation

4.6.1. If a student drops a course before the drop/add deadline, the course will not appear on the student's transcript.

4.6.2. When a student withdraws or is withdrawn from a course after the relevant drop/add deadline, the course name and a grade of W will appear on the student's transcript. For good cause, the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, in conjunction with the Registrar, may approve a different transcript notation.

4.6.3. A student who is administratively withdrawn from a course for excessive absences will receive a grade of WX for the course. See §§ II.E.4.5 (Administrative Course Withdrawal), II.F.5.6 (Grade of WX).

4.7. Financial Aid. A drop or a course withdrawal, whether student-initiated or administrative, can affect financial-aid eligibility. When aid eligibility depends on minimum enrollment under Jacksonville University's Financial Aid policy, aid disbursement can be delayed until enrollment at the requisite level is verified and the drop/add period has passed. A student should meet with a representative from the Office of Financial Aid to understand how a specific schedule change may affect financial aid.

5.2. Adjusting the Course Sequence

5.2.1. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs may allow a J.D. student who has neither completed nor is currently registered in all of the 1L courses to enroll in elective courses under the following circumstances:

5.2.1.1. The adjustment is necessary for a student in accordance with applicable law (e.g., the Americans with Disabilities Act) or other Jacksonville University policy.

5.2.1.2. The adjustment is deemed necessary for a student with unique circumstances caused by the fact that the student has (a) transferred into the COL from another law school; (b) been granted permission to withdraw from one or more required courses in a prior semester; or (c) has another extenuating circumstance that requires adjustment to afford the student an opportunity to complete the course-of-study in a timely manner.

5.2.2. A student receiving an adjustment should complete the 1L courses as soon as feasible, which typically means the student should take any remaining 1L course the next fall or spring semester it is offered.

5.2.3. Any adjustment under this section E.5.2 must be in writing signed by the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and the student.

5.2.4. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

5.3. LAW 708. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs may require certain students to complete LAW 708. The Associate Dean's determination that a student must complete this course is final.

6. NON-J.D. STUDENTS

6.1. A student not enrolled in the J.D. program may register for LAW courses only with the advance permission of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and if there is space available after J.D. students have had adequate opportunity to enroll.

F. Grading Policies

F. GRADING POLICIES

1. CLASS RANK

1.1. A 1L student is given a numerical rank after the second semester. Ranks are updated at the conclusion of every fall and spring semester thereafter.

1.2. A student's rank is based on the student's expected graduation date. It is generally presumed that full-time students will graduate after 3 academic years. A student may modify the expected graduation date in accordance with procedures developed by the Registrar.

1.3. Additional provisions applicable to transfer students are found in section D.3.4 (Class Rank for Transfer Students).

2. DEAN'S LIST

2.1. The names of J.D. students who complete at least 10 credit hours in COL courses graded on the 4.0 scale and achieve a semester GPA of 3.25 or higher will be recorded on the COL Dean's List.

2.2. Any J.D. student who receives a grade of WX will not be listed on the Dean's List regardless of the student's GPA for the semester in which the grade of WX is earned.

2.3. Any J.D. student who receives a grade of I in any course in a semester will not be listed on the Dean's List, regardless of the student's GPA for the semester in which the grade of I is earned.

2.4. A student is not eligible for Dean's List retroactively.

3. GRADUATION WITH HONORS

3.1. A student graduates with Latin honors by earning the required cumulative GPA for credit hours earned at the COL: summa cum laude (3.75 or higher); magna cum laude (3.6 to 3.74); cum laude (3.25 to 3.59).

4. GRADE NORMALIZATION

4.1. Application. Except as modified in this section F.4, COL courses subject to the 4.0 Scale will be graded based on an average (mean) between 2.70 and 3.10.

4.2. Recalculation. Any grades submitted by a course instructor that do not conform to this policy will be returned to the course instructor with instructions to recalculate the grades. If the instructor does not recalculate grades in accordance with this policy before the grading deadline, the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs will adjust (i.e., recurve) the original grades to conform to this policy.

4.3. Certain Electives. Elective courses that are subject to the 4.0 Scale will be graded based on an average (mean) grade between 2.70 and 3.35 if

4.3.1. The course has a scheduled maximum enrollment of 20 or fewer students;

4.3.2. The course has 20 or fewer students at the end of the add/drop period; or

4.3.3. The course satisfies an experiential learning or advanced writing requirement.

4.4. Excluded Grades. The averages (means) described in this section F.4 will be calculated after excluding any grades of 0.67 or below.

4.5. Deviations. For good cause, a faculty member may request express approval from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to deviate from this policy. Such approval must be obtained in writing. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

5. GRADING SCALE AND GRADE POINT AVERAGE

5.1. Unit of Credit. The unit of credit at the COL is the semester hour. Credits may be earned in the regular fall and spring semesters, in the winter and summer terms, or in short courses offered at other times.

5.2. Grading Scales

5.2.1. Scale Selection: A student's academic achievement in COL courses is graded on either the 4.0 Scale or the Pass/Fail Scale. Unless approved by the course instructor and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to be graded on the Pass/Fail Scale, all courses are graded on the 4.0 Scale.

5.2.3. Pass/Fail Scale

S (Satisfactory). A student who earns a grade of S is considered to have earned at least a 2.0 on the Jacksonville University 4.0 Scale or a grade of C on other schools' grading scales.

S- (Satisfactory Minus)

U (Unsatisfactory)

5.2.4. Grades Applicable to Both Scales

I (Incomplete)

W (Withdrew)

WX (Excessive Absences or Failure to Complete Required Work)

5.3. Grade Point Average. A student's grade point average for any given period is determined by dividing the total quality points earned by the number of graded semester hours attempted during the period, excluding courses for which a grade of W, WX, or I is awarded.

5.4. Failing Grades

5.4.1. Effect of a Failing Grade

5.4.1.1. If a student earns a grade of F in any course, the course is considered attempted but not completed and must be repeated before credit will be awarded.

5.4.1.2. If a student earns a failing grade (0.0) in a required course, the student must repeat the course no later than the next time it is regularly scheduled. A student does not have the right to require that the course be offered any earlier than the next time that the course is regularly scheduled.

5.4.1.3. If a student repeats a course, the failing grade remains on the student's permanent record. Both the failing grade and the grade earned when the course is repeated are computed into the grade point average. See § II.F.5.3 (Grade Point Average).

5.4.2. Two-Semester Sequence Courses

5.4.2.1. If a student earns a failing grade in the first semester of a two-semester sequence course (e.g., Civil Procedure I and Civil Procedure II), the student may not enroll in the second-semester course until the student passes the first-semester course.

5.4.2.2. The student may enroll in upper-level courses, even if the course in which the failing grade was earned is identified in the course catalog as a prerequisite.

5.4.3. In any required course, a course instructor may not assign a failing grade (0.0) to more than 5% of the students without the express approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

5.5. Grade of Incomplete

5.5.1. A course instructor will record a grade of I when a student fails to complete work for the course and the course instructor grants the student an extension to complete the work to a date that does not allow the course instructor adequate time to submit a grade for that student by the grade submission deadline.

5.5.2. The grade of I will be changed to a grade on the 4.0 scale or the Pass/Fail scale, as applicable for the course, by the course instructor when the student satisfactorily completes the requirements for the course.

5.5.3. Unless the course instructor sends written notice to the Registrar, a grade of I will be converted to a grade of WX at the earlier of the grading deadline for the next regular semester or the date of the student's graduation; such a grade of WX cannot then be converted to a grade on the 4.0 or Pass/Fail grade scales.

5.6. Grade of WX

5.6.1. A student who receives a grade of WX for a course will not receive credit toward graduation for those course hours.

5.6.2. A student who receives a grade of WX in a course is not entitled to any tuition refund relating to that course.

5.6.3. A student who receives a grade of WX in a required course must repeat the course no later than the next time it is regularly scheduled. A student does not have the right to require that the course be offered any earlier than the next time that the course is regularly scheduled.

6. GRADE CHANGES

6.1. Final grades shall not be changed, except for good cause. If good cause is shown, the Academic Standards Committee may change a grade only after consultation with the course instructor(s) and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and/or the Registrar, as appropriate.

6.2. A student or course instructor requesting a grade change must submit the request to the Academic Standards Committee within 45 calendar days of the beginning of the fall or spring semester following the semester or term in which the grade was assigned.

6.3. If the grade change request pertains to a course in which any member of the Academic Standards Committee was the course instructor, then that committee member shall be recused and the remainder of the Committee shall have the authority to make the grade change in accordance with this policy.

6.4. The Academic Standards Committee's decision is final.

6.5. This policy does not affect the authority of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs under the Grade Normalization Policy. See § II.F.4 (Grade Normalization).

7. ACADEMIC GOOD STANDING

7.1. A student at the COL who achieves and maintains a cumulative GPA of 2.3 or higher is considered to be in Academic Good Standing.

7.2. A student who fails to achieve or maintain this GPA is not in Academic Good Standing, cannot participate in extra- or co-curriculars, and may have other restrictions imposed as part of the conditions of Academic Probation.

G. Examination Policies

G. EXAMINATION POLICIES

1. GENERAL EXAMINATION POLICIES

1.1. Exam Procedures. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs will provide students, course instructors, and exam proctors with Exam Procedures at the beginning of each academic year. These procedures will provide details on the final exam schedule, guidance for use of exam software, and limitations and guidance for students and proctors before, during, and after an exam. A student who violates these procedures may be subject to penalty under the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct.

1.2. Failure to Take Exam as Scheduled. A student who fails to attend an in-person examination as scheduled or who submits an online or take-home examination late will receive a grade of 0.0 on the examination unless (a) in the case of a take-home examination, the course instructor has expressly stated in the special exam instructions a different consequence for a late exam; (b) the student is granted relief pursuant to the Grade Change Policy, see § II.F.6 (Grade Change); or (c) the student is granted relief pursuant to the Severe Examination Distress Policy, see § II.G.2 (Severe Examination Distress). The Grade Change Policy considers situations involving the grading process; the Severe Examination Distress Policy considers circumstances that cause severe distress shortly before or during the administration of an examination.

1.3. Late Arrival

1.3.1. A student who arrives late for an in-person examination may elect not to take the examination and seek relief pursuant to the Severe Examination Distress Policy. See § II.G.2 (Severe Examination Distress).

1.3.2. Alternatively, the student may proceed to take the examination with the time remaining for that examination. If the student elects to proceed with the examination, the student will not be given additional time to compensate for lateness. The student's examination will be provided to the course instructor without an indication that the student arrived late or had less time to complete the examination, and the student will be awarded the grade assigned by the course instructor. See § II.F (Grading Policies).

1.4. Open-Book Examinations. Any open-book examination must clearly state that it is an open book exam in directions that appear before any substantive exam material (e.g., questions or prompts). The extent to which materials may be brought into the examination room and used must be clearly and precisely stated in the same manner.

1.5. Exam Technology. Each COL student must have regular access to a laptop that meets both the University's technology requirement and the requirements for running the most updated version of Exemplify, an ExamSoft product, which students are required to use for COL exams; the technology requirements for running the most updated version of Exemplify may exceed the minimum University requirements.

1.6. Formative and Summative Assessments. In all required courses, course instructors will provide formative and summative assessments appropriate to the course. 1L courses (other than LRRW I and II) must include a final examination conducted during the scheduled final exam period for the term in which the course is scheduled.

2. SEVERE EXAMINATION DISTRESS

2.1. Expectation. A student is expected to make all efforts to take all examinations as scheduled.

2.2. Purpose. In fairness to a student who experiences severe distress and to protect the integrity of the COL's assessment system, the COL has developed this policy regarding severe distress.

2.3. Application

2.3.1. This policy applies to final examinations and graded midterm examinations.

2.3.2. For other graded assignments, such as oral arguments and presentations, the provisions in the course syllabus will control.

2.3.3. If the syllabus is silent, then the policies and procedures below may be used as guidelines to address the situation, but are not binding on the course instructor.

2.4. Determining Severe Distress

2.4.1. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs will determine whether a student is experiencing severe distress and whether some form of accommodation regarding the examination is warranted.

2.4.2. Examples of severe distress include issues relating to the health of the student or a close family member, death of a close family member, or other issues judged by the Associate Dean to be sufficiently extraordinary.

2.4.3. The Associate Dean may seek outside advice and may require documentation of a medical condition asserted by a student seeking relief under this policy.

2.4.4. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

2.5. Procedure

2.5.1. If a student seeks an accommodation for severe distress before or during the examination, the student should immediately notify the proctor or the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

2.5.2. If a student seeks an accommodation for severe distress after the time scheduled for the examination, the student normally should notify the Associate Dean within 24 hours of the scheduled time for the examination.

2.5.3. To help preserve anonymity, a student seeking an accommodation under this policy should avoid communicating with the course instructor.

2.6. Possible Accommodations. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs may accommodate severe distress in any manner deemed appropriate to the situation. Accommodations may include but are not limited to

2.6.1. Giving the student additional time to complete the examination, either in the designated examination room or elsewhere.

2.6.2. Allowing the student to take the exam at a later time (this option is available only for a student who has not already started the examination or seen the examination), keeping in mind the COL's grading deadlines.

2.6.3. Requesting that the course instructor provide an alternative final examination; in this case, the student should be made aware that the examination might be graded without anonymity.

2.6.4. Allowing the student to take a grade of I in the course and retake the examination with the same course instructor, if practicable, within the next 2 semesters. This option is most practicable for one-semester required courses. See § II.F.5.5 (Grade of Incomplete).

2.6.5. Allowing a student to withdraw from the course. If the course is a required course, see § II.A.1.1.2, the student must repeat the course no later than the next time it is regularly scheduled. A student does not have the right to require that the course be offered any earlier than the next time that the course is regularly scheduled.

2.7. Student Failure or Refusal to Follow the Decision. If a student seeking an accommodation under this policy refuses to follow the decision of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs or fails to complete the option selected, the student will receive a 0.0 (for courses graded on the 4.0 Scale) or U (for courses graded on the Pass/Fail Scale) for that course.

2.8. Impact on Other Students. If a distressed student disrupts the examination room, the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs may extend the time of the examination for all students in the room. The Associate Dean may report the general circumstances of the extension to the course instructor whose examination was being taken. If one or more other students reasonably assist the distressed student and thus lose time on the examination, the Associate Dean, as a matter of equity, may extend the time of the examination for those students so they receive the benefit of the full time period designated by the course instructor.

H. Leave of Absence and Withdrawal

H. LEAVE OF ABSENCE AND WITHDRAWAL POLICIES

1. GENERAL

1.1. Purpose. The COL understands that a student may need to leave school for some period of time. This part H provides policies under which a student may leave and return to the COL.

1.2. Effect of Leave

1.2.1. A student on a leave of absence is not enrolled in classes during the semester(s) in which the student is on leave.

1.2.2. A student on a leave of absence continues to be considered a student at the COL.

1.3. Types of Leave

1.3.1. Voluntary Leave of Absence: A voluntary leave of absence is a leave (other than a military leave of absence) requested by a student. See § II.H.2 (Voluntary and Military Leave).

1.3.2. Military Leave of Absence: A military leave of absence is a leave that a student requests to fulfill military or other national-defense service obligations. See § II.H.2 (Voluntary and Military Leave).

1.3.3. College-Initiated Leave of Absence: A college-initiated leave of absence is a leave that the COL requires that a student take due to a potential threat to the safety or welfare of the student or other members of the COL community. A student who is placed on college-initiated leave will not be permitted to attend classes or to be on COL or University property without prior written permission from the Dean or the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. See § II.H.3 (College-Initiative Leave).

1.4. Withdrawal

1.4.1. As used in this part H, withdrawal means dropping all academic credits in a fall or spring semester or in a summer term in which the student has been required to enroll.

1.4.2. A student who has withdrawn from the COL is no longer considered a student at the COL.

1.4.3. Withdrawal from just a portion of the credits in a semester or term is addressed in section E.4 (Adding, Dropping, and Withdrawing from Courses).

1.5. Administrative Withdrawal

1.5.1. As used in this part H, administrative withdrawal means action taken by the COL or the University, on its own initiative, to withdraw a student from one or more academic credits in a given semester.

1.5.2. A student who has been administratively withdrawn from all COL academic credits in a given semester or summer term in which the student has been required to enroll is no longer considered a student at the COL.

1.6. Amendment to Application Upon Return. If the circumstances of leave or withdrawal require that a student returning to school or petitioning for readmission to amend the student's application to the COL, the student must provide this required information to the Associate Dean of Students at the same time as the student provides notice of intent to return to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, the Associate Dean of Students, or the Academic Standards Committee, as applicable.

1.7. Conduct or Honor Code Proceedings. If a student is approved for leave or withdraws when an investigation or proceeding under the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct is pending, the Division of Student Affairs, the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, or the Dean must place a memo in the student's file in the Registrar's Office outlining the charges and the status of the proceedings. In the case of a leave, proceedings may be held in abeyance pending return. Proceedings may also continue even after a student takes leave or withdraws. See § III.D.12.

1.8. Transcript Notations

1.8.1. Leave of Absence: If, after the first day of class in a semester in which the student is enrolled, a student is granted a voluntary or military leave of absence or placed on a college-initiated leave of absence that is not successfully appealed, the student will receive a grade of WX in each course in which the student is currently enrolled. The transcript will also contain the notation "Leave of Absence."

1.8.2. Withdrawal: A student who withdraws after the first day of a semester in which the student is enrolled will receive grades of WX on the student's transcript. The transcript also will contain the notation "Withdrew." However, if the student withdraws after having taken any examinations or having completed any other graded assessment, a grade (based on the work completed in that course to date) will be posted on the student's transcript. Such a grade may be converted to WX only if a petition is submitted to and granted by the Academic Standards Committee.

1.9. Modifying Procedures. Procedures for the various types of leave are detailed in this part H. While each contemplates that the student is available to submit the necessary paperwork and secure the needed signatures to approve leave, the COL recognizes that extenuating circumstances may exist where the student is not on campus or is otherwise unavailable to complete any required actions in person. In such circumstances, and with the approval of the Dean or the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, the Registrar may adopt alternate procedures when necessary to process leave requests.

2. VOLUNTARY AND MILITARY LEAVE

2.1. Eligibility and Circumstances Warranting Leave

2.1.1. Voluntary Leave of Absence

2.1.1.1. A student may apply for a voluntary leave of absence.

2.1.1.2. The COL will grant a voluntary leave only for good cause.

2.1.1.3. When leave is for the sustained illness of a student and the student is incapacitated, leave details will be coordinated with the student's next of kin or another person who has been designated through legal process as responsible for the student's affairs.

2.1.1.4. International students are advised that taking a voluntary leave of absence may affect their student visa status; they should consult with the Registrar's Office before seeking leave.

2.1.2. Military Leave of Absence

2.1.2.1. A military leave of absence is available for a student who is called or ordered to active-duty service—whether voluntary or involuntary and including such service by a member of the National Guard or Reserve—in the United States Armed Forces for more than 30 days.

2.1.2.2. For periods of less than 30 days, a student should contact the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to determine whether a military leave of absence is necessary or if appropriate accommodations can be made.

2.1.3. Length of Leave

2.1.3.1. To be eligible for a voluntary or military leave of absence, the student must intend to return to the COL within the granted leave period, which typically should not exceed 1 calendar year.

2.1.3.2. All leave requests will be considered unless the request conflicts with Time to Earn Degree Requirement. See § II.A.4 (Time to Earn Degree).

2.1.4. Common Causes of Ineligibility

2.1.4.1. A student who is being investigated for a violation of the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, or the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct typically will not be eligible for a leave of absence. See § II.H.1.7 (Conduct or Honor Code Proceedings).

2.1.4.2. Unless a student is called to active military service, a request for a leave of absence typically will not be considered during the last week of classes or the reading and examination periods.

2.2. Application for Leave

2.2.1. A student seeking a voluntary or military leave of absence must initiate the process by completing and submitting to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs the Leave of Absence Form, which is available through the myJU portal.

2.2.2. The form must be signed by the student and must set forth the circumstances necessitating a leave and the length of the requested leave. If the request is for military leave, the student should also submit a copy of the military orders calling the student to service.

2.2.3. The student must meet with and obtain the signatures of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and representatives from the Office of Financial Aid and the Controller's Office. These signatures are necessary to prove that the student has fulfilled all outstanding financial and other obligations to the University.

2.2.4. Once the student has completed the above steps, the student must return the completed form to the Registrar's Office.

2.2.5. A leave request is not complete until the completed Leave of Absence Form is returned to the Registrar's Office.

2.3. Decision on Application

2.3.1. The Associate Dean for Academic Affairs may grant the request—with or without conditions—or deny the request. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

2.3.2. If the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs grants the request, the Registrar will respond in writing and set forth the period of the approved leave and any conditions associated with the leave. A copy of this approval letter will be placed in the student's file in the Registrar's Office with copies to the Office of Financial Aid and Controller's Office.

2.3.3. If the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs denies the request, the student is expected to complete the semester. A student in Academic Good Standing may also choose to withdraw. See §§ II.F.7 (Academic Good Standing), II.H.4 (Withdrawal from the College).

2.4. Return to School

2.4.1. At least 4 weeks before the start of the semester in which a student on a leave of absence plans to return to school, or when otherwise requested, the student must submit a letter to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs indicating the intent to return.

2.4.2. If special conditions were attached to the leave, the student must demonstrate compliance with those conditions in the letter and provide accompanying documentation where needed.

2.4.3. A student who fails to submit a letter, does not satisfy the special conditions, or goes beyond the time of the granted leave will not be able to return automatically and must petition the Academic Standards Committee for readmission and is subject to administrative withdrawal.

2.4.4. The Associate Dean or the Academic Standards Committee may require additional documents to verify that the student has met all stated conditions of the leave and is ready and able to return to school.

2.4.5. If the leave was a military leave, the Associate Dean or the Committee may require documents relating to the student's service or military discharge type in support of the request for readmission.

2.5. Timing of Return

2.5.1. Except when otherwise required by regulations governing the return of service members to school, a student on a voluntary or military leave of absence who does not return to the COL within 24 months of the beginning of the leave is subject to administrative withdrawal, risks losing all credits already earned, and may be required to reapply for admission as a new student.

2.5.2. For good cause, the Academic Standards Committee may readmit a student who has been out of school for more than 24 months. The Academic Standards Committee shall review the transcript of any readmitted student who has been out of school for more than 24 months and allowed to return without reapplying as a new student to determine what credits, if any, will be counted toward credit-based graduation requirements and what credits, if any, cannot be used to meet credit-based graduation requirements.

2.5.3. Unless granted an exception by the Academic Standards Committee, a student must complete all degree requirements within 72 months, counting all periods of leave or withdrawal. See § II.A.4 (Time to Earn Degree).

2.6. Matriculation at Another School

2.6.1. If the leave petition is granted, the student may not enroll as a degree candidate at another institution.

2.6.2. If a student enrolls as a degree candidate at another school, the leave of absence will be converted to a withdrawal.

2.6.3. A student may enroll as a nondegree seeking student at another institution only with the permission of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

2.7. Tuition and Fees

2.7.1. Normal rules regarding tuition refunds as stated in Jacksonville University's Student Financial Services policies typically will apply if the student is granted a voluntary or military leave of absence after the start of the semester.

2.7.2. A student with a scholarship should refer to the conditions contained in the scholarship notification for details on the impact of leave on the scholarship.

2.7.3. A student granted a voluntary leave of absence for medical reasons or other extraordinary and compelling circumstances or a student granted a military leave of absence may appeal to the Tuition Appeals Committee via the process outlined in Jacksonville University's procedures.

2.8. Financial Aid Impact. For purposes of financial aid under Title IV, a voluntary or military leave of absence is treated as a withdrawal under Title IV. A student taking a voluntary or military leave of absence should contact the Office of Financial Aid for details on the return of funds.

2.9. Petition to Receive Course Credit with Military Leave

2.9.1. If the student requesting a military leave of absence due to being recalled to military or other national-defense service has attended at least 70% of the classes in a particular law course, the student may petition the Academic Standards Committee to grant course credit. If a student is in the first 30 credit hours of the J.D. program, there is a presumption against granting credit in courses in which the sole or primary grade is based on a final examination.

2.9.2. To pursue this option, the student should prepare a written memorandum to the Academic Standards Committee and submit it to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. The memorandum should contain at least the following information: (a) a brief statement that the student has been called to military or other national-defense service; (b) a list of courses for which the student is seeking credit; (c) a statement regarding how many class sessions the student has attended in each course, stated in terms of days and a percentage of overall class sessions in the course; (d) a list of assignments, if any, completed in the course, along with any grades the student has received to date; and (e) request for relief (e.g., to receive a grade of S in a course, to receive a specific grade on the 4.0 Scale based on work performed to date, the option to take an incomplete in a course, and any other relief the student would like the Committee to consider).

2.9.3. Upon receiving a petition seeking course credit, the Academic Standards Committee will review the petition and seek input and recommendations from the student's course instructor(s) and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. The Committee may award a grade on the Pass/Fail Scale in a graded or non-graded course, a specific grade of the 4.0 Scale based on work already completed in the course, a grade of I, or any other relief deemed equitable. The Committee may also deny the petition. If the petition is granted, tuition and fee refunds— if any — will be based on the amount of credit awarded for the semester. For example, if a full-time student is awarded course credit for 10 or more credit hours, the student will not receive a tuition or fee refund. If the Committee awards less than 10 hours of credit for a full-time student, the student will receive a pro-rata tuition and fee refund.

2.10. Petition to Graduate with Military Leave. A student called to service within 4 weeks of the student's graduation date may petition the Law Faculty to be allowed to graduate on time. The petition should be submitted to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, who will then present the petition to voting members of the Law Faculty.

3. COLLEGE-INITIATED LEAVE

3.1. Circumstances Warranting Leave. The COL reserves the right to initiate a mandatory leave of absence when a student presents an immediate danger to self or others by threatening and/or inflicting bodily harm to self or to others or when a student's behavior is likely result in bodily or other substantial harm to self or others.

3.2. Initial Decision

3.2.1. The Dean or the Associate Dean of Students will make the final decision regarding whether a student will be placed on a college-initiated leave of absence after consulting with other appropriate campus officials.

3.2.2. The student will be notified about the decision immediately and in writing and will be given an opportunity to address concerns with the Dean or Associate Dean.

3.2.3. The decision will include any mandatory conditions that the student must satisfy before receiving permission to return to school other than under the appeal process.

3.3. Appeal of College-Initiated Leave of Absence

3.3.1. After the COL initiates a mandatory leave, the student, within 3 school days, may initiate an appeal in writing to the Associate Dean of Students. Any appeal should include an evaluation by a licensed physician, psychiatrist, or mental health clinician.

3.3.2. The Associate Dean of Students and/or the Dean will review the appeal and determine whether the student should be permitted to return to classes and University property.

3.3.3. The COL reserves the right to request, at its own expense, a second opinion of the student's fitness and suitability for return.

3.4. Return to School Other Than Under Appeal Process

3.4.1. When a student has not appealed a decision placing the student on a college-initiated leave of absence or when an appeal has been denied, a student who is ready to resume studies at the COL must notify the Associate Dean of Students in writing of the intent to return at least 4 weeks before the start of the semester in which the student wishes to return.

3.4.2. Before being allowed to return, the student must submit a comprehensive written report from each licensed physician, psychiatrist, or mental health clinician that has treated the student since the beginning of the mandatory leave for conditions related to the reason for the mandatory leave. The report must include the professional's diagnosis, treatment (including duration and response), medication, recommendations for return to the COL (including any restrictions), and necessary follow-up care; access to the student's medical information will be limited to the Dean, the Associate Dean of Students, and any other academic officers deemed necessary by the Dean. These materials must be submitted at least 4 weeks before the start of the semester in which the student wishes to return.

3.4.3. The COL reserves the right to request, at its own expense, a second opinion of the student's fitness and suitability for return.

3.4.4. The Associate Dean of Students will consult with the Dean to determine whether the student may return.

3.4.5. The decision of the Associate Dean of Students is final except that a student denied permission to return may appeal to the Dean, but only on the basis of additional information that was not considered in the original decision. The Dean's decision in such a case is final.

3.5. Timing of Return

3.5.1. A student on a college-initiated leave of absence who does not return to the COL within 24 months of the beginning of the leave of absence is subject to administrative withdrawal, risks losing all credits already earned, and may be required to reapply for admission as a new student.

3.5.2. For good cause, the Academic Standards Committee may readmit a student who has been out of school for more than 24 months. The Academic Standards Committee shall review the transcript of any readmitted student who has been out of school for more than 24 months and allowed to return without reapplying as a new student to determine what credits, if any, will be counted toward credit-based graduation requirements and what credits, if any, cannot be used to meet credit-based graduation requirements.

3.5.3. Unless granted an exception by the Academic Standards Committee, a student must complete all degree requirements within 72 months, counting all periods of leave or withdrawal. See § II.A.4 (Time to Earn Degree).

3.6. Relationship to Other COL Policies. This policy does not supersede or release a student from accountability under the COL Honor Code, the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity Policy, the Jacksonville University Code of Conduct, or other policies of the COL. See § II.H.1.7 (Conduct or Honor Code Proceedings).

3.7. Tuition and Fees

3.7.1. Normal rules regarding tuition refunds as stated in Jacksonville University's Student Financial Services policies typically will apply if the student is placed on a college-initiated leave of absence after the start of the semester.

3.7.2. A student with a scholarship should refer to the conditions contained in the scholarship notification for details on the impact of leave on the scholarship.

3.7.3. A student placed on a college-initiated leave of absence may appeal to the Tuition Appeals Committee via the process outlined in Jacksonville University's procedures.

3.8. Financial Aid Impact. A student who is on a college-initiated leave of absence retains in-institution status for Title IV loan repayment purposes until either the appeal period has passed or, in the case of an appeal, the appeal is resolved. See § II.H.3.3 (Appeal of College-Initiated Leave of Absence). When a student retains in-institution status, no impact on financial aid occurs. If the student does not appeal a college-initiated leave or if an appeal is denied and the student is not allowed to return in the semester in which the leave was initiated, the leave is treated as a withdrawal for Title IV purposes. A student placed on a college-initiated leave of absence should contact the Office of Financial Aid for details on the return of funds.

4. WITHDRAWAL FROM THE COLLEGE

4.1. Eligibility. A student in Academic Good Standing may withdraw from the COL at any time. See § II.F.7 (Academic Good Standing). A student who is not in Academic Good Standing will be treated according to the Academic Dismissal Policy. See § II.I.4 (Academic Dismissal).

4.2. Withdrawal Procedure

4.2.1. To withdraw from the COL, a student must complete the Withdrawal Form, which is available through the myJU portal.

4.2.2. The student must meet with and obtain the signatures of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and representatives from the Office of Financial Aid and the Controller's Office. These signatures are necessary to prove that the student has fulfilled all outstanding financial and other obligations to the University.

4.2.3. The student must then return the completed form to the Registrar's Office.

4.2.4. A withdrawal is not effective until the completed Withdrawal Form is returned to the Registrar's Office.

4.3. Petition for Readmission

4.3.1. A student who, after completing at least 1 full semester (including final examinations), withdraws under this section H.4 may petition the Academic Standards Committee for readmission.

4.3.2. To petition, the student must complete the Petition to Return Form, which is available from the Registrar, at least 4 weeks before the start of the semester for which the student seeks to return. The Registrar will present the completed petition at the next meeting of the Academic Standards Committee.

4.3.3. The Academic Standards Committee may grant, grant with conditions, or deny the petition for readmission. The Committee will use the standards outlined in the Readmissions Policy, see § II.I.5 (Readmission), and may require documents, such as a doctor's note, that reflect the student's readiness and ability to return to school.

4.4. Reapplication. A student who withdraws during the first semester must re-apply as a new student. Regular deadlines for admission, and all other admissions policies will apply. See § II.D (Admission Policies). Readmission is not automatic.

4.5. Timing of Return

4.5.1. A student who has withdrawn and does not return to the COL within 24 months of the withdrawal risks losing all credits already earned and may be required to reapply for admission as a new student.

4.5.2. For good cause and in accordance with section H.4.3 (Petition for Readmission), the Academic Standards Committee may readmit a student who has been out of school for more than 24 months. The Academic Standards Committee shall review the transcript of any readmitted student who has been out of school for more than 24 months and allowed to return without reapplying as a new student to determine what credits, if any, will be counted toward credit-based graduation requirements and what credits, if any, cannot be used to meet credit-based graduation requirements.

4.5.3. Unless granted an exception by the Academic Standards Committee, a student must complete all degree requirements within 72 months, counting all periods of leave or withdrawal. See § II.A.4 (Time to Earn Degree).

4.6. Tuition and Fees

4.6.1. Normal rules regarding tuition refunds as stated in Jacksonville University's Student Financial Services policies typically will apply if a student withdraws from the COL.

4.6.2. A student with a scholarship should refer to the conditions contained in the scholarship notification for details on the impact of leave on the scholarship.

4.6.3. A student can appeal to the Tuition Appeals Committee via the process outlined in Jacksonville University's procedures.

4.7. Withdrawal Without Notice. A student who stops attending school without notifying the COL or who fails to return after a leave of absence is subject to administrative withdrawal as of the last date of attendance and is no longer eligible for any course credit. See § II.H.5 (Administrative Withdrawal).

4.8. Financial Aid Impact. For purposes of financial aid under Title IV, a withdrawal, with or without notice, requires that a return of funds calculation be performed under Title IV. A student who withdraws or is withdrawn from the COL should contact the Office of Financial Aid for details on the return of funds.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE WITHDRAWAL

5.1. Notice. When a condition for administrative withdrawal is met, see §§ II.E.4.5 Administrative Course Withdrawal), II.H.1.5 (Administrative Withdrawal), II.H.4.7 (Withdrawal Without Notice), the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs shall notify the student in writing of the course(s) from which the student has been withdrawn and that the student has 5 business days to appeal the administrative withdrawal.

5.2. Continued Attendance. During the appeal time period, a student who has received notice of administrative withdrawal should continue attending classes.

5.3. Appeal

5.3.1. To appeal the withdrawal, the student should prepare a written description of the circumstances leading to the administrative withdrawal and a justification for overturning the decision.

5.3.2. The Academic Standards Committee shall determine whether to grant the appeal, deny the appeal, or request more information to fully evaluate the appeal. The Committee may consider any evidence of extenuating circumstances and steps the student took to remedy or prevent the situation.

5.3.3. The decision of the Academic Standard's Committee is final.

I. Academic Probation and Dismissals

I. ACADEMIC PROBATION, DISMISSAL, AND READMISSION POLICIES

1. STANDARDS

1.1. Dismissal and readmission decisions will comply with applicable standards and guidelines of the American Bar Association and the Association of American Law Schools.

2. ACADEMIC INTERVENTION

2.1. To promote academic success, all students ranked in the bottom third of their class following the spring semester of their 1L year are required to attend, during the succeeding fall semester, counseling sessions and/or workshops with the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep.

2.2. Failure to satisfactorily participate in the counseling sessions and/or workshops may result in an academic hold, which must be cleared by the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep prior to spring registration.

3. ACADEMIC PROBATION

3.1. Conditions for Probation. A student will be placed on Academic Probation under the following circumstances:

3.1.1. The student has failed to achieve a cumulative GPA above a 2.30 after attempting between 10 and 80 credit hours by the end of any semester or summer term.

3.1.2. The student has failed in any semester, after attempting at least 30 credits, to achieve a semester GPA of least 2.0, regardless of the student's cumulative GPA.

3.1.3. The student has failed in any semester, other than a summer session, to pass at least 50% of the credit hours attempted.

3.1.4. The student has received a grade of WX in 2 or more courses, whether earned in one semester or term or in different semesters or terms.

3.2. Notice. The Registrar will notify the student of the student's probationary status in writing after grades for that semester or term have been posted, but failure to receive notice does not affect the student's probationary status. Although this notice will be placed in the student's permanent file in the Registrar's office, the student's transcript will not contain a notation regarding the Academic Probation.

3.3. Academic Plan

3.3.1. A student placed on Academic Probation shall meet with the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep within 2 weeks of receiving notice from the Registrar or Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. For good cause, the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep may extend the time period in which this meeting must take place.

3.3.2. Within 2 weeks of the initial meeting, the student must develop an Academic Plan that is approved by the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. For good cause, the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep may extend by up to 2 weeks the time within which the student must obtain approval of the Academic Plan.

3.3.3. At minimum, the Academic Plan should address

3.3.3.1. The courses the student intends to take for the next 30 credit hours (depending on course offerings and sequencing);

3.3.3.2. Reflections and details about meetings had with all course instructors from whom the student took classes during the prior semester or term and at which the student reviewed the final exam or other assessment(s) as applicable;

3.3.3.3. A self-analysis of the student's academic strengths and weaknesses;

3.3.3.4. The student's proposed plan for co-curricular activities, extra-curricular activities, and outside employment; and

3.3.3.5. Specific steps the student will take during the current and following semesters to improve the student's academic performance.

3.3.4. Student Activities and Employment. A student on Academic Probation may not hold office in a COL or Jacksonville University campus student organization, participate in a co-curricular program, or be employed on- or off-campus except as described in the Academic Plan.

3.3.5. Time on Probation. A student who is placed on Academic Probation will remain in that status for the next semester.

3.3.6. Return to Academic Good Standing. A student on Academic Probation must achieve a cumulative GPA of 2.3 or higher at the end of the probationary semester to return to Academic Good Standing. See § II.F.7 (Academic Good Standing).

3.3.7. Academic Dismissal Following Probation

3.3.7.1. A student who fails to achieve a GPA of at least 2.3 at the end of the probationary semester will be academically dismissed from the COL.

3.3.7.2. The Registrar shall provide the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs with the grade report for students on Academic Probation as quickly as is practicable after all grades for the semester are posted.

3.3.7.3. If a student on Academic Probation has failed to achieve the required GPA at the end of the probationary semester, the Registrar will notify the student of the student's dismissal in writing after grades for that semester or term have been posted, but failure to receive notice does not affect the student's dismissal.

3.3.8. Readmission. Any student who is dismissed from the COL under this policy may seek readmission pursuant to the Readmission Policy. See § II.I.5 (Readmission).

3.3.9. Transfer Students. The Academic Probation Policy applies to transfer students. The credits considered will be those earned at the COL only.

4. ACADEMIC DISMISSAL

4.1. Conditions for Dismissal. A student will be academically dismissed and subject to the Readmission Policy, see § II.I.5 (Readmission), under the following circumstances:

4.1.1. The student has failed to achieve a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0.

4.1.2. The student has received a grade of WX in 2 consecutive semesters, or a consecutive semester and summer or winter term, regardless of the student's cumulative GPA.

4.1.3. The student has failed to make satisfactory progress under the terms of the Academic Probation Policy. See § II.I.3 (Academic Probation).

4.2. Transfer Students. The Academic Dismissal Policy applies to transfer students. For purposes of this section H.4, credit hours earned at another institution do count toward the total number of credit hours attempted, but are not included in the GPA calculation.

4.3. Attending Classes. A student who receives notice of dismissal while enrolled in a class and files a petition for readmission may attend classes and participate in student activities while the petition for readmission is pending. See § II.I.5 (Readmission).

4.4. Notice. The Registrar will notify the student of the student's dismissal in writing after grades for that semester or term have been posted, but failure to receive notice does not affect the student's dismissal.

5. READMISSION

5.1. Petition for Readmission

5.1.1. A student may petition for readmission following dismissal by submitting a written petition to the Academic Standards Committee.

5.1.2. The petition must be submitted no later than 5 calendar days following the mailing or transmission of the notice of academic dismissal. See § II.I.4.4 (Notice).

5.1.3. The petition must include information relevant to showing the student's capacity to complete the program of legal education and be admitted to the bar and a plan for academic improvement.

5.1.4. The petition may include any other information the student believes relevant to the Committee's decision.

5.2. Committee Review

5.2.1. The Academic Standards Committee shall deny the petition for readmission unless the evidence presented affirmatively shows that the dismissal does not indicate a lack of capacity to complete the program of legal education and be admitted to the bar.

5.2.2. Either the student or the Academic Standards Committee may request a meeting to discuss the readmission petition. If the student fails to attend a scheduled meeting with the Committee without providing prior notice to the Committee and having a compelling reason for missing the meeting, the student's petition for readmission may be denied.

5.3. Appeal

5.3.1. If the Academic Standards Committee denies a petition for readmission, the student may appeal the decision to the Dean with 7 calendar days of the date of notice of the Committee's decision.

5.3.2. Unless otherwise determined by the Dean, this appeal will be decided based on a review of the information considered by the Committee, without further submissions or appearances.

5.3.3. Upon reaching a decision on the appeal, the Dean will notify the petitioning student and the Committee of the decision.

5.3.4. The Dean's decision is final.

6. SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

6.1. Requirements. Federal law requires that institutions of higher education monitor the academic progress of students who receive federal financial aid. In order to remain eligible for federal, state and institutional financial aid (including scholarships), students must comply with COL standards for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP).

6.2. Timing. All COL students will be evaluated annually at the end of the spring semester.

6.3. Minimum GPA. A COL student must have a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 (or a higher GPA if required by the Academic Probation Policy). See § II.I.3 (Academic Probation).

6.4. Minimum Pace. A student must have successfully completed at least 66.67% of the credit hours attempted.

6.5. Minimum Timeframe. A student may not have attempted more than 150% of the credit hours required by his or her degree program.

6.6. Failure to Meet SAP Requirements. A student who does not meet SAP requirements during the annual review is placed on Financial Aid Suspension and is not eligible to receive financial aid without successful appeal. Should the student not wish to appeal, the student must meet SAP requirements before aid eligibility can be re-established.

6.7. Appeal

6.7.1. An appeal process is available for the student who experienced personal injury or illness, death of a relative, or other circumstances that affect the ability to meet SAP.

6.7.2. A student who wishes to appeal must download the appeal form and submit the form with supplemental documentation to the Jacksonville University Student Financial Services Office. An Appeal Committee will consider the SAP appeal and provide a response within 3 weeks. Financial aid will only be awarded if an appeal is approved. The deadline to submit an appeal is 30 days before the beginning of the semester for which the student wishes to receive aid. Appeals will be reviewed as they are received; appeals received after the deadline will be reviewed as quickly as possible.

6.7.3. A student whose appeal is approved will be allowed to receive financial aid for a probationary semester provided the student completes an Academic Plan as provided in the Academic Probation Policy and the plan is approved by the Associate Dean for Student Success & Bar Prep. See § II.I.3.3 (Academic Plan).

6.7.4. At the completion of the probationary semester, the student whose appeal was approved will be reviewed for SAP. If the student has met the requirements of the student's Academic Plan, the student will remain eligible for financial aid. If the student is still not meeting SAP or the requirements of the student's Academic Plan, the student will be placed on Financial Aid Suspension and will be ineligible for financial aid. The student may appeal Financial Aid Suspension following the procedures described above in this subsection I.6.7.

6.8. Scholarships. All COL scholarships are conditioned upon continued SAP. A student who does not maintain SAP is no longer eligible for a scholarship award and will no longer continue to receive any scholarship award.

J. Student Employment

J. STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

1. RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1. The J.D. program at the COL is a full-time program. No student should be employed for remuneration in excess of what is compatible with a full-time commitment to the study of law.

1.2. The COL strongly recommends that first-year law students not engage in any employment during the academic year, other than over breaks of 1 week or more, in order to have sufficient time to focus on the rigors of the 1L curriculum.

1.3. The COL recommends that second- and third-year law students not be employed for more than 20 hours per week during the academic year.

2. NOTICE OF EMPLOYMENT

2.1. Any student who is employed for any number of hours, whether on or off campus, must notify the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs of the employer(s) and the number of hours to be worked.

2.2. A student whose employment changes must update the Associate Dean.

2.3. The Associate Dean may advise the student on any potential risks to a student's academic success posed by the planned employment.

2.4. Violation of this policy may result in disciplinary action, an inability to work on the Jacksonville University campus, and/or a report to the Character and Fitness Committee of the Board of Bar Examiners (or the equivalent body in any other jurisdiction where a student seeks admission to the bar).

3. FIRST-YEAR STUDENTS

3.1. Restriction on Employment

3.1.1. A 1L student may not work more than 20 total hours in any week.

3.1.2. A 1L student may not exceed 20 total hours per week, even if the student has more than one employer for each of whom the student works less than 20 hours.

3.1.3. This restriction applies to employment on and off campus and applies to any type of employment for which a student receives remuneration.

3.1.4. This restriction does not apply to periods when classes are not in session, such as breaks between semesters or a summer session when a student is not enrolled in classes.

3.2. Petition for Exception. The COL recognizes that there are situations in which a 1L student may need to seek employment beyond 20 hours a week. In these instances, the student should notify the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and request an exception. For good cause and in the absence of academic or other concerns, the Associate Dean may grant the request. The Associate Dean's decision is final.

4. ON-CAMPUS EMPLOYMENT

4.1. On-campus employment by the COL is always limited to 20 hours per week unless advance approval is obtained from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

3. The Law Faculty may invite, at a time of its choosing, the SBA executive committee to attend a regularly scheduled meeting of the Law Faculty and report on any matter that may be relevant to the faculty's determination of an issue.

A. Introduction and Statement of Principles

A. INTRODUCTION AND STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

1. SCOPE

1.1. Legal education, like the practice of law, demands adherence to high standards of ethical conduct, trustworthiness, and honesty. The Faculty of the College of Law has therefore created this Honor Code, which binds all students enrolled in classes at the College of Law.

1.2. This Code applies to all Academic Programs, extracurricular activities and other activities associated with the College of Law.

1.3. This Code is the primary set of rules governing academic integrity and discipline within the College of Law. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between this Honor Code and any University-level codes or rules, the provisions of this Honor Code shall take precedence.

1.4. This Code is subject to revision by the Faculty of the College of Law. Any questions or disputes regarding the Code outside the context of the disciplinary procedures outlined below should be directed to the Director of Academic Integrity for referral to the Law Faculty for resolution.

2. PRINCIPLES

2.1. In addition to the specific substance and procedure detailed below, this Code embodies the following principles:

2.1.1. The purpose of this Code is to ensure fairness to students, promote honesty and justice, and protect the academic integrity of the College of Law. Ambiguities in the Code should be interpreted so as to best achieve and balance those goals.

2.1.2. Students must at all times conduct themselves with honesty and integrity in connection to their academic activities.

2.1.3. Students must at all times refrain from conduct involving dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation.

2.1.4. This Code does not answer every question or respond to every situation that may arise in an academic community. It should not be construed as authorizing dishonest conduct not specifically forbidden.

2.1.5. A student who has a question concerning appropriate conduct should consult the course instructor, the supervising faculty member, or the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs for guidance before taking any action.

3. DISCLAIMER. This Code does not form an agreement of any kind and may be altered, modified, or rescinded at any time at the sole discretion of the Faculty of the College of Law of Jacksonville University.

4. DEFINITIONS. Definitions applicable to this volume III (The Honor Code of the Jacksonville University College of Law) of the Student Handbook found in part F (Definitions).

B. Standards of Conduct

B. STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

1. IN GENERAL

1.1. Acknowledgment. Every student, upon matriculation, shall sign a document acknowledging receipt of this Honor Code and agreement with its terms.

1.2. Violations. Conduct set forth in this part B constitutes a violation of the Honor Code. Those adjudged to have committed such conduct shall be subject to sanctions. See § III.D.10 (Available Sanctions and Guidelines).

1.3. Conduct Prohibited Without Authorization. A student is prohibited from engaging in the conduct detailed in this part B unless explicitly authorized by the course instructor or supervising faculty member.

2. ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

2.1. In General. A student shall not engage in any conduct which constitutes academic dishonesty. The provisions in this part B establish guidelines and provide examples of academic dishonesty, but that list is not exhaustive. Students are therefore on notice that the Law Faculty may determine that other conduct is included in the term, when committed with the intent to mislead, to advance one's own prospects without basis, or to damage the prospects of another. Such conduct is subject to sanction even if not specifically described below.

2.2. Prohibited Collaboration or Consultation. A student shall not collaborate or consult with another person or source in the course of work on an exam or graded assignment without express authorization from the course instructor or other person in a supervisory role.

2.2.1. If a course instructor or supervising faculty member has authorized a student to collaborate or consult with another person or source, the student shall not exceed that authority.

2.2.2. If a student wishes to collaborate or consult with another person or source in circumstances to which the authority does not plainly extend, the student shall first consult with the course instructor or other person in a supervisory role and request permission to collaborate after full disclosure of the circumstances in which collaboration or consultation will occur.

2.2.3. When seeking help from a course instructor, supervising faculty member, staff, another student, or any other person, a student shall clearly indicate if the request or question is related to an exam or graded assignment.

2.3. Prohibited Use of Materials or Resources. A student shall not use unauthorized materials or resources in any academic activity. Unless explicitly stated otherwise by the course instructor or supervising faculty member, unauthorized materials or resources shall include:

2.3.1. Any materials or resources prepared by another student and used without the creating student's express consent.

2.3.2. Any materials or resources prepared by any form of generative artificial intelligence, if used in the course of an examination or graded assignment.

2.3.3. Any materials or resources which the course instructor or supervising faculty member has notified the student in writing are prohibited.

2.3.4. Any materials or resources, digital or physical, to which the student does not have authorized access.

2.3.5. If the course instructor or supervising faculty member has authorized a student to use specified materials or resources, the student shall not exceed that authority. If the student wishes to use any material or resource to which the authority does not plainly extend, the student shall first ascertain whether the use is authorized.

2.4. Plagiarism. A student shall not represent all or any portion of the work of another as the student's own work, unless explicitly authorized to do so by the course instructor or supervising faculty member. Plagiarism includes but is not limited to

2.4.1. Quoting oral or written materials, whether published or unpublished, without proper attribution.

2.4.2. Submitting a document or assignment which in whole or in part is identical or substantially identical to a document or assignment not authored by the student, including but not limited to works purchased or otherwise obtained from an outside source. Outside sources include (but are not limited to) commercial vendors of research papers, files of research papers or tests maintained by a student organization or other body or person, or any other source of papers or of academic work that was authored or prepared by a person other than the student who submits it.

2.4.3. Submitting a document or assignment which in whole or in part results from the use of generative artificial intelligence.

2.4.4. Self-plagiarism, i.e. submitting work for satisfaction of an academic requirement when the student has previously submitted the same or substantially similar work for a different academic requirement.

2.5. False or Misleading Statements. A student shall not make, nor cause to be made, a false or misleading statement, including but not limited to

2.5.1. A student shall not intentionally make a false or misleading statement or omission for the purpose of procuring from the person to whom the statement is made an academic advantage for any student.

2.5.2. In reporting an alleged Honor Code violation, a student shall not intentionally make a false or misleading statement or omission.

2.5.3. During the course of an Honor Code proceeding, a student shall not at any stage make a false or misleading statement or omission to any person charged with investigating or adjudicating the guilt of the accused, or determining or reviewing the appropriateness of the sanction or sanctions to be recommended or imposed.

2.5.4. A student shall not use or present invented or fabricated information, or false or falsified research or other findings if the student knows or in the exercise of ordinary care should be aware that the information, research, or other findings are false or have been falsified.

2.6. Interference with Academic Activity. A student shall not do any act or take any material for the purpose of interfering with or sabotaging an academic activity. Interference includes but is not limited to

2.6.1. Removing, concealing, damaging, destroying, or stealing materials, or resources, as for example from a library, which are necessary or helpful to complete or to perform the academic activity.

2.6.2. Tampering with another student's work, or with the work of a member of the Law Faculty or administration for the purpose of gaining an improper academic advantage.

2.6.3. Stealing, tampering with, or taking from another student materials or resources, physical or digital, for the purpose of interfering with any student's successful completion or performance of academic activity.

2.6.4. Accessing documents, files, accounts, digital resources, systems, computers, or devices belonging to a member of the law school community without authorization.

2.6.5. Taking or receiving materials or resources from a faculty member for the purpose of gaining an improper academic advantage.

2.7. Unauthorized Recordings. A student shall not make or receive any recording (including audio, video, or still images) of any class, co-curricular meeting, organizational meeting, or meeting with a faculty member or staff, without authorization from the relevant faculty member, staff, or the College of Law. Nor shall a student disseminate any such recording to any person or group without express authorization from the relevant faculty member, staff, or the College of Law.

2.8. Bribery. A student shall not offer, give, receive, or solicit a bribe of money, materials, goods, or services for the purpose of procuring or providing an academic advantage.

3. OTHER PROHIBITED CONDUCT

3.1. Criminal Acts. A student shall not commit any act which violates any local, state, or federal law in effect at the time and place of the conduct in question and which reflects adversely on the student's honesty, trustworthiness, or fitness for admission to the practice of law.

3.1.1. Acts may be considered violations of this Code prior to or in the absence of arrest or conviction by any relevant legal authority.

3.1.2. A student who is arrested for, charged with, or convicted of (including entry of a plea other than not guilty) any offense must report that information to the College of Law within 72 hours of the incident.

3.2. Interference with Disciplinary Procedures. Interference with disciplinary procedures related to this Code is prohibited, including but not limited to

3.2.1. Concealment or destruction of any relevant evidence.

3.2.2. Knowingly providing false or misleading reports of alleged misconduct.

3.2.3. Providing false or misleading statements or testimony related to a matter under investigation or in a disciplinary hearing.

3.2.4. Interference with or disruption of any disciplinary record or proceeding.

3.3. Refusal to Provide Information. If a student refuses to provide information relevant to proceedings under this Code to the Associate Dean, to an appointed investigator, or to the Honor Council, appropriate inferences may be drawn from the student's refusal. Any such refusal must be made openly and clearly, and any attempt to otherwise conceal relevant or requested information shall constitute interference with disciplinary procedures.

3.4. Reporting. A student who becomes aware of a potential violation of the Honor Code is required to make a report to the Associate Dean of Students or the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. Failure to do so is a violation of this Honor Code.

C. Honor Council

C. HONOR COUNCIL

1. DEFINITION. The Honor Council is a standing committee of members of the College of Law community with duties related to this Code.

2. COMPOSITION

2.1. The Honor Council shall be made up of at least 5 full-time members of the Law Faculty.

2.2. The Law Faculty or the Dean of the College of Law shall select membership of the Honor Council and specify one member of the Honor Council as Chair. A vote of the Honor Council is not required for the Chair to take actions specifically delegated to the Chair under this Code, though the Chair should consult with the Honor Council as appropriate and inform the Honor Council of any actions taken.

2.3. Members of the Council shall serve for two years. Members may serve any number of consecutive terms, except that no member may serve as Chair for more than two (2) consecutive years.

2.4. Upon petition, the Law Faculty shall consider representation of staff and/or students on the Honor Council. However, full-time faculty must always constitute a majority of the Honor Council, and only full-time faculty may serve as Chair of the Honor Council.

3. DUTIES

3.1. In addition to duties detailed elsewhere in this Code, the Honor Council shall meet regularly to discuss honor and disciplinary matters, resolve disputes related to this Code or proceedings under it, and to consider revisions to this Code.

3.2. Revisions to this Code should be drafted and proposed by the Honor Council, for consideration and vote by the full Law Faculty. Only the Law Faculty, not the Honor Council, may amend or revise this Code.

3.3. The Chair of the Honor Council shall report regularly to the Dean and to the Law Faculty regarding honor and disciplinary matters.

3.4. The Chair of the Honor Council shall regularly communicate with College of Law and/or University counsel, and with University-level disciplinary bodies.

D. Adjudicatory and Disciplinary Procedures

D. ADJUDICATORY AND DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

1. IN GENERAL

1.1. Purpose. To establish a process for reporting, investigating, and adjudicating charges of violations of academic integrity rules and policies, and for making determinations as to the appropriate disciplinary action(s) to take against a student found to have violated such rules and policies.

1.2. Applicability. These procedures shall apply to students matriculated at or taking courses at the College of Law.

1.3. Overview of Process. Generally, potential violations of this Code shall be reported to the Associate Dean. The Associate Dean will typically appoint an independent Investigator, who will prepare a report with relevant factual findings. The Chair of the Honor Council will then appoint a three-judge Hearing Panel that will conduct an adjudicatory and, if necessary, sanctions hearing. At the hearing(s), the Hearing Panel and accused student will present witnesses and evidence, and the Hearing Panel will adjudicate whether a violation has occurred and what punishment (if any) is appropriate.

2. REPORTING. Potential violations of this Code shall be reported in writing to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. See § III.B.3.4 (Reporting).

3. INITIAL DETERMINATION OF POSSIBLE VIOLATION

3.1. Upon receipt of a report of a potential violation, the Associate Dean shall assess the report and determine whether the allegations, if true, could plausibly constitute a violation of the Code.

3.2. In the event that the Associate Dean determines that the allegations, if true, would not plausibly constitute a violation of the Code:

3.2.1. No further action under this Code is necessary. The Associate Dean should provide notice of such a finding to the Chair of the Honor Council, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and the reporter of the potential violation. The Associate Dean has discretion to provide similar notice to the accused student(s). A report of a potential violation of the Code dismissed at this stage shall not be considered an accusation and shall not be recorded in a student's permanent file.

3.2.2. If the Associate Dean determines that the allegations, if true, do not warrant further action under this Code but could plausibly constitute a violation of the University Code of Conduct, any state or federal law, or any other code of conduct binding on the student, the Associate Dean shall refer the matter to the University Division of Student Affairs, law enforcement, or other appropriate enforcement body.

3.3. In the event that the Associate Dean determines that the allegations, if true, could plausibly constitute a violation of the Code, the Associate Dean shall refer the matter for investigation. See § III.D.4 (Investigation). Once so referred, the reported potential violation shall be referred to as an alleged violation of the Code.

4. INVESTIGATION

4.1. Upon determination that a plausible violation of the Code has been reported, the Associate Dean shall appoint an Investigator. Upon appointment of an Investigator, Notice shall be provided to the accused student(s). See § III.D.5 (Notice of Alleged Violation).

4.2. Appointment and Removal

4.2.1. Only full-time members of the Law Faculty or staff with at least 3 years of employment in higher education and 1 full year of employment at the College of Law may be appointed as investigators. Faculty or staff of any rank or tenure/tenure-track status may be appointed. In exceptional circumstances, University faculty outside the College of Law may be appointed.

4.2.2. The Associate Dean may not appoint as Investigator any faculty member or staff involved in the alleged conduct, any faculty member supervising the course or activity in which the alleged conduct occurred, or any other person with a substantial conflict of interest.

4.2.3. The Associate Dean may remove an Investigator from a matter at the Investigator's request, in the event of serious misconduct or dereliction of duty by the Investigator, or in the event that a conflict of interest or other disqualifying condition becomes apparent. The Associate Dean shall immediately report any removal of an Investigator under this provision to the Law Faculty and appoint a new Investigator.

4.2.4. Associate Dean as Investigator

4.2.4.1. The Associate Dean may serve as Investigator for minor alleged violations of the Code.

4.2.4.2. Suspension or Separation shall not be imposed on a student found to be in violation of the Code if the Associate Dean acted as sole Investigator. See § III.D.10.1 (Allowable Sanctions).

4.2.4.3. If, in the course of the investigation described in this section D.4.2.4, the Associate Dean determines that a violation possibly warranting more serious sanction may have been committed, the Associate Dean may appoint an independent investigator as provided for in this section D.4.

4.2.4.4. Note that some minor violations of this Code, if admitted by the accused student, may be resolved administratively by the Associate Dean without referral to the Honor Council for Hearing. See § III.D.6 (Disposition of Admitted Violations).

4.3. Duties and Authority

4.3.1. The Investigator is a neutral party, representing neither the College of Law nor the accused student(s).

4.3.2. The Investigator's duties include (a) interview of the accused student(s), the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and any witnesses; (b) review of relevant documents or other physical evidence; (c) and preparation of a report detailing the results of the investigation. If a Hearing Panel is convened to adjudicate whether a violation of this Code has occurred, the Investigator will generally be required to summarize the report at the Hearing and provide other relevant testimony.

4.3.3. The Investigator may interview any person, including the accused student(s), and review any documents or other physical evidence that the Investigator believes may assist in determining facts relevant to the alleged violation or potential violations. The Investigator may record interviews or provide a contemporaneous written summary to be included in the case file.

4.3.4. If an accused student, witness, or other party refuses to answer an Investigator's request for information, in part or in full, the Investigator shall include details of that refusal in the report described in sections D.4.3.5 and may draw whatever inference the Investigator deems appropriate from the refusal. See § III.D.3.3 (Refusal to Provide Information).

4.3.5. The Investigator shall prepare a written Investigator's report and submit it to the Associate Dean within 14 days of appointment. Reasonable extensions to this time may be granted by the Associate Dean.

4.3.6. The Investigator's report shall identify, with specificity, any facts that—if true—could plausibly constitute a violation of the Code and candidly describe the Investigator's degree of confidence in those findings. The report should be accompanied with a case file including any relevant documents, testimony, or other evidence. In the report the Investigator may (but need not) offer the Investigator's view on whether any violations of the Code have occurred, but the focus of the report should be its factual findings.

4.3.7. The factual findings and legal conclusions, if any, in the Investigator's report are not binding on the Hearing Panel or other decisionmaker.

5. NOTICE OF ALLEGED VIOLATION

5.1. Upon appointment of an Investigator, a Notice of the Charges shall be delivered to the accused student by the Director of Academic Integrity by email to the student's University email account.

5.2. The Notice shall contain the following information:

5.2.1. A statement of any charge(s) against the student, sufficiently specific as to give the student notice of the nature of the allegations against the student, including a description of the factual allegations, and the identification of each Honor Code rule or principle that the student is alleged to have violated;

5.2.2. The possible penalties for the alleged violation(s);

5.2.3. A statement of the student's rights during the disciplinary process, and an opportunity for a meeting with the Associate Dean for counsel on the process and the student's rights;

5.2.4. The name of the appointed Investigator;

5.2.5. The consequences of accepting responsibility for the alleged misconduct;

5.2.6. A written recommendation to seek the advice of legal counsel regarding the implications of proceedings under this Code for determination of character and fitness to practice law;

5.2.7. A notice that retaliation or any form of intimidation against the complainant and potential witnesses is prohibited; and

5.2.8. A copy of these procedures.

6. DISPOSITION OF ADMITTED VIOLATIONS

6.1. An accused student may, at any time, admit to a violation of the Code by written statement to the Associate Dean or the Investigator. The matter will then proceed as provided in this Section. The Associate Dean and Hearing Panel may consider the student's admission as a mitigating factor in determining appropriate disciplinary sanctions.

6.2. If an accused student has admitted a violation of this Code, the Associate Dean may resolve the matter and impose a sanction without referral for hearing, if the requirements of this section D.6 have been met.

6.3. The only available sanction under this section D.6 is written reprimand, to be provided to the student and maintained in the student's record. If, in the determination of the Associate Dean, any punishment other than written reprimand is merited, if all of the criteria in this section D.6 are not met, or if the Associate Dean deems a hearing appropriate for any other reason, the Associate Dean shall refer the violation for sanctions hearing. See § III.D.9 (Sanctions Hearings).

6.4. The Associate Dean may dispose of violations under this section D.6 only if ALL of the following are true:

6.4.1. The alleged violation has been admitted by the student;

6.4.2. The alleged violation is not related to a graded assignment;

6.4.3. The accused student has not previously received any disciplinary sanction under this Code; and

6.4.4. The Associate Dean has received and reviewed the Investigator's report regarding the alleged violation.

7. DISPOSITION OF CONTESTED ALLEGATIONS

7.1. Definition. Any allegation determined by the Associate Dean to be a plausible violation of this Code and not admitted by the student is considered to be a contested allegation.

7.2. Disposition by the Associate Dean.

7.2.1. Upon receipt of the Investigator's report regarding a contested allegation, the Associate Dean shall determine, based on the report, whether there is a reasonable possibility that a violation of the Code has occurred. In making this determination, the Associate Dean may consult with the Honor Council.

7.2.2. If the Associate Dean determines that the information in the Investigator's Report, if true, would not constitute a violation of this Code, the Associate Dean shall recommend closure of the matter to the Honor Council.

7.2.3. If the Associate Dean determines that the information provided in the Investigator's Report, if true, could constitute a violation of this Code, but that there is no reasonable possibility that a violation can be proven by clear and convincing evidence, the Associate Dean shall recommend closure of the matter to the Honor Council.

7.2.4. If the Associate Dean determines that there is a reasonable possibility that a violation of the Code has occurred and can be proven by clear and convincing evidence, the Associate Dean shall refer the matter to the Honor Council for hearing.

7.2.5. The Associate Dean shall notify the accused student, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and the Chair of the Honor Council, in writing, of any decision under this section D.7.2.

7.3. Disposition by the Honor Council. Upon referral of an allegation from the Associate Dean, the Honor Council shall proceed as follows:

7.3.1. If the Associate Dean has referred a matter for hearing under sections D.6.3 or D.7.2.4, the Honor Council shall proceed with a hearing. See §§ III.D.8 (Adjudicatory Hearings), III.D.9 (Sanctions Hearings).

7.3.2. If the Associate Dean has recommended that an allegation be closed under section D.3, D.6, or D.7, the Honor Council may, by $\frac{2}{3}$ supermajority vote, override that recommendation and conduct a hearing as provided in section D.8 below. If the Honor Council does not override the Associate Dean's recommendation within 10 days, the matter shall be considered closed.

8. ADJUDICATORY HEARINGS

8.1. In General

8.1.1. The purpose of adjudicatory hearings is to determine whether any violations of this Code have occurred and to determine appropriate sanctions.

8.1.2. Hearings are conducted before a three-judge Hearing Panel constituted by the Honor Council.

8.1.3. Decisions made by the Hearing Panel are final with respect to all matters under this Code, subject only to the provisions regarding appeal. See § III.D.11 (Appeals).

8.2. Constitution of Hearing Panel

8.2.1. Upon referral of a matter for hearing from the Associate Dean, the Chair of the Honor Council shall select a Hearing Panel.

8.2.2. The Hearing Panel shall be composed of three full-time members of the Jacksonville University faculty. One member of the Hearing Panel shall be designated as Chief Judge.

8.2.3. Members of the Hearing Panel must have at least 3 years of service in higher education and, absent extenuating circumstances, at least 1 year of service with the College of Law.

8.2.4. Faculty members of the Honor Council are eligible to serve on Hearing Panels, but membership of the Honor Council is not a requirement.

8.2.5. The Dean, Associate Dean, Investigator of the matter being adjudicated, and any faculty member with any conflict of interest, whose impartiality may reasonably be questioned, or who may be a witness in the proceeding are not eligible to serve on the Hearing Panel.

8.3. Pre-Hearing Procedures

8.3.1. Upon referral of a matter for hearing, the Investigator shall provide the Hearing Panel with a copy of the Investigator's report and case file.

8.3.2. Scheduling

8.3.2.1. The Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel shall set a date and time for the hearing.

8.3.2.2. The hearing date shall be no less than 14 and no more than 45 days after the date notice of the hearing is given to the accused student unless required by § D.8.3.2.3.

8.3.2.3. Hearings may not be scheduled between the last class of a semester and the end of that semester's exam period or at any other time the Chair of the Honor Council determines would be disruptive to student learning.

8.3.3. Notice

- 8.3.3.1. Once a Hearing Panel has been constituted, the Chief Judge shall provide written notice of the hearing to the accused student, the Associate Dean, the Investigator, and the course instructor or supervising faculty member, in writing.
- 8.3.3.2. Notice shall include:
- 8.3.3.2.1. A statement that the purpose of the hearing is to adjudicate whether a violation of this Code has occurred, to determine appropriate sanction, if any, and that the hearing is the student's opportunity to defend against the allegations;
- 8.3.3.2.2. The place, date, and time of the hearing;
- 8.3.3.2.3. A list of the members of the Hearing Panel;
- 8.3.3.2.4. A copy of this Honor Code, including these procedures and the student's rights as detailed in section D.8.4;
- 8.3.3.2.5. A copy of the Investigator's report; and
- 8.3.3.2.6. The list of possible witnesses the Hearing Panel intends to call and copies of relevant documents or other evidence the Hearing Panel intends to introduce.
- 8.4. Rights of Accused Student at Hearings. An accused student shall have the following rights at or regarding hearings under this Code:
- 8.4.1. Recusal
- 8.4.1.1. An accused student has the right to request recusal of any member(s) of the Hearing Panel whom the accused student believes to be unable to serve with impartiality.
- 8.4.1.2. To exercise this right, the accused student must request recusal by notifying the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel in writing no more than 3 days after receipt of notice of the hearing.
- 8.4.1.3. The accused student must show good cause why the member(s) should be removed from service on the Hearing Panel.
- 8.4.2. Advisor
- 8.4.2.1. An accused student has the right to be accompanied by another Jacksonville University student acting as an Advisor.
- 8.4.2.2. Witnesses, members of the Honor Council, or any other person involved in the hearing or with a material conflict of interest may not serve as an Advisor.
- 8.4.2.3. An Advisor may support and assist the accused student during the hearing, but may not provide testimony, call or question witnesses, present evidence, or speak on the student's behalf during the hearing.
- 8.4.2.4. To exercise this right, the accused student must notify the Chief Judge in writing of the accused student's intention to have an Advisor present at the hearing no less than 3 days before the scheduled hearing date.
- 8.4.2.5. Should the accused student fail to provide notice as required, the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel may delay the hearing or refuse to allow any person selected by the accused student as an Advisor to be present at the hearing.
- 8.4.2.6. There is no right to legal counsel at hearings under this Code, and this subsection shall not be construed to provide such a right.
- 8.4.3. Witnesses and Evidence
- 8.4.3.1. An accused student has the right to call and question witnesses and to introduce documentary and other non-testimonial evidence.
- 8.4.3.2. To exercise this right, the accused student must provide the Chair with a written list of intended witnesses and evidence no less than 3 days before the scheduled hearing date.
- 8.4.3.3. The Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel may deny the request to call any witness or introduce any evidence for which timely notice was not properly given.
- 8.4.4. Decisions by the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel on any motion or request by an accused student under this section D.8.4 are final and are not subject to appeal.
- 8.5. Rules Of Evidence, Confidentiality, and Order
- 8.5.1. All hearings shall be confidential and closed to persons other than members of the Hearing Panel, the Investigator, the Associate Dean, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, the witnesses during the presentation of their testimony, the accused student, and any Advisor, unless an open hearing was properly requested by the accused student.
- 8.5.2. In the event that an accused student does not appear at the appointed time and place for the hearing, the Hearing Panel may elect to hear the matter in absentia.
- 8.5.3. The members of the Hearing Panel may hear any oral testimony or review documentary or other non-testimonial evidence that is relevant and material, including evidence that would be considered inadmissible under the Florida Evidence Code or the Federal Rules of Evidence.
- 8.5.4. Oral testimony of all witnesses shall be under oath or upon affirmation.
- 8.5.5. The Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel may exclude evidence that is cumulative or repetitious.
- 8.5.6. The Chief Judge may delay the hearing or exclude from the hearing any witnesses or documents not identified prior to the hearing if the Chief Judge determines that the lack of prior notice would unfairly prejudice either the accused student or the Investigator.
- 8.5.7. The Chief Judge may take any necessary measures to maintain order and decorum during a hearing, including the removal of any persons acting in a disruptive manner. Nothing in this section D.8 shall be construed to diminish that authority to maintain order and decorum.
- 8.6. Hearing Procedure. The hearing shall be conducted according to the following procedure:
- 8.6.1. Upon convening the hearing at the scheduled time and place, the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel shall formally call the hearing to order and issue a reminder that the proceedings are confidential, unless the accused student has properly exercised the right to an open hearing.
- 8.6.2. At the discretion of the Chief Judge, a written or transcribed record of the proceedings may also be prepared. Any such records of the hearing shall remain permanently confidential. No person other than the Chief Judge (or designee) may make an audio or video recording of the Hearing.
- 8.6.3. All persons present shall identify themselves.
- 8.6.4. The Chief Judge shall state the charges, summarize the Investigator's report, and make other opening remarks as appropriate.
- 8.6.5. The accused student may then make an opening statement. An accused student's decision to waive an opening statement shall not give rise to adverse inferences.
- 8.6.6. The judges on the Hearing Panel may call and question witnesses, introduce documentary and non-testimony evidence, or ask the Investigator to discuss or summarize statements or evidence obtained during the investigation. After a judge questions a witness or refers to any evidence, the accused student may question the witness or provide a response to the evidence. The members of the Hearing Panel may inquire into topics and information not presented in the Investigator's report.

- 8.6.7. The accused student may call and question witnesses and refer to documentary and non-testimony evidence. After the accused student questions a witness or refers to any evidence, the Hearing Panel may question the witness or provide a response to the evidence.
- 8.6.8. The Hearing Panel may not call any witnesses or introduce any evidence that has not been pre-filed. See §§ III.D.8.3.3 (Notice), III.D.8.4.3 (Witnesses and Evidence). The accused student may not call any witnesses or introduce any evidence that has not been pre-filed, unless specific leave to do so is granted by the Chief Judge.
- 8.6.9. After all evidence has been presented, the Chief Judge shall declare the evidentiary phase of the hearing closed and may make a statement.
- 8.6.10. The accused student may make a closing statement. The decision to waive a closing statement shall not give rise to adverse inferences.
- 8.6.11. After all testimony is complete, the Chief Judge shall declare proceedings closed and clear the hearing room of anyone other than members of the Hearing Panel.
- 8.7. Adjudication by the Hearing Panel
- 8.7.1. Following the closure of proceedings, the members of the Hearing Panel shall deliberate in private to determine whether the accused student violated the Code.
- 8.7.2. Determinations by the Hearing Panel must be based on the testimony and materials provided at the hearing, including the Investigator's report and presented documentary evidence, taken as a whole.
- 8.7.3. The Hearing Panel shall determine that the accused student has violated the Code only if so established by clear and convincing evidence.
- 8.7.4. A unanimous vote of all three judges on the Hearing Panel is required to determine that the accused student has violated the Code. If a student is accused of multiple violations, the Hearing Panel may determine that the accused student has committed all, some, or none of the alleged violations.
- 8.7.5. Past allegations against the accused student, past violations of this Code, or violations of other University rules and codes of conduct may not be considered by the Hearing Panel when adjudicating whether a violation has occurred.
- 8.7.6. The Hearing Panel may conclude that the accused student's conduct before or during the investigation and hearing proceedings violated the Code, even if the relevant facts were not specifically identified in the Investigator's report.
- 8.7.7. The Hearing Panel is not bound by the Investigator's factual findings and may reach different conclusions.
- 8.7.8. The Hearing Panel is not bound by any determinations by the Investigator, Associate Dean, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, or any other person that the accused student did, or did not, violate the Code.
- 8.8. Post-Hearing Procedure
- 8.8.1. If the Hearing Panel determines that a violation has not been proven by clear and convincing evidence:
- 8.8.1.1. The Chief Judge shall reconvene the hearing, announce the determination, dismiss the allegation(s), and close the proceedings.
- 8.8.1.2. The Chief Judge (or designee) shall prepare a written memorandum containing findings of fact and dismissing the allegation(s).
- 8.8.1.3. The Chief Judge shall promptly send a copy of the memorandum to the accused student, the Investigator, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and the Associate Dean.
- 8.8.1.4. A copy of the memorandum, clearly indicating the dismissal of the allegation, shall be maintained in the accused student's permanent record.
- 8.8.2. If the Hearing Panel has determined that a violation has been proven by clear and convincing evidence, the Chief Judge shall reconvene the hearing for a sanctions proceeding. See § III.D.9 (Sanctions Hearings).
- 8.8.3. Regardless of its determinations under this Code, if the Hearing Panel determines that the accused student's conduct could plausibly constitute a violation of the University Code of Conduct, any state or federal law, or any other code of conduct binding on the student, the Chief Judge shall refer the matter to the University Division of Student Affairs, law enforcement, or other appropriate enforcement body.
9. SANCTIONS HEARINGS
- 9.1. In General
- 9.1.1. The purpose of a sanctions hearing is to determine appropriate sanctions for violations of this Code which a Hearing Panel has determined to have occurred in an adjudicatory hearing, or which have been admitted by an accused student, in light of relevant aggravating and mitigating evidence.
- 9.1.2. Sanctions imposed under this Section D.9 are distinct and independent from any sanctions a course instructor or supervising faculty member may impose in the context of a course, and shall not be interpreted to limit instructor's discretion or academic freedom to conduct courses and assign grades.
- 9.1.3. Sanctions hearings are conducted before a three-judge Hearing Panel constituted by the Honor Council.
- 9.1.4. Decisions made by the Hearing Panel with regard to sanctions are by majority vote of the Panel and are final with respect to all matters under this Code, subject only to the provisions regarding appeal. See § III.D.11 (Appeals).
- 9.2. Panel
- 9.2.1. If the sanctions hearing follows an adjudicatory hearing, the Hearing Panel and Chief Judge for the sanctions hearing shall be the same as for the adjudicatory hearing.
- 9.2.2. If the sanctions hearing results from a referral of an admitted violation (and therefore no Hearing Panel exists prior to the sanctions hearing), the Chair of the Honor Council shall constitute a panel using the same procedures and qualifications as for adjudicatory hearings. See § III.D.8.2 (Constitution of Hearing Panel).
- 9.3. Time and Place
- 9.3.1. If the sanctions hearing follows an adjudicatory hearing, the sanctions hearing shall take place as soon as practical following the adjudicatory hearing.
- 9.3.2. If the sanctions hearing results from a referral of an admitted violation, the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel shall set a date and time for the hearing and provide notice to interested parties as for adjudicatory hearings. See § III.D.8.3 (Pre-Hearing Procedures).
- 9.4. Rights of Accused Student. An accused student shall have the same rights in sanctions hearings as those detailed for adjudicatory hearings. See § III.D.8.4 (Rights of Accused Student at Hearings).
- 9.5. Rules of Evidence, Confidentiality, and Order. The same rules of evidence, confidentiality, and order shall apply in sanctions hearings as detailed for adjudicatory hearings, see § III.D.8.5 (Rules of Evidence, Confidentiality, and Order), except that the Hearing Panel may consider an accused student's past violations of this Code or other past conduct when determining appropriate sanctions.
- 9.6. Hearing Procedure. The hearing shall be conducted according to the following procedure:
- 9.6.1. Upon convening the hearing at the scheduled time and place, the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel shall formally call the hearing to order and announce the provision(s) of the Code that the Hearing Panel found, by clear and convincing evidence, the accused student to have violated, and/or which the accused student has admitted violating.

9.6.2. The Chief Judge shall announce that the Hearing Panel will hear aggravating evidence and mitigating evidence, as defined in this Code, for the purposes of determining the appropriate sanction(s). See § III.F.1.16 (Mitigating and Aggravating Evidence).

9.6.3. Panel's Evidence

9.6.3.1. Members of the Hearing Panel shall present relevant evidence that, in their view, is aggravating or mitigating.

9.6.3.2. Members of the Hearing Panel may call and question witnesses, refer to documentary and non-testimony evidence, and provide statements or documents obtained during the investigation. Members of the Hearing Panel may inquire into topics and information not presented by the Investigator or the accused student.

9.6.3.3. After the Hearing Panel questions a witness or refers to any evidence, the accused student may question the witness or provide a response to the evidence.

9.6.4. Accused Student's Evidence

9.6.4.1. After the members of the Hearing Panel have presented evidence, the accused student may present evidence that, in the student's view, is aggravating or mitigating.

9.6.4.2. The accused student may call and question witnesses, refer to documentary and non-testimony evidence, and provide statements or documents obtained during the investigation

9.6.4.3. After the accused student questions a witness or refers to any evidence, members of the Hearing Panel may also question the witness or provide a response to the evidence.

9.6.5. Closing Statements

9.6.5.1. After all evidence has been presented, the Chief Judge shall declare the evidentiary phase of the hearing closed and may make a closing statement.

9.6.5.2. The accused student may then make a closing statement. The student's decision not to make a closing statement shall not give rise to adverse inferences.

9.6.6. After all testimony is complete, the Chief Judge shall declare public proceedings closed and clear the hearing room of anyone other than members of the Hearing Panel.

9.7. Imposition of Sanctions by Hearing Panel

9.7.1. The members of the Hearing Panel shall deliberate in private to determine appropriate sanction(s).

9.7.2. The sanction(s) to be imposed shall be determined by a majority of the Hearing Panel.

9.7.3. Details and guidelines for sanctions are presented in section D.10. No sanction other than those listed there may be imposed by the Hearing Panel.

9.8. Post-Hearing Procedure

9.8.1. After the Hearing Panel has determined what sanction is appropriate, the Chief Judge shall reconvene the hearing and announce the determination of sanctions.

9.8.2. The Chief Judge or designee shall then prepare a written memorandum containing findings of fact and conclusions that such findings establish by clear and convincing evidence that the accused student's conduct constituted a violation or violations of the Code and identifying the sanction(s) to be imposed.

9.8.3. The Chair shall promptly send a copy of that memorandum to the accused student, Investigator, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and the Associate Dean.

9.8.4. A copy of the memorandum shall be maintained in the accused student's permanent record.

10. AVAILABLE SANCTIONS AND GUIDELINES

10.1. Allowable Sanctions. The following sanctions (or any combination thereof), listed in descending order of severity, may be imposed upon a student found to have violated the Code:

10.1.1. Separation from the College of Law, via rescission of acceptance, permanent expulsion, or revocation of degree;

10.1.2. Suspension from the College of Law for a period of at least one full semester;

10.1.3. Exclusion from all or specified extracurricular activities for a period of at least one full semester;

10.1.4. Restitution by the accused student of any damage caused by a violation of this Code to another student or the College of Law; and/or

10.1.5. Letter of Reprimand from the Chief Judge of the Hearing Panel, to be delivered to the accused student and included within the student's record at the College of Law.

10.2. Grades. The Hearing Panel may not impose a sanction altering or reducing a student's grade for a course. Grades are solely the discretion of course instructors, within College of Law rules. See § II.F (Grading Policies).

10.3. Guidelines. The following provisions provide guidance to Hearing Panels on appropriate sanctions. However, the imposition of sanctions is necessarily guided by specific facts and circumstances unique to each violation of this Code, prevailing norms in the College of Law community, and any aggravating or mitigating factors. Nothing in this section D.10.3 should be construed to limit the Hearing Panel's discretion.

10.3.1. If a student is found to have lied in connection with a Code investigation or hearing, the student shall presumptively be sanctioned by suspension or separation.

10.3.2. If a student is found to have committed a Code violation related to an exam or other coursework constituting a similarly substantial portion of the grade in the affected course or academic program, the student shall presumptively be sanctioned by suspension or separation.

10.3.3. If a student is found to have committed a Code violation unrelated to graded coursework and which has no or minimal effect on any other person, the student shall presumptively be sanctioned by letter of reprimand.

10.3.4. For violations of the Code not covered by the above guidelines, the Hearing Panel may determine the appropriate sanction, using the guidelines as reference for the view of the Law Faculty on sanctions appropriate in various circumstances.

10.3.5. The Hearing Panel may determine that no sanction is appropriate when, in the Hearing Panel's judgment, the violation is minor and/or mitigating evidence substantially outweighs any aggravating evidence. The Hearing Panel shall explain the basis for a decision not to impose sanctions in the written memorandum prepared under section D.9.8.

10.4. Explanation. The Hearing Panel shall explain the basis for the selection of appropriate sanctions, including any deviation from these guidelines in section D.10.3, in the written memorandum prepared under section D.9.8.

11. APPEALS

11.1. Right of Student Appeal. Decisions by the Associate Dean or Hearing Panel regarding whether a violation of this Code has occurred or regarding sanctions imposed may be appealed by the accused student to the Dean of the College of Law.

11.2. Double Jeopardy

11.2.1. Dismissal of allegations by the Associate Dean or Hearing Panel is final and not subject to appeal by the College of Law, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, or any other person.

11.2.2. No party may appeal seeking to impose sanctions greater than those imposed by the Associate Dean or Hearing Panel. The sole exception to this provision is the Honor Council's limited power to override the Associate Dean's recommendation that an alleged violation be dismissed under section D.7.3.2.

11.2.3. The Dean's powers to decide appeals under this provision may not be used to find that a violation has occurred despite the same violation having been dismissed by a Hearing Panel or to impose a greater sanction than the sanction imposed by a Hearing Panel.

11.2.4. If the Dean remands a matter back to a Hearing Panel under section D.11.4.3.2, the Hearing Panel may not find that a violation has occurred despite a prior decision dismissing the same violation by the Hearing Panel nor may the Hearing Panel impose a greater sanction than the sanction imposed prior to appeal.

11.3. Requests for Appeal

11.3.1. Notice of Appeal

11.3.1.1. A student appealing a decision rendered or sanction imposed under this Code must send a written Notice of Appeal to the Chair of the Honor Council not later than 10 business days after the written adjudicatory and sanctions memoranda are sent to the student.

11.3.1.2. The Notice of Appeal should set forth the specific ground or grounds of the appeal.

11.3.1.3. Copies of the Notice of Appeal shall be sent to the Investigator, the Associate Dean, and the course instructor or supervising faculty member.

11.3.2. Upon receipt of a proper Notice of Appeal, the Chair of the Honor Council shall notify the Dean of the College of Law of the pending appeal and forward the record of the matter in question to the Dean, including but not limited to memoranda from the Hearing Panel indicating the disposition of the matter and any written record or audio/video recording of the hearing(s).

11.4. Consideration of Appeal

11.4.1. After receipt of the Notice of Appeal and record, the Dean of the College of Law shall consider the appeal.

11.4.2. The Dean may decide the matter based on the written record alone or, on reasonable notice, may request an appearance by the accused student, the Investigator, witnesses, or any other person.

11.4.3. In resolving the appeal, the Dean may

11.4.3.1. Affirm the decisions of the Hearing Panel and/or Associate Dean;

11.4.3.2. Remand the matter to the Hearing Panel, with a clear statement of specific reasons for requiring further consideration of the merits, sanction, or both; or

11.4.3.3. Reverse or modify the decision of the Hearing Panel as to the merits, sanction, or both.

11.4.4. The Dean may affirm, remand, modify, or reverse a decision in part or in whole.

11.5. Written Opinion

11.5.1. Within a reasonable time, the Dean shall issue a written opinion resolving the appeal.

11.5.2. The Dean shall send a copy of the opinion resolving the appeal to the accused student the Investigator, the course instructor or supervising faculty member, and the Chair of the Honor Council.

11.5.3. If the Dean reverses or substantially modifies the decision of a Hearing Panel on appeal, the Dean shall notify the Law Faculty in writing or at the next faculty meeting.

11.6. Resolutions of appeals under this Code by the Dean are final and are not subject to requests for rehearing or further appeal.

12. VOLUNTARY WITHDRAWAL BY ACCUSED STUDENT

12.1. If an accused student voluntarily withdraws from the College of Law at any point between the report of an alleged violation of this Code and final determination by the Associate Dean or a Hearing Panel that a violation of this Code has occurred, all proceedings under this Code may be stayed. See § II.H.1.7 (Conduct or Honor Code Proceedings).

12.2. In such a case, a record of proceedings up to that point shall be placed in the accused student's file and noted on the student's transcript.

E. Disclosure and Disposition of Records

E. DISCLOSURE AND DISPOSITION OF RECORDS

1. DISPOSITION OF RECORDS

1.1. Allegations of misconduct under this Code, their disposition, and any sanctions imposed shall become part of the accused student's education file.

1.2. Records from disciplinary proceedings are retained permanently with the University's Academic Integrity Office within the Office of the Provost.

1.3. Records from disciplinary proceedings, including allegations, determinations, and sanctions, shall be reported by the student on bar admission applications that request such information or to any state or federal bar to which the College of Law becomes aware that a student has applied.

2. PUBLIC NOTIFICATION. The Chair of the Honor Council shall collect final memoranda from Hearing Panels, strip the memoranda of information identifying parties or witnesses, and, at least once annually, make the reports available to the students and faculty of the College of Law by public posting or distribution.

F. Definitions

F. DEFINITIONS

1. The following definitions apply to this volume III (The Jacksonville University College of Law Honor Code) of the Student Handbook.

1.1. Academic Program. "Academic Program" means any graduate or undergraduate course, independent study or research for academic credit, internship, externship, clinical program, practicum, field placement, or other form of study or work offered in furtherance of the academic mission of the College of Law, including extracurricular activity.

1.2. Academic Activity. "Academic activity" includes any work performed or assigned to be performed in connection with any Academic Program, including examinations, take-home tests, writing projects, assignments, or other work required for a course. This definition includes ungraded work as well as for which credit and/or grades are given.

1.3. Aggravating Evidence. See section F.1.16.

1.4. Alleged Violation. An “alleged violation” is alleged conduct that has been formally reported to the Associate Dean and which the Associate Dean has deemed that the allegations, if true, could plausibly constitute a violation of the Code.

1.5. Associate Dean. “Associate Dean” refers to the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs, unless otherwise specified. See § I(Disclaimers).

1.6. Chair. “Chair” means the Chair of the Honor Council of the Jacksonville University College of Law.

1.7. Chief Judge. “Chief Judge” means the Chief Judge of a Hearing Panel constituted to adjudicate whether a violation of this Code has occurred and/or to impose sanctions for such a violation.

1.8. Code. “Code” means the Jacksonville University College of Law Honor Code.

1.9. College of Law. “College of Law” means the Jacksonville University College of Law.”

1.10. Dean. “Dean” refers to the Dean of the College of Law, unless otherwise specified.

1.11. Extracurricular Activity. “Extracurricular activity” means any student-performed activity associated with the College of Law or Jacksonville University that is outside the scope of the normal school curriculum. Extracurricular Activity includes, but is not limited to, participation on Moot Court and Mock Trial teams, law journals, and other student organizations.

1.12. Hearing Panel. “Hearing Panel” means a three-judge body constituted to adjudicate whether a violation of this Code has occurred and/or to impose sanctions for such a violation. See §§ III.D.8.2 (Constitution of Hearing Panel), III.D.9.2 (Panel).

1.13. Honor Council. “Honor Council” refers to the Honor Council of the Jacksonville University College of Law. See §§ III.C.2 (Composition), III.C.3 (Duties).

1.14. In Writing. “In writing” shall include communication by electronic message to any person’s University e-mail account.

1.15. Knowingly. “Knowingly” means an individual has actual knowledge or constructive knowledge of the individual’s conduct and the surrounding circumstances. An individual has constructive knowledge when the individual should have known of the conduct and the surrounding circumstances. Ignorance of the Code or of instructions provided by the course instructor or supervising faculty member, in class or otherwise, is no excuse.

1.16. Mitigating and Aggravating Evidence

1.16.1. Mitigating Evidence: “Mitigating evidence” means extenuating facts or circumstances that, while not disproving a student’s violation of the Code, would reduce the student’s culpability for the acts that either a Hearing Panel has determined violated the Code or to which the student has admitted. Mitigating evidence may include, but is not limited to:

1.16.1.1. The extent of the student’s candor and cooperation during the investigation, violation hearing (if any), and sanctions hearing;

1.16.1.2. The extent to which the student has taken responsibility for the violation, including by self-reporting or admitting any violation;

1.16.1.3. The extent to which the student has taken steps to remedy or address the underlying issues that may have contributed to any violation; and

1.16.1.4. Evidence that the student’s ability to think rationally at the time of the violation(s) was reasonably impaired by serious personal circumstances. “Serious personal circumstances” do not include circumstances that apply to or may be experienced by a student in the normal course of law school, such as the inherent stress of Academic Programs or employment.

1.16.2. Ignorance: A student’s ignorance of the Code, of a course instructor’s or supervising faculty member’s rules relating to authorized and unauthorized materials and assistance, or of citation conventions of which a reasonable student would have been aware is not mitigating evidence.

1.16.3. Aggravating Evidence: “Aggravating evidence” means any facts or circumstances that increase the culpability of the conduct that either a Hearing Panel has determined violated the Code or to which the student has admitted. Aggravating evidence may include, but is not limited to:

1.16.3.1. The extent of the student’s premeditation;

1.16.3.2. The extent to which the student’s acts negatively impacted other individuals;

1.16.3.3. The extent to which the student’s acts presented a legitimate threat to the reputation or integrity of another student, individual, group, Academic Program, the College of Law, or any other institution, including a student’s employer;

1.16.3.4. The number and frequency of the student’s acts found to have violated the Code;

1.16.3.5. The student’s conduct during the investigation, violation hearing, and sanctions hearing, including lack of candor that would not constitute an independent Code violation; and

1.16.3.6. The student’s history of academic discipline, whether at the College of Law or another institution.

1.17. Potential Violation. A “potential violation” is alleged conduct that has been formally reported to the Associate Dean but as to which the Associate Dean has not yet deemed that the allegations, if true, could plausibly constitute a violation of the Code. Potential violations are not part of a student’s record and do not constitute alleged violations or accusations under this Code.

1.18. Student. “Student” means any person who has accepted admission to the College of Law, including former students of the College of Law. “Student” also includes any person enrolled in a course at the College of Law.

1.19. University. “University” means Jacksonville University.

Degree

Jacksonville University's Davis College of Business and Technology offers a **Doctorate of Business Administration*** ([DBA](#)) with optional concentrations in:

- Accounting and Finance
- Management
- Health Care Leadership
- Customized Concentration

** DBA classes are offered campus-based and online in a FLEX format. FLEX classes allow students to come to class, stream the class online or watch a recording of the class at a time of their choosing. This allows maximum flexibility. Students are expected to attend in person or synchronously online whenever possible, but recordings are available for conflicts. Asynchronous attendance of weekend classes (catching up from a recording) should be the exception, not the norm.*

Tracks

Students in the DBA program have a choice of tracks:

Academic Track : Students who want to work in academia may pursue the academic track. This track educates students on pedagogy and getting a job in academia. Students in this track complete a traditional or 3-paper dissertation. Students on the academic track have the opportunity to obtain a Post-Graduate Certificate in Business and Management Education from the University of Surrey.

Professional Track : Students who intend to stay in industry may pursue the professional track. This track may offer more exposure to consulting. Students in this track may decide to pursue the applied research project option, utilizing evidence-based practices, in lieu of a traditional dissertation. Students may bring in a project from a company with which they are affiliated, if they have support from company leadership. Students' dissertation format (traditional, 3-paper option, or applied research project) must be approved by their dissertation chair and, in the case of the applied research project, the Director of the Center for Organizational Research and Executive Education.

Program Outline

The DBA program is a cohort-based program, in which DBA candidates are placed in a cohort group and follow a schedule of courses within their cohort. The JU DBA degree may be earned in a minimum of three years. The DBA program is broken down into two phases:

Phase One

Each DBA candidate completes their core required courses and qualifying summer papers. Candidates also complete a required pre-requisite statistics course. Any candidate who has the statistics course waived due to proven competency must take an elective course approved by the Graduate Office to make up 3 credit hours. Candidates complete a total of fifty-one required credit hours in the first phase.

These DBA cohort classes are held one weekend (Friday and Saturday) per month on the JU main campus. DBA candidates engage in individual work that can be accomplished through collaboration with faculty and colleagues. Candidates who successfully complete all doctoral coursework and qualifying activities and remain in good standing will continue to the second phase of the DBA program.

Phase Two

Each DBA candidate completes a minimum of twelve required credit hours of dissertation research and writing. Candidates choose their dissertation discipline or field of study and work closely with their chosen mentor/dissertation chair and committee members. Candidates on the practice track completing an applied project work closely with their faculty sponsor(s), company-executive sponsor, and CORE director. Candidates are expected to successfully complete a dissertation proposal or applied research project proposal to address a significant industry challenge or opportunity. After the successful proposal defense, candidates are expected to complete and defend their dissertation. Professional track candidates completing an applied research project are expected to present their project and strategic recommendations as well as bridge academic theory and industry know-how to extend best practices.

Program Completion

The DBA program is designed to be completed in three years, but dissertation or project extensions are available. DBA candidates must successfully complete all required coursework and dissertation no later than six (6) years after starting the DBA program. A candidate who has not completed the program within six years but is in the dissertation phase of the program may request a one-year extension (subject to approval by the DBA Council) to complete his/her dissertation. No extensions will be granted beyond seven years in the DBA program.

Concentration information

Students have the option of taking a DBA concentration. This concentration is helpful to students who want to be qualified to teach because 18 hours of graduate credit in a subject area are generally needed for teaching qualifications or students who want more training specific to their discipline or career goals. A concentration requires an additional tuition charge of **\$4500**, billed after a student declares a concentration and enrolls in their first concentration class. Concentration tuition charges that have already been billed cannot be refunded if the student decides not to complete their concentration as long as concentration classes were available for them to take.

Optional Post-Graduate Certificate in Business & Management Education

Students in the DBA program have the opportunity to gain a certificate related to business education. This program is offered in conjunction with the University of Surrey through the Surrey Business School's Center for Management Education, a pioneering hub of research in the theory and practice of management education. The program consists of four 15-credit modules (60 credits total):

- Introduction to Management Education (MANM 408)
- Theoretical Foundations in Management Education (MANM409)
- Innovation & Leadership in Management Education (MANM410)
- Management Education in Practice (MANM411/DBA 780)

The first 3 courses are offered online (8 weeks each) through the University of Surrey, starting in January; the capstone course is held at JU over the summer. Each student is allocated a personal learning coach who supports the student on a weekly basis. The cost of the certificate is \$4500 and is not included in the base DBA program tuition. DBA Research

All DBA Candidates must review Jacksonville University policies and practices regarding institutional review of research activities by visiting the Jacksonville University Institutional Review Board (JU IRB) website: <http://www.ju.edu/institutionalreviewboard/>. DBA Candidates must obtain CITI certification (<https://about.citiprogram.org/>) by taking and passing the required training courses for Social-Behavioral-Educational Researchers, including the responsible conduct of research course. For registration information, visit <https://www.ju.edu/sponsoredprograms/docs/citi-ju-registration-instructions.pdf>.

Non-Human Subjects Research

DBA candidates performing research that does not involve human subjects (for example, those using archival data) must conform to the policies and practices adopted by JU regarding the use of such data, including submission of the "Request for determination of human subjects research (waiver)" to the IRB.

Human Subjects Research

DBA candidates performing Human Subjects Research must conform to JU IRB policies and practices before engaging in Human Subjects Research. Carefully examine the Jacksonville University IRB Human Subjects Research guide at the JU IRB website.

All DBA Candidates performing Human Subjects Research must complete ALL of the following prior to engaging in ANY Human Subject Research:

1. Complete all necessary CITI training and certifications
2. Complete all necessary IRB forms for Human Subjects Research and submit through the IRBnet application portal: <https://www.irbnet.org/release/index.html>
3. Link their faculty advisor's profile to the project
4. Have their dissertation chair or faculty advisor sign off on the IRB application
5. Receive approval from IRB to perform Human Subjects Research
6. Provide evidence of completing the approval process to Dissertation Chair and Committee
7. Turn in the IRB letter of approval to the Graduate Office.

Summer Research Papers

The faculty mentor and the student will develop possible research topic and question to explore. Topics are often related to the student's topic of interest for their dissertation. Grades are a "Pass," "Incomplete," or a "Fail." These papers are DBA qualifying events, and the 2nd year paper is a comprehensive activity. A "Pass" is required on both activities to remain in the DBA program. DBA students and faculty mentors have no requirement to be on campus. A mutually agreed format & schedule of interaction is acceptable.

First Year Paper

The student deliverable is a draft of an introduction with a research question and a literature review on the topic. It cannot be a repeat of any class paper. It can further explore the topic from a class but must show considerable process and distinctiveness. **NOTE:** Details and grading rubric are located in DBA 101 on Blackboard.

Second Year Paper

The goal of this paper is to produce a complete paper a student can potentially polish to use as part of their dissertation or submit to a conference. A "model" paper, published in an acceptable journal, in the same topic area or using the same methods is beneficial as a model for structuring the paper. This paper requires data analysis and a write-up of results, not just a literature review. The abstract should be the LAST things written so conclusions can be included. Students cannot pass without data analysis and results. Going through IRB is required. **NOTE:** Details and grading rubric are located in DBA 101 on Blackboard.

Research Resources

Software

Candidates will choose the appropriate research methods and software (e.g. SPSS, SAS etc.) in consultation with the Dissertation chair and committee. There are many such software packages available from JU at no charge or at a discounted student rate.

It is devoted to helping faculty, graduate students and professionals learn of current developments in various areas of research methods and statistics. Our focus in research methods is relevant to the management and organizational sciences.

Internal Funding

There are 3 options for the funding of research and conference travel (further details on DBA 101):

1. The JU Office of Research and Sponsored Programs funds new research with awards of up to \$2000 (for 2024-2025). This funding can also be used for conference travel. A faculty member must sponsor the research, and research must be presented at the JU Research and Scholarship Symposium(<https://www.ju.edu/sponsoredprograms/funding-resources/internal-student-research-creative-scholarship.php>)
2. Bank of America scholarships are available for travel to conferences. These grants are to support students of color.
3. Additional travel or research funding may be requested from the Davis College. Forms are available on DBA 101. Students may receive up to \$2000 per year for conference travel and/or research expenses.

Funding requests should be submitted in the order listed above (I.e., apply to ORSP first, if applicable).

DBA Dissertations

Dissertation Chair and Committee

Upon successful completion of the coursework, candidates will progress to the dissertation stage, form their dissertation committee, and select the business discipline in which they intend to write their dissertation. Each Candidate will choose a Dissertation Chair from the list of DBA Qualified Faculty provided by the Graduate Office. Candidates should choose a DBA-qualified faculty member from the business discipline in which they intend to write their dissertation.

The Candidate and the proposed chair will choose a minimum of three members (including the Chair) to serve on the Candidate's Dissertation Committee. The Dissertation Committee must include at least **TWO** members from the discipline chosen by the candidate (including the Chair) and **ONE outside** member chosen by the Candidate to serve as a Committee Members. This member may come from outside the discipline or from institutions other than Jacksonville University but must provide a current CV to the Graduate Office. All Committee Members, including any non-JU Davis faculty members, must conform to Davis College of Business standards for Graduate faculty, consistent with the Davis College of Business' AACSB accreditation.

After selection of the proposed Chair and Committee Members, the Candidate must complete the *Doctoral Committee/Candidacy Status Form*. All DBA forms are available in Blackboard DBA 101. The Graduate Director must sign the form, authorizing the creation of the Candidate's Dissertation Committee. This form must be completed prior to enrolling in dissertation credit hours and resubmitted for review and approval any time that changes are made to the committee membership.

Dissertation Formats

- **Traditional Dissertation:** A traditional dissertation is an in-depth exploration of business-related research question(s). This dissertation is typically 100+ pages and includes extensive literature review of the relevant constructs and theoretical background, as well as hypothesis development, a thorough explanation of methods, results, discussion, and conclusion. It may be a single study or multiple studies related to the research area in question. The traditional dissertation includes five chapters – Introduction, Literature Review, Methods, Results, and Conclusion. This is the most common dissertation format.

- **Three-Paper Dissertation:** As an alternative, students may complete three papers suitable for publication in a peer-reviewed journal in lieu of a traditional dissertation. Generally, the three papers are related, empirical studies. The dissertation includes an introduction, three papers, and a summary chapter/conclusion. The introduction explains the background for the research, the significance of the problem or research question, and the link between the papers, including a conceptual or theoretical framework. The conclusion summarizes the primary findings of the studies, contribution to the literature, and similarities and discrepancies of the findings, as well as acknowledging limitations and providing recommendations for future research directions. The papers should be of suitable length, format, and *quality* for submission to a journal; if papers are targeted at different journals, they may be formatted differently. The final chapter links the findings into a coherent research contribution. The student is expected to be the primary author of each article. While dissertation committee members may be co-authors, other students may not. All 3 articles must be completed while a DBA student at JU. No more than one article may be published or accepted for publication before the proposal defense. The papers do not have to be published for the student to graduate, but they must be *publishable*, as deemed by the student's committee. At the discretion of the dissertation committee, students may be required submit at least one paper to a conference or a journal prior to final dissertation signatures. If any of the papers are published before the final defense, the student must obtain copyright permission from the publishing journal to include the article in his/her dissertation.

- **Applied Research Project:** Students in the professional track may choose to pursue an applied research project. Those who pursue this option will work with the Director of the Center for Organizational Research and Executive Education (CORE). The number of applied research projects that can be completed at one time may be limited by the capacity of CORE and the faculty available to sponsor such projects. This project should utilize existing knowledge and academic theory to make an original contribution to a real-world business problem (a practical application of scholarship). Students will write a project proposal, laying out the current real-world problem in their field (this may be within the organization where they work or another organization), its significance (why is this something that needs to be solved), and how they can contribute to a solution. The project justification should include significant research support and a literature review for the suggested project (cite scholarly research and theoretical justification for their approach). A letter of agreement from the organization is also required, stating that the organization supports the project and defining a sponsor at the company who will attend the final project defense. The purpose of the project is not to fill a gap in overall research knowledge, but rather to solve a concrete problem in a specific setting and bridge the research-practice gap. Students will present and defend their project proposals. Once approved, they will begin the project.

Upon completion of the project, they will complete and defend their applied document—this document will include the project proposal, a thorough explanation of what was done in the project and what was discovered (including empirical results), whether evidence-based solutions sufficiently addressed the problem, and recommendations for practitioners with similar issues. The document should also include a reflection of future directions, which may include acknowledgement of research-practice gaps (what is missing in the academic literature considering what was observed "on the ground" in an organization) and what further phases, best practices, or additional problems the company may need to address. Students will include an executive summary of their findings at the beginning of the document. (Project examples: piloting a new training program in a particular organization, modifying a compensation system, defining a new strategic direction, etc.). Applied Research Project reports do not have the publication requirement of the traditional dissertation if the sponsoring organization has concerns about confidentiality.

Dissertation Proposal

In consultation with the committee chair, the candidate will begin research and write a formal Dissertation Proposal. Numerous dissertation styles are available: a traditional dissertation, a 3-paper dissertation, or a major applied research project report. Students should discuss this choice with their mentor/dissertation chair before completing the *Doctoral Committee/Candidacy Status Form*.

The Candidate will defend their Dissertation Proposal in a public forum once they have completed IRB review. The Candidate's Dissertation Chair, in coordination with the Graduate Office, will set the date of the presentation of the Dissertation Proposal. The Dissertation Chair and Committee must approve the Dissertation Proposal before the Candidate may continue his or her research and analysis in creation of the formal Dissertation and Dissertation Defense.

The traditional Dissertation Proposal is the first half of the dissertation (first 3 chapters) and should be approximately 40-50 double-spaced pages (excluding references, appendices, etc.). The proposal covers a statement of the general research problem and motivation for the research, the questions or hypotheses to be investigated, the relevance of the problem to business theory and practice, a review of relevant literature, an outline of the dissertation, a detailed description of the methodology to be used, and expected contributions and practical implications. The proposal is characterized by a logical progression of thought, good literary style, and acceptable practices of scholarly writing. The proposal will be formatted in accordance with the latest edition of the American Psychological Association (APA) Publication Manual. The title of the dissertation proposal should include an indication of the research approach (e.g., correlational, experimental, qualitative) and the major variables to be studied. The Dissertation Proposal format should consist of:

- Title page
- Abstract
- Table of contents
- List of Tables
- List of Figures
- Chapter 1: Introduction (includes Statement and Problem/Research Questions and Motivation/Significance (why it is important and who cares) as well as definitions of the major constructs of the study)
- Chapter 2: Literature Review (includes theoretical framework/rationale and hypotheses)
- Chapter 3: Proposed Methodology, Sample, and Model (Research setting, sample, measures, procedures, data analysis plan, human subjects' protection)

The three-paper proposal will include the introduction and the front end of all 3 papers (through proposed methods). This will generally require 3 projects submitted to IRB (1 submission per paper). If data for more than one study/paper is collected simultaneously, fewer IRB submissions may be necessary.

Students pursuing the applied project will submit a project justification as their proposal. It will include sections on:

- Chapter 1: Introduction to the organizational context and the details of the problem,
- Chapter 2: a thorough literature review and evidence-based suggestions for solving the problem and linkage of practice to academic theory via case method(s).
- Chapter 3: a thorough description of the intended project or intervention, empirical data sources, metrics for success and plan for analysis, and timeline for completion

Students should submit the project to IRB and turn in approval to the Graduate Office. This ensures that students can present their results at a conference or publish related articles without violating IRB requirements.

Dissertation Proposal Defense Meeting

All materials for the Proposal defense must be submitted to the Graduate Office and DBA 101 on Blackboard **two (2) weeks before** the proposed defense date. Candidates should confirm their committee members are available for the defense before scheduling with the graduate office. Students will provide the graduate office with email addresses for any committee members outside of DCOB for scheduling purposes. Candidates will submit:

- Title
- Proposal Slides (Please use template on DBA 101)
- Draft of Proposal – The student will need to submit the draft to Turn It In Plagiarism Review when submitting to Blackboard (word document only)
- Provide the Turn It In Plagiarism Report to the dissertation chair and Graduate Office for review.
- Student IRB Determination Form or IRB Approval Memorandum.
- CITI Training completion certificates
- Requested date for dissertation proposal (will not be scheduled and confirmed until #1- #4 are submitted to the Graduate Office and DBA 101.)

The candidate, chairperson, and members of the candidate's committee must attend the proposal defense. The chair is responsible for recording basic points made during the meeting and the recommendations for revisions, if any.

The candidate should be prepared to discuss the entire proposal, including potential problems that might be encountered and plans to manage such situations.

At the completion of the proposal defense, the chairperson will summarize the major points raised by the reviewers and ask for their recommendations.

The committee may choose to 1) accept the proposal as is; 2) accept with minor changes; 3) require major revisions and re-review; or 4) reject the proposal. Examples of reasons for rejection include major safety or human rights issues to research subjects; major theoretical or methodological flaws that would preclude valid or interpretable findings; or a non-feasible plan that cannot be implemented (e.g., too many subjects, too complex) within a reasonable time frame.

NOTE: The document named "Doctoral Dissertation Guidelines" has more details and is available in Blackboard DBA 101. Dissertations typically are 90-100+ pages but can vary depending on type of research, methodology and style. Other forms and requirements are posted in Blackboard DBA 101.

Defense of Dissertation

In coordination with the Graduate Office, the Chair will set the date, time, and location of the Dissertation Defense, showing consideration to the availability of faculty and other interested parties. The candidate must submit the following to the Graduate Office at least 2 weeks before the defense date:

- Title
- Defense Slides (Please use template on DBA 101)
- Draft of Dissertation – The student will need to submit the draft to Turn It In Plagiarism Review when submitting to Blackboard (word document only)
- Provide the Turn It In Plagiarism Report to the dissertation chair and Graduate Office for review.
- Requested date for dissertation proposal (will not be scheduled and confirmed until #1- #4 are submitted to the Graduate Office and DBA 101.)

When the defense date is confirmed, the graduate office will send an announcement inviting DCOBT faculty and other interested parties to attend

The Candidate will make a formal defense of his or her Dissertation in an open, public forum. This may be in person or online. After the Candidate's initial presentation of defense, the Dissertation Committee will engage the student in a series of questions. The Dissertation Chair will manage and preside over the Dissertation Defense and all forum proceedings. If time permits following the Committee's series of questions, the public audience may ask questions of the Candidate. The Chair has sole discretion concerning whether the audience may ask questions and whether the question is suitable to the purpose of the Dissertation and forum.

At the conclusion of the forum, the public and the Candidate will vacate the room, and the committee will deliberate and provide a decision of:

- Accept (no changes required)
- Accept pending minor revisions
- Accept pending major revisions
- Reject

If the Committee determines that revisions are required, the Committee will present the desired revisions and determine an appropriate amount of time for completion. The Candidate will submit a revised final Dissertation to the Committee for review. The Committee Members will sign the Signature page once the Candidate has successfully defended, and the Committee is satisfied with the final version. The Dissertation Chair will assign a grade of Incomplete or a Pass/Fail grade at their discretion. The Dissertation Chair will be able to change Incompletes to a letter grade when and if they see fit. Incompletes will revert to an "F" letter grade if the DBA Candidate failed to complete his or her Dissertation within five years after receiving an Incomplete.

NOTE: Students must defend their dissertation four weeks before the end of the term. Two weeks before the end of the term, all revisions and edits must be completed, and final documents submitted. It is extremely important that all DBA students and faculty understand that if revisions are needed and not completed on time, the student may have to enroll in the following semester, and tuition will be charged.

Conferral of Degree and Graduation

Conferral of Degree and Graduation

It is important to note in the policies below the difference between a Candidate graduating from the program by receiving their official doctoral degree AND merely participating in the graduation ceremony.

In order for the Candidate to qualify to graduate and thus the doctoral degree conferred, a DBA Candidate must have, at least one month prior to the end of the term:

1. Completed all DBA courses satisfactorily
2. Successfully defended his or her dissertation
3. Completed and received approval from his/her dissertation committee of all requested changes (if applicable),
4. Provided all necessary forms and documentation to the Graduate Office, including the *Satisfaction of Dissertation Requirements Form* (SDR form), with all signatures, AND
5. Submitted the JU Graduation Application found on the JU official website to the Registrar's Office.

Publication of Dissertation

Upon successful completion of the DBA candidate's dissertation defense, including any recommended changes to the dissertation, the DBA candidate is required to complete the dissertation publication process by using the ProQuest link provided below. The Graduate Office requests the student provide a copy of the dissertation for the Jacksonville University Library Institutional repository as well. Instructions on submitting to the institutional repository can be found at <https://library.ju.edu/institutional-repository/policy>.

ProQuest Dissertations and Theses is an online database that indexes, abstracts, and provides full-text access to dissertations and theses. The database includes over 2.4 million records and covers 1637 to the present.

Graduation Ceremony Participation

A DBA Candidate may participate in the JU Graduate Graduation Ceremony IF, at least one month prior to the end of the Spring semester:

A. He/she has successfully defended his/her dissertation

OR IF

B. The candidate's chair has provided written notification to the Graduate Office at least one month prior to the ceremony authorizing the student to participate ("walk") and the candidate has set the official date of his/her dissertation defense with the graduate office for the following Summer term. This ceremony is open to family, friends, and other guests of the graduates held at the end of the Spring semester each academic year. His or her Dissertation Chair will "hood" the Candidate at a ceremony prior to graduation.

Doctorate of Business Administration Diploma

The Doctor of Business Administration (D.B.A.) is a terminal degree in business administration. The D.B.A. diploma is standardized and will be a document testifying to the completion of that course of study. There are concentrations or specializations on the diploma if completed successfully.

Transfer and Transient Credit

A maximum of four (4) courses or 12 hours of graduate academic credit (whichever is less) may be transferred from an AACSB-accredited academic institution. The credit must be in courses similar in content and rigor to Jacksonville University's graduate program, and the grade must be at least a "B" unless otherwise approved by the Director of the DBA Program. At least two (2) courses for the DBA concentration must have been taken at JU.

To be eligible for transfer credit, the student must submit a transcript and catalog description of the course(s) to the Director of Graduate Business Programs before the student begins their classes. All courses submitted for transfer credit consideration must have been taken within five (5) years of beginning a graduate program. Any work transferred to Jacksonville University will be entered on the JU transcript as hours earned only and will not be used in computation of the grade point average.

A student enrolled in a graduate program at another institution may take courses at JU as a graduate transient student for one semester only. The student must present a letter from his or her degree-granting institution indicating good standing. Jacksonville University accepts no responsibility regarding the transferability of its graduate courses to other institutions.

Weekend Graduate Program Format

DBA classes are offered in a campus-based and online FLEX format. Students may attend in-person or synchronously online (logging into class at class time remotely). If a work or other conflict prevents attending in person or synchronously online, students should notify their professors. A recording of class will be available so that students can catch up. Catching up on classes asynchronously should be the exception; most classes should be attended in person or synchronously online.

Graduate Program Requirements

All students in the Davis College of Business & Technology graduate programs must attend orientation. Full-time status for graduate students is 6 hours per semester. All DBA students must maintain an academic GPA of at least 3.33 ("B+") during enrollment in their program.

Academic Standing and Grade Appeals

All DBA students must maintain an academic GPA of at least 3.33 ("B+") during enrollment in their program. To graduate, a student must have at least a 3.33 GPA. No course in which a grade below a "B-" (2.65) is earned will be accepted as fulfilling a requirement of the graduate degree. Any course in which a grade below a B- is earned will have to be repeated. Most courses are only offered once per year, so students may have to wait a year to repeat a course. **When the course is repeated, tuition will be charged at the DBA rate (currently \$1500/credit hour, subject to change).** A DBA candidate earning two grades of "C" or one grade of "F" in any graduate course will be dismissed from the program.

A DBA student will be placed on academic probation at the conclusion of any term in which the student's cumulative GPA is less than a 3.33 (B+). The student has the following semester to raise the cumulative GPA to a 3.33. A graduate student will be dismissed from the program if the student does not raise the cumulative GPA to a 3.33 within one semester of being placed on Academic Probation. While the university GPA is calculated based on all graduate work at the university, the College of Business calculates average GPA separately for each program in which you are enrolled. Academic status in each College of Business degree program (i.e., the DBA program) is based upon the program GPA, not the university overall graduate GPA. Concentration classes are included in the DBA GPA as long as a concentration is actually completed (e.g., if one concentration class is taken but the concentration is not completed, the graduate office will calculate your GPA without the concentration class).

***Note:** Students on dismissal will not be permitted to register for graduate study and will be dropped from any classes they are enrolled in.

Students dismissed from a Davis College of Business & Technology Graduate Program have 10 calendar days to appeal the action to the DBA Council. Within five business days, the committee must review the case via electronic communication or a face-to-face meeting and issue its final recommendation to the Dean who will rule on the appeal. The ruling by the college dean will be issued to the student in writing along with a brief explanation of the rationale for the recommendation. A dismissed student will be dropped from any classes they are enrolled in, and the registrar will be notified that they no longer have graduate student status nor should they be allowed to register for any graduate classes.

It is up to each instructor to determine the criteria by which students will be graded. Grading can be a subjective process in which knowledge of class material and the quality of work are both factored into the grade. To facilitate the success of all students, it is appropriate they be clearly informed about the number of graded assignments and the weight attached to each assignment. If more specific criteria for grades can be explained, it is appropriate that such explanations are included in the syllabus or other course materials. It is also appropriate for students to be informed if class attendance and participation will be calculated in the final grade. Faculty may provide work for extra credit but are under no obligation to do so.

Continuous Matriculation Policy

DBA students are expected to be continuously enrolled in the program from the first credited registration until successful completion of the degree. The program is designed to be completed within three years of the first credited registration. That is the DBA program tuition timeframe. After the third year of the program, students who have not completed all degree requirements will be required to be registered every semester in continuous dissertation advisement. Students must complete their dissertation within six (6) years of beginning the program.

After the third year, the student will be registered in the DBA dissertation extension class and pay the stated tuition extension fee established for that year. At this stage, this process will continue (Grade of P) until the student completes their dissertation, is approved for a leave of absence, leaves or is dismissed from the program, or until six (6) years have passed since beginning the program. If the dissertation chair does not agree with a student's progress and awards a grade of "F" rather than a "P," the student will be dismissed from the DBA program.

Dissertation extension fees are established each year. A student who is discontinued for breach of continuous attendance will lose the option of fulfilling the degree requirements originally listed in his/her official program of study already on file and will instead be subject to the degree requirements and tuition that is in effect at the time the student resumes his/her attendance.

A student may not graduate until all requirements are met. The deadline for defending and completing a dissertation (this includes signatures and submitting the final copy of the dissertation) is 2 weeks before the end of the semester. If the deadline is not met, the student must enroll the next semester to finish the requirements and successfully complete the DBA degree.

Leave of Absence

Within the 6-year limit, a student in good academic standing may request one leave of absence from the DBA program for a definite, stated period (up to one year) during which the student does not plan to make academic progress. To be eligible for a leave of absence, a student should be in good academic and financial standing with Jacksonville University. A leave of absence will generally be granted in cases involving personal hardship or family need. The student must submit a **Request for Leave of Absence e-Form** to the Graduate Office prior to the beginning of the anticipated leave time, and it must be approved by the Graduate Committee. To access the Leave of Absence form, go to <https://my.ju.edu/> and log in with JU credentials. Click on "eForms" to access <https://etcentral.ju.edu/> and click on forms. Scroll down to the forms under "Registrar" and click on "REG - DBA Leave of Absence Request." Fill out the form completely, including attaching a letter explaining the need for leave, and click "submit."

If approved, the time of the leave of absence will count against the total time allowed for the degree. Students should be aware while on leave no progress towards their graduate degree should be made. When on an approved leave of absence, they are not considered enrolled students and will not have access to campus services and benefits or aid from faculty. While readmission to the graduate school after an approved leave of absence is typically a formality, students will need to submit an Application for Readmission one month prior to the semester they are scheduled to resume their graduate studies.

An email asking for a leave of absence is not sufficient. The form must be filed with the Graduate Office and the leave must be approved by the Graduate Committee. If a student stops attending without filing the form, the student will receive F's in classes for the semester and will be dismissed from the program. Students can file for re-admission or appeal the dismissal. Either would have to be approved by the DBA council.

Academic Renewal Policy

Graduate students in the Davis College of Business & Technology who have been readmitted or reinstated after a period of absence of five (5) calendar years or longer are eligible for academic renewal. Academic renewal for the student signals the initiation of a new grade point average to be used for determining academic standing. This provision allows degree-seeking students who earlier experienced academic difficulty to make a fresh start and have one final opportunity to earn a graduate degree from Jacksonville University. "The renewed grade point average is used for academic standing purposes only. All courses taken at the graduate level will factor into the student's cumulative GPA."

7th Year Dissertation Extension Request Guidelines

Students generally must complete the program in 6 years. If an additional year is needed, students must submit a letter to the DBA council asking for an extension.

The letter must include:

- why they have not finished
- the plan to finish by the end of the extension time
- that they understand that they will pay \$6000 per semester tuition rate for the 6-credit dissertation extension class starting in the summer 2022 semester.
- that they understand that there is a high risk that they may not finish based on your past performance
- they have been counselled on the requirements and that no additional extensions will be granted, if this one is granted.

Master's degree

Those candidates that leave the DBA program or are dismissed from the DBA program after successfully completing the course work of the DBA program will receive a Master's in Business Studies if requested by the student and approved by the DBA Director.

Honor Code

Academic integrity is the foundation of the educational process, especially at the doctoral level. Upholding academic integrity maintains the value associated with earning a doctoral degree in business. By becoming members of the doctoral program, students agree to hold themselves to the highest standard of academic integrity and to uphold this Honor Code.

Honor Statement

A doctoral student in business will not lie, cheat, steal, or tolerate those who do. Davis College DBA students will follow the Jacksonville University Academic Integrity pledge:

As a student of Jacksonville University, I pledge to uphold the values of academic integrity.

I will be honest in all my dealings with faculty, staff and students,

I will cultivate an atmosphere of trust by being trustworthy,

I will treat all members of the community with fairness,

I will respect the dignity and value of all persons, and

I will take responsibility for my actions.

Violations of the Honor Code

A violation of the Honor Code is any unauthorized conduct that evidences fraud, deceit, dishonesty, or intent to obtain unfair advantage over other students. Examples of violations of the Honor Code include, but are not limited to:

- Plagiarism
- Cheating
- Fabricating or falsifying academic records
- Tampering with academic materials
- Unauthorized access to academic materials
- Facilitating academic dishonesty in any way
- Falsifying data or results

AI use

Academic integrity requires careful attribution to all sources. These days, generative AI tools like Chat GPT, Bing, and Google Bard may be used to assist with research, in some acceptable ways and some unacceptable ways. Please follow any and all syllabus guidelines involving the use of AI, and, just like with any other source, acknowledge any use of these tools. Many academic journals are prohibiting the use of AI in helping write papers, doing literature reviews, etc. Likewise, using AI to complete assigned article summaries is likely not in the spirit of academic integrity; certainly having AI generate a research paper is not. Please ask before use on class assignments or dissertation work and, if permitted, acknowledge which programs were used and how when turning in the assignment. Be aware that use of AI may bar research from being published in some journals and that AI can also generate citations that sound real (real researchers' names) but do not actually exist.

Reporting Violations

If a student believes that another student has violated the Honor Code, they should report the violation to the Graduate Office. Violations will be turned over to the JU Director of Academic Integrity. For more information, visit: <https://www.ju.edu/academicintegrity/index.php>

Penalties

The penalties for violating the Honor Code will vary depending on the severity of the violation. Falsifying data or results is a serious violation of the Honor Code because it undermines the integrity of the research process and can lead to inaccurate conclusions. If a student is found to have falsified data, they may be subject to the most severe penalties, including expulsion from the doctoral program. Please see your course syllabi for specific penalties within that course.

Possible penalties include:

- A warning
- A failing grade on the assignment or course
- Suspension from the doctoral program
- Expulsion from the doctoral program

The Honor Code is designed to protect the integrity of the DBA program and to ensure that all students have a fair and equal opportunity to succeed. By upholding the Honor Code, students can help to ensure that the DBA program is a place where academic excellence is valued and rewarded.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Academic misconduct occurs when a student engages in an action that is deceitful, fraudulent, or dishonest regarding any type of academic assignment that is intended to or results in an unfair academic advantage. In this context, the term “assignment” refers to any type of graded or ungraded work that is submitted for evaluation for any course. Academic misconduct includes but is not limited to cheating, collusion, falsification, misrepresentation, unauthorized collaboration on assignments, copying another student’s work, using or providing unauthorized notes or materials, turning in work not produced by the individual, and plagiarism. Furthermore, providing deceitful, fraudulent, or dishonest information during discussions of an academic manner with faculty are also examples of academic misconduct.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Definitions

Members of the Jacksonville University community are expected to foster and uphold the highest standards of honesty and integrity, which are foundations for the intellectual endeavors we engage in. To underscore the importance of truth, honesty, and accountability, students and instructors should adhere to the following standard:

I do not lie, cheat, or steal, nor do I condone the actions of those who do

The Jacksonville University Faculty have adopted an Academic Integrity Pledge:

As a student of Jacksonville University, I pledge to uphold the values of academic integrity.

-

I will be honest in all my dealings with faculty, staff and students.

I will cultivate an atmosphere of trust by being trustworthy.

I will treat all members of the community with fairness.

I will respect the dignity and value of all persons, and

I will take responsibility for my actions.

Specific examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to the following:

- Using unauthorized notes or other unauthorized resources for an exam or assignment.
- Sharing information about a test or quiz with others if you take the test or quiz earlier than other students.
- Copying answers from someone else, such as on a test, quiz, lab report, assignment, etc.
- Presenting any false material as genuine, such as falsified data, false resources, false citations, etc.
- Turning in the same or significantly similar assignment to more than one class without first obtaining explicit permission from the instructors.
- Falsifying class records or other materials submitted to comply with course requirements or to obtain course credit, including providing false information regarding class attendance, attendance at a required event or an event for which credit will be given, or attendance at an internship or other required service.
- Misrepresenting the truth or lying in an effort to receive an extension of a due date, reschedule a test date, or any obtain any other unfair academic advantage.
- Lying to a faculty member when approached about an incidence of academic misconduct. In this instance, lying about an instance of academic misconduct only compounds the dishonesty and is further disrespect to the faculty member and the academic system.
- Facilitating any misconduct by another student. This includes helping another student engage in academic misconduct as well as pressuring or coercing another student into assisting in academic misconduct.
- Substituting one person for another to take a course, test, or any other academic assessment.
- Purposefully impeding others from academic progress.
- Plagiarism centers on representing another’s work as your own.
 - Copying someone else’s work and/or words without using quotes and proper citation.
 - Paraphrasing someone else’s work and/or original ideas without proper citation.
 - Using someone else’s train of thought, ideas, conclusions, logic, etc., without proper citation.

Ways to avoid academic misconduct:

- Always do your own work.
- Never “copy and paste” information into a document that you will end up turning in.
- If you “copy and paste” information into a document, always put it in quotation marks and then put a citation.
- Never lend your work to others, and do not borrow work from others.
- If you are conducting a group project and a member of the group is not participating, contact the instructor and/or do not put that student’s name on the end product.
- Ensure that any collaborative work adheres to the guidelines set by the instructor. If you are engaged in a collaboration that seems like it might be unauthorized, seek clarification from your instructor.
- Review this section of the catalog (Academic Honesty) frequently.

- Recognize the importance of communication and clarification. Understanding what does and does not constitute academic misconduct is the responsibility of each individual and thus each individual should seek clarification on matters of academic integrity and misconduct.
 - Clarify with your instructor what is authorized and what is not authorized regarding use of materials, collaboration, etc.
 - If you have any questions regarding whether something is considered academic misconduct, consult your instructor if it is class or assignment specific, or your academic advisor.
 - Certain types of plagiarism are not as obvious as other types. However, unintentional plagiarism is still plagiarism, so actively work to understand what does and does not constitute plagiarism.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of each student at Jacksonville University to know and abide by the standards and guidelines for academic integrity, as outlined above.

Instructors are expected to provide clear information regarding class assignments; however, it is ultimately a student's responsibility to understand the amount of collaboration allowed in a specific assignment, to understand how to cite sources, and to never assume that working with others or using the student's previous work or the work of others is acceptable without instructor permission.

It is the responsibility of instructors to report all acts of misconduct, even if they believe those acts to be unintentional, so that students can benefit from special educational instruction and assistance to help ensure that they avoid committing such acts again in the future. If the instructor is unsure whether a violation has occurred, the instructor is to consult with the Chair of the Academic Integrity Council (AIC).

By reporting acts of academic misconduct through the **Academic Misconduct Notification Form** (available to instructors via the MyJU portal) at the time that they are detected, discovered, or known (hereafter referred to as the discovery date), instructors initiate a process that allows students to either accept all penalties or exercise the right to challenge the instructor's determination of academic misconduct in a timely manner with the Academic Integrity Council. This process is entirely separate from the **Grade Appeals Process**. If an instructor should impose a penalty for an act of academic misconduct in a course, but fail to report the incident through the **Academic Misconduct Notification Form** within fifteen (15) business days of the discovery date when school is in session, the instructor's action will be considered a violation of university policy. Therefore, if the student should initiate a grade appeal after receiving his/her final grade in the course, the instructor's dean would automatically reverse the course-level penalty.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Reporting Alleged Acts of Academic Misconduct

If an instructor believes a student has committed an act of academic misconduct, the instructor is to meet with the student, if possible, to discuss the matter. This discussion may occur in person, via telephone, or video conference. When it is not possible to meet with the student, the instructor is to contact the student by email. This meeting or email contact should be initiated as soon as possible after the discovery date. The instructor is then to fill out the **Academic Misconduct Notification Form** within fifteen (15) business days of the discovery date when school is in session. This form will generate a report that will be automatically transmitted via email to the student, the instructor, and the Director of Academic Integrity. In addition to describing the incident on this form, the instructor will:

1) **Recommend that a "warning" be issued to the student.** See Section VI below for a full explanation of the possible consequences of a warning. This "warning only" option may be chosen in any of the following circumstances:

- The incident is a first offense in the class,
- The affected assignment amounted to 10% or less of the total grade in the course,
- An act of plagiarism occurred due to a technicality and was likely unintentional,
- Mitigating circumstances suggest that the act of misconduct was not an overt attempt to gain an unfair advantage.

2) **Recommend that a "citation for academic misconduct" be issued to the student.** See Section IV below for a full explanation of the possible consequences of a citation.

NOTE: If the course-level penalty assigned by the instructor is failure for the entire course, the instructor is to indicate, on the Academic Misconduct Notification Form, that the Registrar's Office will issue an "Academic Hold" which will prevent the student from withdrawing from the course in question (the student may still withdraw from other courses).

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Penalty Classifications for Academic Misconduct

There are two levels of penalties for incidents of academic misconduct.

1) **A course-level penalty**, which is assigned by the instructor, in line with the policies on the instructor's syllabus (see section V below).

2) **A concurrent university-level penalty**, which is assigned by the instructor's dean and, in certain circumstances, the Chief Academic Officer, after evaluating the instructor's recommendation for a warning or a citation, according to the guidelines in section VI below.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Course-Level Penalties for Academic Misconduct

Upon discovery of an act of academic misconduct, the assigning of a course-level penalty is up to the discretion of the instructor. If the student requests an AIC hearing panel to review his or her case and is exonerated of the alleged misconduct, the instructor must retract any course-level penalties and re-grade the assignment(s) in question as if no academic misconduct occurred.

Unless the course-level penalty is failure for the entire course, the student may still withdraw from the course, provided that the deadline for withdrawing has not yet passed.

A course-level penalty on the affected assignment that incidentally results in the student failure in the course is not the same as imposing a penalty of failure in the course.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Notification Processes

Once the Director of Academic Integrity has received the Academic Misconduct Notification Form from the instructor the following actions occur:

1. The faculty member is contacted to provide the documentary evidence and copy of the syllabus for the course in which the infraction occurred,
2. The student is contacted for their version of the events leading to the submission of the AMNF by the faculty,
3. The Director of Academic Integrity checks their files to determine whether the reported infraction is a first offense,
4. The dean, academic advisor, and if appropriate faculty athletics representative, Athletic Director, NROTC commander, and/or International Student office are notified that a student has been reported for an act of academic misconduct,
5. A description of the penalties and request for a decision regarding acceptance of the penalties or appeal of the reported infraction is sent to the student, and the Director of Academic Integrity informs the student that he or she has seven (7) business days from the postmark date (or email time stamp) of this notification to request a hearing with the Academic Integrity Council, or the student will be deemed to have committed the violation, an "Academic Hold" to encourage the student to address the issue prior to being able to withdraw from the course in question or register for courses in subsequent sessions

If the instructor has indicated "WARNING" only on the Academic Misconduct Notification Form, that instructor's judgment is to be respected. If the instructor marks "CITATION," however, the instructor's dean has the right to lessen that to a "WARNING" if, in his or her judgment, the infraction fits the guidelines for a warning. Again, these guidelines include any of the following circumstances:

- The incident is a first offense in the class,
- The affected assignment amounted to 10% or less of the total grade in the course,
- An act of plagiarism occurred due to a technicality and was likely unintentional,
- Mitigating circumstances suggest that the act of misconduct was not an overt attempt to gain an unfair advantage.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Student Admissions

In cases in which the student accepts the penalties without an admission of misconduct, or fails to request a hearing with the Academic Integrity Council within the allotted seven (7) business days, the Director of Academic Integrity records a determination that the student has accepted the penalties. The Academic Hold remains in place until required educational training (see Section VI above) has been completed.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Membership of the Academic Integrity Council (AIC)

The Academic Integrity Council is chaired by the Director of Academic Integrity.

- The AIC Chair is a non-voting member who presides over all hearings of the AIC.
- The AIC Chair is to serve as a neutral resource to both students and faculty.
- The AIC Chair is to be a tenured faculty member, with administrative duties as the director of Academic Integrity, appointed by the Chief Academic Officer.

The other members of the Academic Integrity Council form a pool of members from which the AIC Chair draws to form Hearing Panels.

- At least three faculty members from each college are to be appointed to the AIC, with at least one faculty member coming from each academic school or division. These faculty members are to be tenured, unless the particular division or school they represent has fewer than two tenured faculty. In such cases, non-tenured faculty may be appointed to the AIC. These faculty members are to be appointed to the AIC by Director of Academic Integrity in consultation with the deans of each college and academic unit administrators, to serve two-year terms, which may be renewed. Additional tenured faculty members may be appointed to the AIC as needed, from any academic division or school, at the discretion of the deans. The terms of these faculty members are to be staggered, to ensure continuity.
- At least three undergraduate students, to be selected from three different academic units, are to be appointed by the Director of Academic Integrity after consultation with the Chief Student Life Officer and Deans. Students will serve one-year renewable terms on the AIC. At least three graduate students, to be selected from three different academic units, are to be appointed by the Director of Academic integrity in consultation with the Chief Student Life Officer and Deans. Graduate students serve one-year renewable terms on the AIC.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct

Convening an AIC Hearing

A student can request a hearing with the Academic Integrity Council only after an Academic Misconduct Notification Form is submitted by the instructor. If there is no Academic Misconduct Notification Form submitted by the instructor, the student will need to refer to information in the Grade Appeal Process in the JU Catalog.

If the student requests a hearing with the Academic Integrity Council, the Director of Academic Integrity meets (virtually, via telephone, or in person) with the student in a neutral, advisory role, to review the case and discuss the student's options. If the instructor who has charged the student with an act of misconduct is also the AIC chair, then the instructor's dean will designate another faculty member serving on the AIC to meet with the student, and to serve as the AIC chair for that case.

The AIC Chair will explain the process and procedures involved in the hearing process. At this time, the student will have another opportunity to accept the penalties. If, after this meeting, the student still wishes to request a hearing, the AIC Chair is to make a reasonable effort to schedule one around the student's schedule. This hearing is to occur within the next fourteen (14) business days, if possible.

When alleged violations occur at the end of a fall or summer semester, the hearing is to take place within thirty (30) days of the beginning of the next spring or fall semester, respectively. When alleged violations occur at the end of the spring semester, the hearing is to take place no later than thirty days after the beginning of the following fall semester.

The AIC Chair will then select the participants of a Hearing Panel from the members of the AIC. The Hearing Panel is to consist of three to five voting members (aside from the chair).

Members of the AIC may disqualify themselves from participating in any particular Hearing Panel for any reason. In such a case, it is up to the chair to find a replacement member according to the above guidelines. The instructor who has accused the student of academic misconduct cannot be a member of the hearing panel, nor serve as the AIC chair for that panel.

The student, as well as the instructor are to be notified of the time and place of the hearing. Hearing panels may be held via electronic meeting.

If an accused student is either unwilling or unable to attend a Hearing Panel that he or she has requested, the AIC chair may opt to have five members of the AIC review the student's case without requiring these members to attend a physical meeting.

AIC Hearing Panel Jurisdiction

AIC Hearing Panels have jurisdiction over one issue and one issue alone: determining whether accused students should be held responsible for committing the particular act(s) of academic misconduct related to the warning or the citation alleged by the instructor. AIC Hearing Panels have no jurisdiction over the penalties imposed for violations, or whether the act in question merits a warning or a citation for academic misconduct.

Only the instructor's dean has the right to change a citation to a warning. His or her decision on this matter is final. If a student who has admitted an act of academic misconduct or been found to have committed such an act by a n AIC Hearing Panel should wish to contest the severity of a course-level penalty imposed by an instructor (on the basis that the penalty was not in accordance with the instructor's stated syllabus policies), that student would need to follow the process outlined in the "Standard Procedures for Appeals of Grades and Sanctions" section of the Academic Catalog.

AIC Hearing Panel Attendants

AIC Hearings are to be closed from the public. Only the following people are to be allowed to attend:

- **The Chair of the AIC**, who is to preside over the proceedings, but not have a vote in determining the outcome.
- **The members of the Hearing Panel**, chosen by the AIC Chair
- **The accused student**, who may elect to be accompanied by an advisor of his/her choosing. The advisor must be a member of the University community (i.e., a current student, faculty, or staff member) and may not be an attorney for, or a parent of, the accused student. The accused student is responsible for presenting his/her own information, and therefore, advisors are not permitted to speak or to participate directly in the hearing. If the student is unable to attend the hearing, he or she may opt to submit a written statement for review by the panel.
- **The instructor.**
- **Witnesses, if relevant, admitted at the sole discretion of the AIC Chair.**

The instructor is strongly encouraged to attend the hearing.

AIC Hearing Panel Proceedings

The Chair of the AIC is to preside over the proceedings of the Hearing Panel.

- The AIC Chair is to allow the student to present evidence.
- The AIC Chair may allow the student to present witnesses, at his or her discretion.
- The AIC Chair may allow the instructor to give testimony and present witnesses, at his or her discretion.
- The AIC Chair is to allow panel participants to ask both the student and the instructor questions.

Formal rules of evidence need not apply. If either the student or the instructor fails to attend the hearing, the hearing will still proceed. The student has the right to hear the testimony and witnesses offered by the instructor, as well as to review all evidence submitted by the instructor. At the sole discretion of the AIC Chair, the instructor may be excluded from any part of the panel proceedings. All evidence presented will be considered objectively by the panel. Both the instructor and the student are only to speak when prompted by the AIC Chair. Once all evidence has been presented and panel members have finished with their questions, the Chair will ask everyone to leave except for the panel members, so that deliberations can occur.

AIC Hearing Panel Deliberations

Once the Hearing Panel is alone with the AIC Chair, the Chair will answer any questions that any member of the AIC Hearing Panel might have about the proceedings. Then the Chair will leave the panelists alone to deliberate until they notify the chair that they are ready to vote. The vote is to be private, submitted by paper or secret electronic ballot, and administered by the chair, with the majority determining the outcome. In the event of a tie, the student is to be exonerated of the academic misconduct.

AIC Hearing Panel Records and Findings

The AIC Chair is to keep a record of the proceedings and the outcome, documenting the names of all attendants along with the ultimate finding of the Hearing Panel. If the student has been found to have committed an act of academic misconduct, the AIC Chair is to record the finding in the office of the Chief Academic Officer.

Actions Taken Upon an AIC Hearing Panel Decision

The AIC chair is to notify the student, the instructor, of the outcome of the hearing panel.

If the hearing panel has found the student to have committed an act of academic misconduct, the AIC chair will inform the student's academic advisor of the outcome. The AIC chair will make the following additional notifications if relevant: if the student is an athlete, the Chief Athletics Officer and the Faculty Athletics Representative are to be notified; if the student is a member of ROTC, their Commanding Officer is to be notified. The instructor's dean or designee is also to inform both the student and the instructor of the finding and is to enforce all penalties, which may include expulsion from the university. If applicable, the instructor's dean or designee is also to notify the Registrar to place a "training hold" on the student's account to prevent the student from registering for classes, requesting transcripts, and / or graduating, until he or she receives notification from the appropriate units (i.e., the Writing Center and the Academic Support Center) that any mandatory educational training (see Section VI above) has been completed.

If the student is exonerated of the academic misconduct, the Director of Academic Integrity will release the Academic Integrity holds on the student's academic records and notify the instructor to retract any course-level penalties previously assessed and to re-grade the assignment(s) in question as if no academic misconduct occurred.

Appealing an AIC Hearing Panel Decision

Decisions of an AIC Hearing Panel are final, unless the student can document that a serious procedural error occurred. This documentation must be submitted to the Chief Academic Officer within ten (10) business days of the hearing panel finding. The Chief Academic Officer will then review the student's appeal, make a decision, and notify all parties of the decision and its rationale. The decision of the Chief Academic Officer will be final.

Class Attendance

Class Attendance

The University expects all students to attend regularly and punctually all classes. The instructor in each course has authority to set specific attendance policies consistent with the nature of the course and with the methods of teaching and grading.

Faculty members will inform students of class attendance policies at the beginning of each term. Although the student is responsible for complying with the attendance policy, a faculty member may warn a student about poor attendance. If the student fails to return to class, to complete the course requirements and to properly withdraw from the class, a grade of "F" will be awarded at the end of the term.

Travel for athletic competition may not be scheduled from the opening day of classes for any traditional term to the end of Drop/Add period for that term. Requests for exceptions to this policy must be presented to the Director of Athletics. Athletic events that are part of the logical progression to a Conference championship or NCAA championship are excluded from this prohibition.

University Missed Class Policy

For students who miss class due to participating in a University sanctioned activity, instructors must give reasonable accommodations to make up the missed work, under the following conditions:

- This policy applies only to traditional fifteen-week undergraduate classes, excluding labs.
- "Reasonable accommodations" means that students are given comparable make-up exams or other missed work.
- No more than 20% of in-class instruction of a traditional fifteen-week undergraduate class (for hybrid classes, it is 20% of the in-class time) may be missed for a University sanctioned activity. Any absences incurred beyond this amount do not fall under this policy and the instructor is not required to offer reasonable accommodations. The 20% is inclusive of an instructor's allowed absence limit. For example, if an instructor allows 10% of the class for absences due to any reason, a student can miss 10% for any reason including University sanctioned activities, and another 10% for University sanctioned activities. If a student misses the full 20% for University sanctioned activities, the instructor's 10% has already been used, and the student could be penalized for any further absences according to the instructor's policy stated in the syllabus.
- Students must give formal written notification of the University sanctioned activity to their instructor at least two weeks in advance of the missed class in order to receive reasonable accommodations from the instructor. This notification, which is generated by the department on campus hosting the University sanctioned activity, must be signed by an advisor, faculty, or administrator.
- A student with documentation that they were denied reasonable accommodations for absence due to University sanctioned activity as outlined in this policy may file an appeal (see Section 6).

Students who participate in a University sanctioned activity that causes them to:

- Reach absences that are over 20% of a traditional fifteen-week undergraduate class
- Miss a graduate class
- Miss an accelerated semester class
- Miss a lab

will follow the rules for absences in the instructor's syllabus.

Section 1: University Sanctioned Activity Definition

- A University sanctioned activity shall be one in which a student represents the University to external constituencies in academic, extracurricular, or community engagement activities.
- University sanctioned activities should neither significantly disrupt the primary educational mission of the University nor negatively impact the integrity of the classroom.
- Official notice of a University sanctioned activity shall consist of a formal written notification from the sponsoring unit or program, addressed to the instructor whose class(es) will be missed, delivered by the student, signed by an advisor, faculty, or administrator, with the title "University Sanctioned Activity". This written notification may include a blanket notification for all potential dates to be missed or may also serve as notice for a singular event. This written notification should be sent as early in the semester as possible, but no later than two weeks prior to the event. Exceptions to this time frame may be made in the case of unexpected placements in athletic or academic competitions.

Section 2: Examples of University Sanctioned Activities

- Students acting as official representatives for the University to external constituents, such as:
 - NCAA Intercollegiate Athletic Competition, including student-athletes, student athletic trainers, student athletic managers, cheerleaders, and members of the dance team
 - Varsity Sports Competition
 - Board of Trustees Meetings
 - Special Requests by the Office of the President
 - Annual Legislative Meetings/Lobby Days
- Academic Activities, such as:
 - Competition related to a major or an academic department
 - Fine Arts Performances
 - Marching and Pep Band Performances
 - Responsibilities associated with talent grants/scholarships
 - Conferences
 - Music Competitions
 - International travel experiences, provided these travel activities do not cause the student to miss more than two class days
 - Undergraduate Research, such as JU Faculty & Student Research

- Symposium and National Council on Undergraduate Research Conference {NCUR}
- What Are Not University Sanctioned Activities?
 - Sports clubs/Intramural events
 - Greek "educationals," events, rushes
 - Career Fairs
 - Athletic training, athletics-related doctor visits, or similar
 - Admissions events
 - Meetings with advisors, financial aid, or other administrative offices on campus

Section 3: Procedure for Designating a University Sanctioned Activity

- University sanctioned activities shall be those activities/events listed in this policy (Section 2) and those approved by a subcommittee of the Academic Standards Committee and the Faculty Athletics Committee, with oversight by the Academic Standards Committee. There will be at least one faculty from each college on this subcommittee. Disagreements over the validity of a University activity being categorized as sanctioned shall be referred to the Office of Academic Affairs. If an agreement cannot be reached, the Office of Academic Affairs shall decide the matter, and that decision is final.
- The sponsoring unit or program of an event/activity, along with deans, Student Government Association (SGA), or faculty sponsors of registered student organizations may submit the required form in order to designate a particular event/activity or categories of activities as University sanctioned. This form, requesting that the event/activity be categorized as a University sanctioned activity, must be submitted at least four weeks prior to the event/activity to the Chair of the Academic Standards Committee, who will then send the form to the members of the subcommittee.

Section 4: Reasonable Accommodations Guidelines

Students are permitted to make up exams or other missed class assignments, as determined by the instructor, under this policy. The make-up items must be equivalent in points missed in the student's final course grade.

If a course allows dropping a low grade for assignments, quizzes, or exams, then the instructor must offer reasonable accommodations for making up the missed work and only then will it be counted in the dropped grade category if it qualifies.

Oral presentations, guest speakers, group presentations, artistic performances, critiques, or other similar classroom activities may necessitate special consideration and/or extended time to arrange completion. In the case of participation points, although no penalty for missing class will be applied under this policy, the student may not be able to earn participation points. If this situation will adversely affect the student's course grade, the instructor will find a reasonable alternative for the student to make up these participation points where possible. When no reasonable accommodation can be found for a missed classroom activity (it is either not practical or impossible), a fair and equitable alternative for arriving at a grade for the missed classroom activity will be developed by the instructor.

Section 5: Responsibilities of Student and Instructor

It is the responsibility of the student to request in writing, prior to missing the class, an opportunity from the instructor to receive reasonable accommodations for completing missed classroom activities (i.e., assignments, quizzes, exams, or other course requirements).

The missed classroom activities will be rescheduled at the discretion of the instructor.

Students are responsible for all material covered in classes that they miss, even when their absences are under this policy.

If the instructor believes that the number of absences under this policy will prevent the student from fulfilling the learning experience/mastery that the course requires, the instructor may advise the student to withdraw from the course.

Section 6: Appeals

If a student has the documentation to show that they were denied reasonable accommodations for absence due to University sanctioned activity as outlined in this policy, the student may submit a grade appeal after the student's course grade is posted. See Grade Appeal Policy in the Jacksonville University Academic Catalog

Grade Appeal Process

It is up to each instructor to determine the criteria by which students will be graded. Grading can be a subjective process in which knowledge of class material and the quality of work are both factored into the grade. To facilitate the success of all students, it is appropriate that they be clearly informed about the number of graded assignments and the weight attached to each assignment. If more specific criteria for grades can be explained, it is appropriate that such explanations are included in the syllabus or other course materials. It is also appropriate for students to be informed if class attendance and participation will be calculated in the final grade. Faculty may provide work for extra credit but are under no obligation to do so.

Standard Procedure for Appeals of Grades and Sanctions

It is understood that students may have questions about their grades. Most can easily be answered through consultation with the instructor. In the event that a student feels he/she has been treated unfairly, in that an instructor has deviated from his/her prescribed formula for grading in an arbitrary or punitive manner, the student may appeal the final course grade.

The following timetable and grade appeal process shall be used whenever the student disagrees with a final course grade assigned, except in cases that involve the determination of guilt for an act of academic misconduct that was reported through the Academic Misconduct Notification Form.

Academic Integrity and Misconduct Process

Academic misconduct must be reported through the Academic Misconduct Notification Form and the policies and procedures outlined in the "Academic Integrity and Misconduct" section of this catalog will apply.

Any cases involving alleged acts of academic misconduct that have not been reported through this form are to be governed by the procedures listed below. Students who have admitted academic misconduct, or who have been found guilty of committing academic misconduct by an Academic Integrity Council hearing panel, will need to follow the entire process below if they feel the instructor's penalty for the misconduct was not assessed and applied in accordance with the instructor's stated syllabus policies and therefore lowered their final grade unfairly.

In the event that an instructor has penalized a student in some way for an act of academic misconduct, but failed to report the incident through the Academic Misconduct Notification Form (required in JU's Academic Integrity and Misconduct Policy), the student may challenge this penalty by reporting this violation of university policy to the instructor's dean within 30 days after the final course grade has been issued. If the instructor's dean is able to verify that no Academic Misconduct Notification Form was filed at the time the incident occurred, such penalties are to be automatically reversed.

Leave of Absence Policy

Leave of Absence Policy

Policy:

A leave of absence (LOA) is considered a temporary break in attendance that begins after the successful completion of an academic term or semester, but is not considered a withdrawal from the university. The LOA is limited to degree-seeking students who have completed a minimum of one academic term of coursework and in good academic standing. The temporary withdrawal is for reasons beyond the student's control such as military service, financial exigency or pressing personal reasons. If they student is needing a Medical Withdrawal, they must follow the process for that purpose. Students using federal financial aid may be subject to additional restrictions and should meet with the Financial Aid Office before taking leave.

A LOA is for one or two semesters. Beyond 2 semesters a student will be considered withdrawn from the university and will have to apply for readmission. No academic activities may be conducted during the LOA and the LOA may not be used to avoid payment of tuition. LOA's are typically limited to one academic year.

Requesting a Leave of Absence:

The Leave of Absence Form must be submitted at least 10 days prior to the beginning of the term/semester the leave is to start.

To receive approval for an LOA:

1. The student must have successfully completed at least 1 semester/term in their current degree program.
2. The student must be in an academic standing that does not prohibit registration.
3. The student must not have hold(s) (i.e. disciplinary, financial, etc.) which would prohibit registration.

- 4. Drop all registered courses for the term of the absence.
- 5. The student must submit the Leave of Absence E-Form.

Medical Withdrawal Policy

The University recognizes that severe, unforeseen personal medical situations may arise, which prohibit a student from continuing and completing his/her coursework within a given semester. Should such circumstances occur within the published withdrawal period of a semester, the student should withdraw through the University Registrar's Office. However, for situations occurring after the published withdrawal period, students may appeal to the Senior Vice President for Student Affairs /Dean of Students or his/her designee for a medical withdrawal from the University. Students may be eligible to apply for a medical withdrawal for specific courses, if the request is submitted prior to the end of the term/posting of grades. In order to be eligible for a partial or full medical withdrawal, the student must submit sufficient medical documentation to support the withdrawal. Requests received after the completion of the term/posting of grades are complete withdrawals from the University, for all courses in which a student is registered. Such appeals should be promptly directed in writing to the Senior Vice President for Student Affairs/Dean of Students, and must be accompanied by specific supporting medical documentation, from a licensed health care provider directly caring for the student, and must specify how the medical condition directly impacted coursework or the ability to attend class. These appeals should be made within the semester for which the medical withdrawal is being requested, and no later than the withdrawal date of the following academic semester, with summer terms included. The Senior Vice President for Student Affairs/Dean of Students and other relevant University officials and faculty members will evaluate the validity of such appeals, based upon this policy, and respond within a reasonable time period. If the request is submitted after grades have been submitted, the relevant professors will also be consulted in considering the granting of a medical withdrawal. If the request is submitted after grades have been submitted, the professors must also approve the medical withdrawal. A medical withdrawal, when granted, impacts a student's academic registration only, and any appeals of tuition and fees paid must be directed separately to the Office of Student Financial Assistance. Questions about this general policy should be directed to the Student Life Office (Davis Student Commons, third floor, 904-256-7067).

Missed Class Policy

For students who miss class due to participating in a University sanctioned activity, instructors must give reasonable accommodations to make up the missed work, under the following conditions:

- This policy applies to traditional fall and spring full semester undergraduate classes, excluding labs.
- "Reasonable accommodations" means that students are given comparable make-up exams or other missed work.
- No more than 20% of in-class instruction undergraduate class (for synchronous or hybrid classes, it is 20% of the in-class time) may be missed for a University sanctioned activity. Any absences incurred beyond this amount do not fall under this policy and the instructor is not required to offer reasonable accommodations. The 20% is inclusive of an instructor's allowed absence limit. For example, if an instructor allows 15% of the class for absences due to any reason, a student can miss 5 % for University sanctioned activities. If a student misses the full 20% for University sanctioned activities, the instructor's 15% has already been used, and the student could be penalized for any further absences according to the instructor's policy stated in the syllabus. The following table lists the maximum number of absences allowed for different situations. The meeting time (once per week, twice per week and 3 times per week are according to the university catalog, if the instructor makes adjustments to increasing the class meeting time, the calculation is still based on the university catalog). The number of weeks is the weeks for instructions, the finals week and spring break are excluded. Currently, the traditional fall and spring semesters at Jacksonville University are all 14 weeks.

This form, requesting that the event/ activity be categorized as a University sanctioned activity, must be submitted at least four weeks prior to the event/ activity to the Chair of the Academic Standards Committee, who will then send the form to the members of the subcommittee.

Section 4: Reasonable Accommodations Guidelines

Students are permitted to make up exams or other missed class assignments, as determined by the instructor, under this policy. The make-up items must be equivalent in points missed in the student's final course grade.

If a course allows dropping a low grade for assignments, quizzes, or exams, then the instructor must offer reasonable accommodations for making up the missed work and only then will it be counted in the dropped grade category if it qualifies.

Oral presentations, guest speakers, group presentations, artistic performances, critiques, or other similar classroom activities may necessitate special consideration and/ or extended time to arrange completion. In the case of participation points, although no penalty for missing class will be applied under this policy, the student may not be able to earn participation points. If this situation will adversely affect the student's course grade, the instructor will find a reasonable alternative for the student to make up these participation points where possible. When no reasonable accommodation can be found for a missed classroom activity (it is either not practical or impossible), a fair and equitable alternative for arriving at a grade for the missed classroom activity will be developed by the instructor.

Section 5: Responsibilities of Student and Instructor

It is the responsibility of the student to request in writing, prior to missing the class, an opportunity from the instructor to receive reasonable accommodations for completing missed classroom activities (i.e., assignments, quizzes, exams, or other course requirements).

The missed classroom activities will be rescheduled at the discretion of the instructor.

Students are responsible for all material covered in classes that they miss, even when their absences are under this policy.

If the instructor believes that the number of absences under this policy will prevent the student from fulfilling the learning experience/mastery that the course requires, the instructor may submit Academic Intervention Form (AIF) or advise to withdraw from course.

Section 6: Appeals

If a student has the documentation to show that they were denied reasonable accommodations for absence due to University sanctioned activity as outlined in this policy, the student may submit a grade appeal after the student's course grade is posted. See Grade Appeal Policy in the JU Academic Catalog.

Consistent with the mission of Jacksonville University, the Keigwin School of Nursing is committed to the success of each student as a self-assured, competent, caring professional nurse, who practices in an evolving, complex health care environment, provides leadership to promote health among culturally diverse people and promotes the advancement of nursing knowledge through evidence-based practice and life-long learning.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree is based on a strong liberal arts and science foundation and is offered to traditional and nontraditional students. The Keigwin School of Nursing prepares professional nurses as self-assured, competent generalists who think critically, engage in clinical inquiry, communicate effectively, and access and manage the health needs of clients in a variety of settings.

To strengthen their introduction into the Nursing profession and development as future Nurses, Nursing majors may join the Student Nurses Association (SNA). The SNA works to provide opportunity for personal, intellectual, professional and social growth of its members. Benefits include social networking, campus and community relation building, and opportunities for growth in leadership.

Programs

- **Freshman Acceptance Program** - A general four-year undergraduate degree where students are accepted into the nursing program as freshman. Nursing classes begin in the fall semester of the sophomore year. Students will have the opportunity to live together in a designated block of dorm rooms, will be required to take the introduction to nursing elective, be assigned a KSON advisor and mentor, and participate in KSON social events throughout the academic year. By the end of the freshman year, students must meet minimum nursing admission standards for progression into nursing courses.
- **Traditional BSN Program** - A 28-month program for students holding an AA, or other Associate degree (must satisfy JU's Articulation Agreement), or a BA or BS degree from a regionally accredited college or university **OR** who have completed all Jacksonville University undergraduate core courses. Nursing classes begin in the fall and spring semester.
- **Accelerated BSN Program** - A 12 or 16-month program for students who have a BS or BA from a regionally accredited college or university. Nursing classes begin in the summer semester. A foreign MD to BSN program option is available. Foreign MD to BSN students must meet the second degree to BSN admission criteria and follow the second degree curriculum. Students with an AA or AS degree may apply for the 16-month accelerated BSN program.
- **LPN-BSN Program-A** program for Licensed practical nurses with one year of experience that also hold an AA, or other Associate degree (must satisfy JU's Articulation Agreement), or a BA or BS degree from a regionally accredited college or university **OR** who have completed all Jacksonville University undergraduate core courses. Nursing classes begin in the fall and spring semester.
- **RN-BSN Completion Track** - For registered nurses, offered through an online/distance learning format.

Admission

Students must seek to gain admission to the University to qualify for admission to the Keigwin School of Nursing. The University admission procedure and the admission procedure to the School of Nursing is done with the same application. Admission to the Keigwin School of Nursing is a selective process. The satisfaction of minimum requirements does not automatically guarantee admission. Only a limited number of students may be admitted into the nursing major each year. Transfer credit for nursing courses counted toward the BSN will be evaluated on an individual basis and approved by the Associate Dean of the Nursing program.

Academic Standards of Progress

JU enforces a policy of standards of academic progress. The quality of work completed must meet the minimum standards published in this Catalog, or the student will be placed on probation, suspended, or dismissed. To graduate from JU, an undergraduate student is required to have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0; a graduate student is required to have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0. The University reviews the academic progress of students each term and informs those not making satisfactory progress so that appropriate corrective actions may be taken. Term is defined as any grading period, whether Traditional 15 week, Accelerated 8-week, or Summer 6-Week.

Probation, Suspension and Dismissal

The following academic policies apply to undergraduate students. Graduate students may refer to the appropriate graduate degree program section of the Catalog. Academic actions are based on attempted or earned credits (whichever is greater) and on the cumulative grade point average (CGPA).

- Freshmen and transfer students will not be suspended after their first term.
- Students who are on suspension or who have been dismissed are not considered to be in good academic standing.
- Students who are on probation or continued probation may take no more than 15 credits during fall or spring traditional term and no more than three credits during an accelerated term.
- Classes taken at another school during the term(s) of suspension will not be evaluated for transfer credit at JU. Classes taken at another school, after the suspension has expired, will be evaluated for transfer credit when the student is readmitted.
- A student who is on continued probation for two consecutive terms will be suspended for one traditional term or two accelerated terms.
- If a student is suspended a second time, the suspension will be for two traditional terms or four accelerated terms.
- A student suspended a third time will be dismissed.
- A student being readmitted after suspension must:
 - Meet with an advisor from the Academic Advising Center, if they are a Traditional Undergraduate.
 - Meet with their advisor if in Accelerated Degree program or Cohort RN-BSN.
 - Contact their Advisor if in the online program.
- A student may file a written appeal of their suspension with the Registrar's Office, within the guidelines outlined in the Suspension Letter. The appeal will be reviewed by a Committee composed of the Academic Dean of their College/School, Director of the Academic Advising Center, and the Registrar or their representatives.

Grades and Grading System

The final letter grade a student receives in a course is converted to a numerical equivalent, or grade point(s), to indicate the quality of work for each credit hour of college work completed. The following table defines the letter grades and reflects the conversion to grade points. JU operates on a 4.0 system.

The grades "A," "A-," "B+," "B," "B-," "C+," "C," "C-," "D+," "D," "D-," and "F" are used to compute grade point averages (GPAs). An "I" indicates that a student did not complete a course for a reason acceptable to the professor and requested and received permission to complete the course within the first four (4) weeks of the next Fall or Spring semester. The student must be passing and have completed all but a particular segment of a course to qualify for a grade of "I." The "I" will be converted to the appropriate letter grade if the course work is completed by the end of the fourth week of the next Fall or Spring semester. Faculty may grant an extension of the time to complete the "I" grade to the last day of classes of the next semester by submitting a written request to the Registrar's Office. If the "I" course work is not completed on schedule, the "I" will convert to an "F." The "I" converted to grades "A" through "F" will then be used in computing the GPA and may result in a change of academic status if the resulting GPA so indicates. Grades of "P," "I," "AU," and "W" are not considered in computing GPAs.

***Incomplete grades for flight laboratory courses**

Depending on the circumstances, and given the special nature of flight training, students will be given a reasonable amount of time to complete an incomplete grade ("I") in a flight laboratory (AVO) course.

However, the following policy will be followed for those students with incompletes:

1. Students will be given 12 calendar months from the date of registration in a flight (AVO) course to satisfactorily complete the course.
2. If the student fails to complete the course within the above time period then the student will be given a deadline to complete or withdraw from the course.
3. If the student does not withdraw from the course by the deadline, then the student will receive an "F" in the course and will be automatically dis-enrolled from L3 Airline Academy's L41 flight program.

A flight-training course is considered completed and a grade is given once the final stage check from L3 Airline Academy has been successfully accomplished for that course. If a FAA Practical Test is taken following completion of that course, the results from the FAA Practical Test will not affect any of the student's academic grades.

The formula for determining the grade points for a semester course is:

Letter Grade(Numerical equivalent) x Nos. Hours Credit=Grade Points

$$3.0 \times 3 = 9$$

Similarly, the formula to compute the GPA is:

Total Grade Points ÷ Total credit hours attempted = GPA

$$45 \div 15 = 3.0$$

Undergraduate students must maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average (CGPA) to avoid adverse academic action and to qualify for graduation. Similarly, graduate students must maintain a 3.0 CGPA.

Student transcripts reflect each course attempted and the grade received for each attempt, including repeated attempts. In the case of repeated attempts of the same course, the grade awarded for each attempt is included in the GPA computation. If a student earns an "F" in a course, that grade will remain on the transcript and will be used in computing GPAs even though the course may be repeated later for credit and a passing grade earned.

Grade Substitution Policy was implemented for undergraduate students with the start of the 2011 Fall terms. The Grade Substitution Policy is outlined below:

1. Applies only for undergraduate students enrolled in undergraduate courses.
2. Grade Substitution may be used twice during an undergraduate career at JU.
3. Once an undergraduate degree is conferred, the Grade Substitution Policy is no longer permitted.
4. The Grade Substitution Request Form must be completed and submitted to the Registrars' Office before the end of the 100% drop period for the term when the course is repeated.
5. If the Grade Substitution results in a Withdraw:
 1. The "W" grade counts as one of your two Grade Substitutions
 2. The original grade will remain in your Cumulative Grade Point Average (cum GPA).
6. If the Grade Substitution results in a "F" grade:
 1. The "F" grade counts as one of your to Grade substitutions.
 2. The "F" Grade will replace the original grade in the Cum GPA, even if the original grade was passing.

7. The original Term GPA will not change to reflect the Grade Substitution, only your Cum GPA will change.
8. If a grade awarded was due to academic dishonesty, the course is not eligible for Grade Substitution.

Some JU courses may be repeated for degree credit. Such courses have a repeatability statement in the course description. All other courses may be repeated to improve a student's GPA, but not for degree credit. If any course is repeated, but is not specified as repeatable for credit in the Catalog, the grade earned will be included in the GPA, but no hours earned are credited toward the degree requirements.

Students who have been officially accepted by the Admission offices for study in the University may register for credit or "audit" in any course for which they meet the necessary prerequisites. Students enrolled for "audit" may be exempt from examinations and will receive neither grade nor credit toward a degree. Once enrolled, the "audit" status may not be changed after the drop/add period. That is, a student may not change from "audit" to "credit" or vice versa.

Graduate students in graduate courses do not receive "C-," "D+," "D," and "D-" grades since such grades do not count toward graduate degree credit. Graduate students in such courses who earn less than a "C" receive a grade of "F." Graduate students enrolled in undergraduate courses are not affected by this rule for those undergraduate courses.

Grade Reports and Transcripts

Final grades are due in the Registrar's Office the Thursday after the end of each term. Grading due dates can be found on the University's Academic Calendar.

Students may view their grades on-line using Self-Service.

An official Jacksonville University transcript is a complete record of a student's enrollment at the University, including all undergraduate, graduate and professional courses. Partial transcripts are not available. Transcripts may be requested by using the link on the My Cove Page or the Transcript Request Link on the Registrar's Office page.

Pass/Fail Option

A Pass/Fail option, with grading restricted to a grade of "Pass" or "Fail," is available to degree-seeking undergraduates who have earned at least 28 credit hours and who are not subject to any type of probation. The option is not available to graduate students. It is designed to encourage students to explore subjects outside their major areas and acquire a broader, better-rounded education.

Basic regulations of the Pass/Fail option include:

- Pass/Fail options may be taken only in courses outside the student's major and minor fields and do not fulfill departmental major or minor requirements.
- Any course taken on a Pass/Fail basis cannot be used to satisfy any of the core requirements for any degree.
- Pass/Fail options must be submitted on the Pass/Fail Audit Form provided by the Registrar's Office and may not be changed to the regular letter grade system after the final day for changing schedules (drop/add period). Students may not change from a letter grade system to pass/fail option after the final day of the drop/add period.
- Pass/Fail options cannot be used to correct any type of academic deficiency or to earn hours by repeating a failed course.
- Qualified students may take a maximum of 12 credit hours on a Pass/Fail basis. Full-time students may take a maximum of four credit hours of Pass/Fail options per semester. If students take at least eight credit hours in a summer term, they may take a maximum of four credit hours of Pass/Fail options in the term. Part-time students may take four credit hours of Pass/Fail options every 12 credit hours of courses.
- The Pass/Fail option is intended to apply as broadly as possible throughout the University's curriculum, with the exception of core curriculum and major requirements. Divisions may, with the approval of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs, exclude individual courses from the option.
- The following courses may not be taken on a Pass/Fail basis:
 - English: ENGL 103 and ENGL 203
 - Any course used to fulfill core curriculum requirements
 - Courses required by the major or minor
 - Honors courses
 - Independent study courses
- A "P" is earned for "D-" quality work or better; the credit hours are counted in hours earned toward a degree, but the GPA is unaffected. An "F" has the value of a regular "F," and the GPA is appropriately affected.
- Courses taken on a Pass/Fail basis may not be acceptable as transfer credits at another university.

Class Standings

Class standing is classified by earned credits as follows:

- Freshman - 0 to 28 credit hours earned
- Sophomore - 29 to 57 credit hours earned
- Junior - 58 to 89 credit hours earned
- Senior - 90+ credit hours earned

Course Loads

The normal course load for a full-time undergraduate student during fall and spring semesters is 12-18 credit hours. An undergraduate student must obtain course overload permission from the appropriate college dean(s) if he/she wishes to register for:

- More than 18 credits during a fall or spring semester
- More than 15 credits during the summer semester (total of all terms, eligibility for overload will be determined based on length of summer term in which the overload occurs)
- More than 7 credits during a winter term

Course Withdrawal

After the drop/add period a student may withdraw from a course during a specified withdrawal period. The withdrawal period normally extends until the end of the tenth week of the traditional fall and spring semesters or the fourth week of a summer or accelerated term. Students should consult the academic calendar for exact dates. Withdrawal requests from a course or courses normally will not be considered if received after the last day to withdraw. Exceptions will be granted only upon approval by the appropriate college dean subject to a student appeal based upon an unforeseen and unavoidable emergency that precludes completion of the course or courses.

Students who have been assigned a course grade of “F” due to academic misconduct may not withdraw or be withdrawn from that course at any time.

Withdrawal requests received subsequent to the dates established in the academic calendar as the “Last day to change schedules,” and prior to the “Last day to withdraw” will receive grades of “W.” Grades of “W” will be reflected on the student’s transcript, but are not computed into the student’s GPA. Students who fail to attend a course or courses without filing a withdrawal request will receive a grade of “F” in each course.

To withdraw from a course or courses, a student must use self service to conduct the withdrawal on or before the published withdrawal deadlines. In the event of a technical issue, students may email their withdrawal request to registrar@ju.edu. The request must state the student’s name and course and must be timestamped ahead of the withdrawal deadline. Student-athletes are required to complete the Student-Athlete Withdrawal eform.

In the case of course withdrawal, the student must ensure that his or her eligibility for financial aid, scholarships, participation in sports or other student activities, work, or any other condition that requires full-time student status at JU is maintained.

Full-Time Status

Undergraduate students who enroll for 12 or more credit hours (excluding auditing a class) during fall semester, spring semester or the summer semester are classified as full-time students. Under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, some students with disabilities may enroll for less than 12 credit hours but, by exception, still qualify as full-time students. These cases will be approved on a case-by-case basis.

Graduate students are classified as full-time students if enrolled in six or more credit hours (excluding auditing a class) during a fall, spring semester or summer term.

Registration

Registration is the formal process of selecting, arranging, and reserving the student’s academic schedule for each semester or term in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Registrar. The registration periods are listed in the academic calendar on the Registrar’s web page.

Students who fail to clear accounts with the Office of Student Financial Services may have their registration canceled. Once a student has registered for a class or classes for any term, the student is obligated to pay the required tuition and fees for that term and will receive a grade for each course unless the student executes a formal withdrawal during the withdrawal period.

Although the University reserves the right to cancel the registration of students who fail to attend class or who does not make adequate arrangements to pay their tuition and fees, it is the student’s responsibility to ensure accurate academic records. Registration cancellation does not eliminate the student’s obligation to pay the accrued tuition and fees. The student is responsible for registering for the proper courses.

Course offerings and registrations are at the discretion of the University. Sections may be moved or canceled at any time. Students will be notified through their JU email of any course scheduling updates. In the event of a canceled course, students should contact their faculty/academic advisor and/or select another course.

Schedule Changes - Drop/Add

Students may change class schedules by adding or dropping courses during the first week of classes of the given term. Schedule changes are completed in Self-Service through My Cove.

AVO classes (flight labs) require special permission from the Director, School of Aviation to register for classes. Due to the nature of flight training, students will be allowed to enroll or withdraw from these lab classes outside of the normal Add/Drop/Withdraw period.

Current fees are listed on the Student Financial Services website. These fees are automatically added to the student’s account and can be waived only in cases where the University is at fault. The effective date of all drop/add transactions will be the date they are processed in the University’s systems.

Semester/Credit Hours

This policy documents Jacksonville University’s compliance with regional and national accrediting guidelines. The University’s policy aligns with both SACSCOC (Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges) [Standard 10.7](#) and subsequent [policy](#), along with federal regulations defining credit hours as established in [Section 600.2](#), which defines a credit hour as:

1. *One hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester or trimester hour of credit, or ten to twelve weeks for one quarter hour of credit, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; or*
2. *At least an equivalent amount of work as required in paragraph (1) of this definition for other academic activities as established by the institution, including laboratory work, internships, practica, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours.*

Definition

In accordance with federal government guidelines, Jacksonville University defines one credit hour as the amount of student time investment that reasonably approximates one hour of classroom (or direct faculty instruction) and a minimum of two hours out-of-class student work for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester—or the equivalent amount of that work as established by JU, including laboratory work, internships, practica, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours.

In accordance with commonly accepted practices in higher education, JU operates on a 50-minute hour for this definition. Fifty clock minutes per week per credit hour for approximately 15 weeks provides approximately 750 minutes of direct faculty instruction time per credit hour based on the Carnegie Unit. This basic measure may be adjusted proportionately to reflect modified academic calendars and formats of study.

Credit hours are granted for various types of instruction as follows:

1. Lecture, discussion, or seminar: one contact hour constitutes one credit hour (1:1)

2. Self-Contained laboratory period (under direct supervision of faculty, including music ensembles and studio classes): 3 contact hours constitutes one credit hour (3:1)
3. Non-Self-Contained Laboratory Session (requires outside preparation by student, including internships and practica): 2 contact hours constitutes one credit hour (2:1)
4. Hybrid, online, and other courses of less than a full semester's duration should be commensurate with the above guidelines and will generally follow the 1:1 formula. In order to compensate for the loss of contact hours, courses may either hold longer class times than the regular academic schedule or add a component of coursework to equalize the workload with a traditional semester course. Courses taught in a non-traditional medium or with fewer than standard classroom hours must achieve the same learning outcomes as a traditional class meeting for a standard 15-week semester.

Other proposed credit hour/contact hour combinations will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis using the above guidelines, and a decision made by the faculty of the department or division. It is the responsibility of the Curriculum Committee to ensure that new courses meet the credit policy expectations in the approval process.

Documenting Credit Hours

All student work must be able to be documented, including a reasonable approximation of time required for a student to complete course assignments.

- The average adult reading rate is 250 words per minute with 70% comprehension. [Smith, Brenda D. "Breaking Through: College Reading" 7th Ed. Longman, 2004]
- Reading speed can be divided into three categories: reading for learning (100-200 wpm); reading for comprehension (200-400 wpm); and skimming (400-700 wpm). With an average of 400 words per page, at 200 words per minute, a student should read around 30 pages per hour (200 words per minute x 60 = 12,000 words per hour divided by 400 = 30 pages per hour). Therefore, we are using 25-30 pages per hour.
- Audiobooks are recommended to be 150-160 words per minute or 22 pages per hour.
- Reading on a monitor is estimated to be 180-200 wpm or 27 pages per hour.
- Slide presentations can be calculated at 100 wpm or 15 slides per hour.
- Discussion forum times are based on an analysis of average time spent in online graduate courses [Brown, A. H., & Green, T. (2009). Time students spend reading threaded discussions in online graduate courses requiring asynchronous participation. The International Review of Research in Open and Distributed Learning, 10(6), 51-64.]

Transient Study at Another Institution

Degree candidates at JU who wish to take courses at another institution and receive credit for such courses at JU should obtain, in advance, written authorization on the Application to Study at Another Institution eForm, available through My Cover. The [Transfer of Credit Policy](#) applies to any request to take courses elsewhere. Students on suspension will not be awarded transfer credits for courses completed at another institution during the period of suspension.

Core Curriculum - Undergraduate

The Core Curriculum supports the University's mission of ensuring student success by helping provide the breadth of knowledge that is essential for the college-educated person. The core provides the liberal arts foundation for all bachelor's degrees. Courses in the core curriculum examine the disciplines that the University faculty deems important to a liberal arts education. These core courses include:

- economics
- English/writing
- English/literature
- fine arts
- global studies (foreign language or international studies)
- history
- humanities
- laboratory science
- mathematics
- philosophy
- social science
- technology

Courses in the core curriculum also are intended to help students develop their skills in writing, speaking, and critical thinking. Core requirements are extensive enough to provide a solid foundation, but they are also focused enough to allow students considerable flexibility in completing most degree programs. The University faculty encourages students, where possible, to pursue double majors, acquire minors, participate in internships and independent studies, education abroad, and carry out service learning projects.

Core seminar courses are included as an option to satisfy the core requirement in many disciplines. All core seminar courses are numbered 189. The disciplinary prefix determines which core requirement is satisfied. For example, HIST 189 satisfies the history core requirement. Core seminar courses are approved by the faculty in the disciplines in which the survey is offered. Each core seminar must meet the same core goals and core learning objectives as the other courses that satisfy the same core requirement. All seminars share the following course description:

Core Seminar (3-4)

The seminar is an intensive study of a topic from the perspective of a particular discipline. The course introduces students to basic research principles and methods appropriate to the discipline. All seminar courses include research assignments appropriate to the 100 level. Seminars also emphasize discipline-appropriate communication skills, including writing, oral presentation, and/or artistic expression. Seminars may be cross-listed to promote interdisciplinary studies. May be repeated for credit when topic is different.

If a seminar is cross-listed, students receive core credit for the discipline in which they register. Credit is not given for both disciplines. For example, if HIST 189 and PHIL 189 are cross-listed, a student can register for either course and receive core credit in that discipline, but cannot register for both courses or receive core credit in both history and philosophy.

Core Curriculum - Undergraduate

Core Educational Goals

Listed below are learning goals taught and assessed through the JU Core Curriculum. To achieve these goals students will need to master clearly defined learning outcomes associated with each goal.

- **Effective Communication:** Students will write and speak clearly using appropriate oral and written conventions, formats, and technologies within the various disciplines they study.
- **Inquiry and Discovery:** Students will be able to solve problems in multiple academic disciplines. They will be conversant with the methods employed in the sciences and they will understand how they have produced new discoveries.
- **Research Skills:** Students will have a functional understanding of how to access information resources and use them to support their academic inquiry and research.
- **Use of Technology:** Students will have a functional understanding of information resources and will learn to use personal technology appropriately.
- **Aesthetics:** Students will engage with various forms of art and in artistic processes.
- **Cultural Literacy:** Students will have a general understanding of World literature, a basic knowledge of World History, some general understanding of the history of philosophy, religion, the humanities and the social sciences to understand of the origin and influence of the ideas and values that have shaped the world in which they live.
- **Responsible Citizenship:** Students will learn how to be responsible citizens. They will have the experience of responsible involvement in the community, and they will understand how to act with an informed awareness of contemporary social issues at the local, national and international level. Students will be challenged to develop their leadership abilities by moving beyond academic learning to envisioning and instituting concrete practical solutions to community problems.

Core Curriculum - Undergraduate

Core Curriculum Requirements

Based on placement results, some students may be required to complete additional course work in English and/or mathematics before enrolling in the core courses in those disciplines. [MATH 104](#) is a prerequisite for [MATH 189](#).

- Students must earn a minimum grade of "C-" in [ENGL 103](#) and should complete this introductory writing course in their first year of enrollment.
 - Students who have scored a 3 on either the AP Language and Composition or the AP Literature and Composition exams are automatically placed in 103H.
 - Students who have scored a 4 or a 5 on the AP Language and Composition exam are given credit for [ENGL 103](#) and placed in an honors section of an English/literature core requirement course.
 - Students who have scored a 4 or a 5 on the AP Literature and Composition exam earn three (3) hours of English elective credit and are placed in ENGL 103H.
- All students enrolled in [ENGL 103](#) must pass an Exit Exam at the end of the term. Students not meeting minimum requirements on this exit exam are required to enroll in ENGL 214WI prior to reaching 60 hours. It is not necessary to pass the exit exam in order to pass ENGL 103. ENGL 214WI counts as a University elective. Students who have not completed ENGL 214WI before the end of their Sophomore year will be automatically registered in ENGL 214WI.
- Students need to complete both [ENGL 103](#) and the literature core requirement before enrolling in any HUM course.
- [ENGL 103](#) is a prerequisite for all English courses numbered above 199.
- Students should complete their computing science and mathematics requirements by the end of their sophomore year.
- **First Year Seminar Requirements**

All first-year students will be automatically enrolled in and must complete [JU 111](#) their first semester on campus. Honors students may substitute JU 169. Transfer students in their second year or beyond are exempt. Students entering with an AA degree are exempt.

Fine Arts Requirements

Students must complete a minimum of three (3) semester credit hours in the Linda Berry Stein College of Fine Arts & Humanities. Credit may be earned by a single course or a combination of courses in the following disciplines:

- Art History (ARH)
- Art (ART)
- Dance (DANC)
- Media Arts (MART)
- Music (MUS)
- Theatre (THEA)

Course content may in nature be experiential (e.g., applied art, music, etc.) and/or reflective (e.g., history or appreciation of art, music, etc.).

To gain an experience of the rich diversity of the arts, students must attend events sponsored by the College of Fine Arts (e.g., concerts, exhibitions, performances, etc.).

Foreign Language Requirements

Students pursuing the Bachelor of Arts degree must complete one 202-level or above foreign language course or equivalent. Students pursuing the Bachelor of Science and other Bachelor degrees *who elect to take foreign language to satisfy the Global Studies requirement* must complete one 102-level or above foreign language course or equivalent. International or bilingual students who are granted a waiver from the foreign language requirement must still satisfy the Global Studies requirement by taking one International Studies (IS) course or studying a new language through the 102 level.

The Communication, English and Film majors are offered only as BA degree programs. Students in these programs must complete one 202-level or above foreign language course or equivalent, even if they enter with an Associate of Arts (AA) degree from a regionally-accredited community college.

Students who place at the 300 level on a foreign language placement exam will be awarded six hours of credit for FREN or SPAN 201 and 202 upon satisfactory completion, with a grade of "C" or better, of a 300- or 400-level course.

Students who do not place at the 300-level on a foreign language placement exam must take the necessary three credit hours to satisfy the foreign language for the Core Global Studies requirement.

Alternative Core Curriculum Requirements

The core curriculum described in this section was designed for most degree programs at the University. However, the faculty has approved alternative core curriculum requirements for the following program:

Nursing (BSN) Requirements

- Exempt from core Mathematics as long as [MATH 205](#) (Elementary Statistics) is completed.
- Exempt from core Social Sciences as long as [PSYC 210](#) (Human Growth & Development) is completed.

These exceptions also apply to the Health Science major.

Experiential Learning Programs

The following Experiential Learning programs apply towards the Experiential Learning core curriculum graduation requirement. These opportunities are intended to assist students in developing skills in critical thinking, communication, diversity, and teamwork. For general questions about Experiential Learning, students can contact the Office of Experiential Learning, Gooding Building 109, 904-256-7881.

JU Education Abroad and Education Away Programs

Jacksonville University is committed to providing its students with a world-class education. The University has embraced education abroad and away as ideal forms of experiential learning. JU has developed select programs around the world where students can immerse themselves in the local cultures, participate in internships and community service opportunities, and study alongside local students. The University considers international experience to be an integral part of liberal arts and professional education for the 21st century.

JU Education Abroad programs are unique in many ways. Most courses are taught in English. Programs are designed to be affordable to all students; in addition, students may be eligible for federal and state financial aid to participate. Extensive on-site support services are also available to JU students abroad.

JU faculty have led education abroad programs and taught courses in the Bahamas, China, Ecuador, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Spain, South Africa, and Thailand. Semester and summer study abroad programs are available in dozens of countries around the globe. In addition to international locations, JU faculty have led education away programs in ideal destinations such as New York City.

JU is dedicated to providing a global education for its students through International Education Programs (IEP) and other vendors. They offer a full catalog of programs accessible to most students and majors. Students can study abroad for as short a time as the week of Spring Break, two to six weeks in the summer, or as long as an academic year. Each program provides quality international academic experiences at some of the most prestigious institutions of higher education in Europe, Australia, Asia, Africa, and Latin America. Whether students are interested in developing their language skills, immersing themselves in other cultures or earning credit toward their degrees, they will help students realize their international academic goals.

JU students and non-JU students (admitted to JU as transient students) receive credit from JU with grades that are calculated into their GPA for faculty led courses that were taken abroad.

JU students and non-JU students (admitted to JU as transient students) receive credit from JU with grades that are **not** calculated into their grade point average, for participation in any approved IEP (or other vendor) summer, semester or study abroad program. To be acceptable for credit, the appropriate college deans and chairs of the divisions concerned must approve international study and other learning abroad activities. NROTC students must have their commanding officer's approval to study abroad.

Students planning to participate in Education Abroad must also notify the Registrar's Office and the Office of Student Financial Assistance at the time that an application for education abroad is submitted. Courses taken abroad must meet University academic standards and form a coherent part of the student's four-year curriculum plan. JU degree-seeking students may not participate in more than three semesters or 45 semester credit hours total in Education Abroad programs. Students who are enrolled in a semester program must take at least 12 credit hours. Students may take up to 15 of their last 30 semester hour credits in Education Abroad programs. Students who study abroad their last semester may have their graduation postponed to the next graduation date due to the dates of the Study Abroad Term or for the time it takes to receive the transcript from the foreign school. JU faculty led programs do not count against students' residency hours or apply toward the previously mentioned restrictions.

Study Abroad or Away Class

An independent Study Abroad or Away class is available to students for the opportunity to study abroad or at different US sites and use financial aid. The same number, 144 or 544, will be used by all departments with their department designation, i.e. ENGL 144, BIOL 144, or EDU 544.

The XXX 144 and XXX 544 class:

- The XXX 144 and XXX 544 classes will be associated with a JU Fall or Spring class as a co-requisite, but will be taught and graded independently.
- Students will register for the JU catalog class and the XXX 144 or XXX 544 classes at the same time.
- May be repeated for credit when the topic changes.
- May be offered as Pass/Fail or for a letter grade. The instructor will include the grading type when submitting the XXX 144 or XXX 544 class to the Registrar's Office for scheduling.
- Will be variable credits (0-4).
- The 3 or 4 credit XXX 144 class must meet the University's approval for Experiential Learning.

A Program Fee will be added to the JU catalog Fall or Spring class that covers the cost of the XXX 144 or XXX 544 class. The Program Fee follows the payment schedule and refund tables of the Fall or Spring term where the JU catalog class is offered. If the student does not take the summer trip after completing the Spring class, the Program Fee is not refunded. If the student takes the summer trip, but drops the Fall class during the 100% refund period, they will not be charged the Program Fee.

Where the Study Abroad or Away class and trip are housed in the same Fall, Spring, or Summer term, the class offered will be the catalog JU class and the XXX 144 or XXX 544 class will not be used. Tuition and the Program Fee will be charged for the JU catalog class.

Internship Program

The University internship program is designed to provide junior and senior students practical experience in areas related to their major fields of study. Since the internship involves the awarding of academic credit, this experience is expected to:

- Require the student to apply the concepts, theories or practices learned in the classroom and to test the application of these ideas in actual situations encountered in the nonacademic setting.

- Expand the knowledge base of the student through challenging assignments. While it is expected that the student intern will be asked to perform some routine duties, this cannot be the primary function of the internship. The student pays regular academic fees for hours of academic credit earned during an internship. The amount of knowledge gleaned from the internship is expected to approximate that provided in a classroom setting. This becomes a value judgment as experiential learning is compared to classroom learning, but it is a critical factor in evaluating an internship.
- Expose the student to the wealth of actual behaviors, situations, and incidents that occur in an organizational setting and cannot be taught in the classroom. Often this is part of the socialization process that occurs when an individual joins an organization, even if only on a part-time basis.
- Provide a valuable interface between the sponsoring organization and the University. Students selected to participate in internship programs become representatives of the student body to the community just as the faculty members, acting as internship academic advisors, represent the faculty and administration of the University. This responsibility can be one of the most valuable assets to the program. It provides the community with a firsthand evaluation of the fine quality students and faculty at Jacksonville University.
- **Credit Awarded** - No more than 12 hours of academic credit can be earned through the internship program and applied toward the fulfillment of the 120 credit hours required for a degree. Internship courses will carry the suffix number of 90; i.e., 390, 490. [Internships may be designated as "0" credit hours. Zero credit internships will not count towards fulfillment of the Experiential Learning requirement. Faculty supervising the zero credit internship must still submit a grade upon its completion, although Pass/Fail is an option.]
- **Academic Standards** - A student applying for an internship must:
 - Have junior or senior standing or departmental approval
 - Have a faculty sponsor with expertise in the field of the internship
 - Secure the agreement of a sponsoring agency or employer
 - Have the permission of the division chair and the college dean

Any student on probation or suspension is not eligible for an internship. Divisions may set higher academic qualifications for participation in internships under their supervision.

International Internships

Jacksonville University and its approved partners offer International Internships. International Internships may be taken by a matriculated college student in Good Academic Standing, who has permission from their home college/university to receive credit for the internship. Students must complete the International Internship packet prior to acceptance into the program.

Other forms of Engaged Learning

Independent Study

Independent study is available to junior or senior students in good academic standing and to Graduate students. All fields are open to this academic alternative. A variety of designs are encouraged: travel study, semiprofessional work, or research experience. The title and description of the design and content must be submitted to the supervising instructor, the appropriate division chair, and the college dean at least one month prior to registration. If approved, the course will be assigned a title and departmental prefix, plus a course number from the series 199, 387, 388, 487, 488 and 591.

Independent study design may not duplicate any course listed in the Catalog, and credit may not be taken on a pass/fail basis. A student may enroll for a maximum of six credit hours of independent study each semester and is limited to a maximum of 12 credit hours for undergraduates and six credit hours for degree seeking Graduate students.

Service-Learning

JU recognizes the academic and civic benefits of merging service to the community with academic coursework. Structured Service-Learning courses include projects that are designed by faculty, to enhance students' learning, while also meeting the needs of a partnering organization. Service-Learning courses are found throughout many disciplines. Students who are dedicated to Service-Learning can also earn a nine-credit certificate in Service-Learning. For more information contact the Director of Service-Learning.

Undergraduate Research

JU recognizes the educational value of an undergraduate research experience. A two-course sequence in undergraduate research has been established. Eligible students may enroll in scheduled courses assigned the departmental prefix and the number 373 (Research Preparation) and 374 (Undergraduate Research) for at least two credit hours each. A second alternative for eligible students is to enroll in independent study for research projects under the direction of research professors who lead students through the designated steps in research design, execution, and analysis. These courses are designed to give the student experience, beginning with the conceptualization and design of a research project, through the literature search, data gathering and analysis, and writing the results in a format suitable for publication. Students should consult with a faculty mentor who specializes in the area of the endeavor and with the Director of Undergraduate Research.

Academic Calendar

Jacksonville University operates year-round on a semester system. Day and evening classes, scheduled during fall and spring semesters, are about 15 weeks in duration for the traditional term. There are also two 8-week terms each fall, spring, and summer. JU classes are also in session during the summer semester, which includes two 6-week terms, two 8-week terms, and one 12-week term. For the most up to date information, please visit www.ju.edu/registrar/calendar.

Final Examination Week

Any comprehensive final examination or other terminal examination, in the Traditional Term, shall be given at the time designated for the final examination in that class as posted on the Exam Schedule Webpage, found on the Registrar's Office Webpage. Alternative times may be arranged at the discretion of the instructor if a student has three or more examinations scheduled the same day.

Student Records

Under the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), also known as the Buckley Amendment, an eligible student or parent, where applicable, is guaranteed certain rights to access and review educational and other personally identifiable information on file with the University. An eligible student is defined as one who is/was enrolled in classes at Jacksonville University.

Specific rights guaranteed under the act are:

The right to inspect and review the educational records on file. This right may be exercised by presenting a request in writing to the custodian of the records. The records and the location of those on file at JU are as follows:

- The right to inspect any record of disclosures of personally identifiable information maintained by the University.
- The right to request an amendment to the educational record. If the request is denied, the right to request a hearing before an impartial panel designated by the University.
- The right to place a statement in the record.
- The right to file complaints concerning alleged failures by the University to comply with the requirements of the act.

Disclosure of Information to Parents

Students may grant their parents, guardians, spouses, and others access to view their student financial account records by completing the authorized user form through the Student Financial Services Office. Students may also release information by submitting the FERPA Release through Starfish.

On rare instances, JU may release information to parents without the student's consent when safety is a concern.

Student Directory Information

Jacksonville University publishes, in various forms, directory information such as a student's identification photograph, name, address, telephone number, JU e-mail address, date of birth, place of birth, whether enrolled part-time or full-time, class, major, dates of attendance, degrees conferred, awards received, educational institutions attended, participation in officially recognized activities or athletic teams and weights and heights of athletic team members. In addition, grades also are considered "directory information" with regard to determining honor rolls, Dean's lists, President's lists, and graduation honors, all of which may be published. Transcripts of students' academic records or student grade point averages may be released to the faculty advisor of officially recognized campus honor societies upon written request unless the student has filed an objection with the Registrar's Office. Only faculty members and appropriate administrators have access rights to student records.

Students who do not wish to have such information released must notify the Registrar's Office through Starfish or in writing to registrar@ju.edu.

JU's policy permits the release of information from a student's educational record without written consent to University faculty, staff, and administration who are responsible for working with such records in registration, counseling, teaching, financial aid, tuition and fee payment, internship and other activity directly related to their official responsibilities on a "need to know" basis.

As of January 3, 2012, the U.S. Department of Education's FERPA regulations expanded the circumstances under which education records and personally identifiable information (PII) contained in such records — including Social Security Number, grades, or other private information — may be accessed without consent. First, the U.S. Comptroller General, the U.S. Attorney General, the U.S. Secretary of Education, or state and local education authorities ("Federal and State Authorities") may allow access to records and PII without consent to any third party designated by a Federal or State Authority to evaluate a federal- or state-supported education program. The evaluation may relate to any program that is "principally engaged in the provision of education," such as early childhood education and job training, as well as any program that is administered by an education agency or institution. Second, Federal and State Authorities may allow access to education records and PII without consent to researchers performing certain types of studies, in certain cases even when we object to or do not request such research. Federal and State Authorities must obtain certain use-restriction and data security promises from the entities that they authorize to receive your PII, but the Authorities need not maintain direct control over such entities. In addition, in connection with Statewide Longitudinal Data Systems, State Authorities may collect, compile, permanently retain, and share without your consent PII from your education records, and they may track your participation in education and other programs by linking such PII to other personal information about you that they obtain from other Federal or State data sources, including workforce development, unemployment insurance, child welfare, juvenile justice, military service, and migrant student records systems.

Graduation Information

A student may complete the requirements for a degree at the end of any of the University's designated terms. One Commencement ceremony is held at the end of the spring semester. Degrees will be conferred and diplomas issued as follows:

- Students who have applied for graduation, have received preliminary verification by the Registrar, have been approved by the faculty, and expect to complete requirements at the end of the term may participate in the commencement ceremony.
- Students who graduated the previous terms will be invited to participate in the Spring Commencement Ceremony. Undergraduate students who will complete requirements during the summer terms, may participate in the Spring Commencement Ceremony if they are within 12 credits of completion with a 2.0 GPA. However, degrees will not be conferred and diplomas and honors will not be issued until all degree requirements are satisfied.
- As one of the requirements for graduation, all Jacksonville University students must complete an important survey regarding their immediate professional plans after graduation. The survey's main function is to capture employment and continued education information from graduating students. This information enables the University to publish employment and graduate school statistics, which are vital to state funding, publication rankings, and admissions recruiting. The survey - commonly referred to as the "First Destination Survey, The Outcomes Survey, or the Graduate Survey" - will be administered during the students' final semester at JU and is required to be completed before Commencement. For further information or other questions regarding this survey, please contact the Career Design and Exploration Office.

- Graduate students who will complete requirements during the summer terms, may participate in the Spring Commencement Ceremony if they are within nine credits of completion with a 3.0 GPA. However, degrees will not be conferred and diplomas will not be issued until all degree requirements are satisfied.
- Student transcripts will indicate that the degree was conferred as of the end of the term in which degree requirements were completed.
- Diplomas will be mailed to graduates within six to eight weeks following the end of the term. Each student is responsible for arranging schedules to satisfy degree requirements in anticipation of timely graduation. The University strongly recommends that each student outline his or her program in consultation with his or her academic advisor at the beginning of each academic year so that adjustments leading to timely graduation can be made, if required. A student's academic advisor is responsible for giving sound academic advice, but the student ultimately is responsible for ensuring that all degree requirements for the student's particular programs are fulfilled.

While efforts are made to ensure this Catalog's completeness and accuracy, University regulations and policies are not affected by typographical or other errors.

Determination of degree eligibility and commencement ceremony participation are governed by the following:

- Each student must make formal application to graduate in Self Service. It is recommended that prospective graduates should submit their graduation application one year in advance, but no later than:
 - **February 1st for students planning to graduate at the end of following Spring or Summer terms.**
 - **September 1st for students planning to graduate at the end of Fall terms.**
- Commencement information can be found on the Commencement Webpage.
- The commencement ceremony is an official University convocation designed to honor each graduate's academic achievement and to recognize the support of parents, spouses and loved ones. All prospective graduates are encouraged to participate in the commencement ceremony, but participation is not mandatory.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

Jacksonville University recognizes the achievements of its Undergraduate students through several awards and programs. Each program is listed on the left and includes the eligibility requirements.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

The Fred B. Noble Medal for Scholarship

In memory of the late Fred B. Noble, one of the founders and original Trustees of Jacksonville University who built a successful business career before returning here to earn his degree. Completing his bachelor's degree at age 84, and his Master of Arts in Teaching at the age of 91, the Fred B. Noble Gold Medal for Scholarship honors the students who have earned the highest grade point average in their graduating class.. The recipient must have earned at least 90 graded credits at Jacksonville University and have earned the highest GPA among their peers.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

Graduation Honors

An undergraduate student must earn a minimum of 60 credit hours of graded credit at Jacksonville University to be eligible for honors designation at commencement. A student who earns a 3.5 cumulative GPA is graduated Cum Laude (with honor); a 3.7 CGPA, Magna Cum Laude (with high honor); and a 3.9 CGPA, Summa Cum Laude (with highest honor).

Students, who complete a second undergraduate degree at Jacksonville University must complete a minimum of 60 graded credit hours toward the second degree to be considered for graduation honors.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

President's List

To qualify for the President's List, a student must earn at least 12 credit hours of "A" grades during a fall or spring reporting term, receive no grades lower than "A," and have no incomplete or missing grades on his or her transcript.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

Dean's List

To qualify for the Dean's List, a student must earn at least 12 credit hours during a fall or spring reporting term, attain or surpass a 3.5 GPA for the semester, and have no incomplete or missing grades on his or her transcript for the semester.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

Departmental Honors

Specific distinction in a student's major field is recognized at graduation through the conferring of departmental honors, such as Departmental Honors in Biology.

To qualify for departmental honors, the student must have a 3.5 GPA in his or her major field and complete a significant researched thesis or creative production as evidence of advanced attainment. Students seeking this distinction must present a project prospectus at least one semester before graduation to the college dean, the division chair, and a supervisory committee composed of three faculty members. This group will establish guidelines, supervise, and evaluate the finished work when it is presented in some public manner. The deadline for project completion must be included in the prospectus. To be included in the Commencement Program the completed and signed prospectus must be in the Registrar's Office by April 1st for the Spring Commencement Ceremony.

(NOTE - Exception for Communication Sciences and Disorders Departmental Honors: cumulative GPA of 3.4 and GPA in major of 3.75 required. See [course description](#) for CSD 397/398/497/498 for complete requirements.)

If the student's project is to receive academic credit, he or she should enroll at registration using the prefix of the major field and an appropriate number from the series 397, 398, 497, 498. A student may enroll for a maximum of six credit hours in independent study and/or honors project per semester.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

University Honors Program

The University Honors Program at Jacksonville University aims to challenge academically talented, highly motivated students to develop intellectual curiosity and rigor, independent reasoning and creativity, superior communication skills, leadership, and a system for ethical decision-making. The program enables students with strong academic records and a desire to excel in the pursuit of knowledge to join with select faculty to form a community within the University that supports outstanding scholarship, personal growth, and service. The curriculum exposes students to interdisciplinary experiences and encourages them to make connections among domains of knowledge; fosters leadership; guides students to assess and reflect on their beliefs and values; encourages students to identify and assess personal, academic, and professional goals; provides opportunities for individual research and creativity; and encourages participation in cross-cultural and international experiences.

Entering students may register for honors courses if they have attained at least a 3.8 weighted high school GPA a combined SAT score of 1290 or better (evidence based reading & mathematics), or ACT score of 27 or better. Returning and transfer students may register for honors courses if they have earned a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher. Qualified students may take as few or as many honors courses as they wish.

Fulfillment of the requirements for the University Honors Program entitles participants to graduate with University Honors at commencement. Requirements include:

- Filing an official acceptance of the invitation to join the Honors Program with the director of the Honors Program. Students then are designated University Honors Fellows. Students, who remain in good standing in the Honors Program, as determined by the director, are eligible for priority registration.
- Successful completion of at least 25 credit hours in honors courses, including a one credit hour colloquium and at least one honors seminar.
- Attainment of a 3.5 cumulative GPA and a 3.5 GPA in honors course work at the time of commencement.
- Completion and presentation of a significant research project.
- Completion of at least one internship.
- Completion of a service learning opportunity offered as part of the Honors Colloquium.
- Enrollment in Honors courses each semester. (Two consecutive semesters of enrollment in no Honors courses results in the student being designated “not in good standing” in the Honors Program.)

Students transferring to JU may transfer honors credits received from accredited community colleges and four-year colleges and universities into JU’s Honors Program. However, to graduate with University Honors, a transferring student must complete a minimum of 13 credit hours in honors courses at JU, including the honors colloquium and an honors seminar, and a total of 60 hours of graded credit at JU.

Students may earn in various ways the honors credits necessary to graduate with University Honors:

- **Students entering with Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate exam scores**, which exceed the requirement for AP or IB credit at the University, may apply those credits toward the minimum of 25 honors credits needed to graduate with University Honors.
- **Honors Colloquium** – A required three-credit honors orientation course for first-year honors students focusing on educational planning, values exploration, and personal development.
- **Honors sections** of courses carrying zero to eight credit hours each.
- **Interdisciplinary honors seminars** – Honors seminars carrying two to five credit hours each, the topics of which are specified in the Schedule of Classes. Topics vary by semester.
- **Add-on one honors credit** – One hour of honors credit in addition to regular course credit. Students participate in extra projects or research in a particular course under the supervision of the instructor. Approval of the director of the Honors Program is required.
- **Departmental Honors courses** – At the upper levels, Honors Program students are expected to propose and conduct research or creative projects within their major fields carrying two to six credit hours of independent study per semester. Students seeking University Honors credit should apply for departmental honors as specified (see Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors in this section) and simultaneously submit their prospectus to the Director of the Honors Program. Upon approval of the completed departmental honors projects or creative productions for honors credit by the students’ departmental supervisory committees, students in the Honors Program will be awarded both departmental and University Honors credit. Students are required to present findings in a public forum such as the Undergraduate Research Symposium, scheduled each year in the spring.
- **Undergraduate Research**— Honors Program students are expected to propose and conduct research or creative projects within their fields of choice. The course work involved may include independent study carrying two to six credit hours per semester. This is closely related to the Departmental Honors courses discussed above but need not necessarily be related to academic major or to pursuit of Departmental Honors designation. The proposal and project must be approved by the director of the Honors Program as well as by the faculty mentor who will oversee the project.
- **Internship** – On rare occasion, when certain criteria are met, an internship may carry honors credit.
- **Education Abroad** – Coursework carries honors designation only as determined by the Director of University Honors.

Academic Awards and Scholastic Honors

University Scholars Program

The University Scholars Program is designed to afford students networking and leadership development training to enhance their experience at Jacksonville University and their success after university. These students will have opportunities to interact and network with leaders in the business, political, educational, community service, and non-profit areas of Jacksonville and beyond as well as with key administrators, staff, and faculty at Jacksonville University. A four-year program, University Scholars will maintain records of their professional contacts and practice their training in using effective networking skills. Incoming students can apply through Admissions to become part of the University Scholars program by indicating interest to their Admissions counselors. Current students may apply to be part of University Scholars through the director of the program.

- **National Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi's Jacksonville Chapter** - rewards scholastic excellence by electing student members from all recognized branches of academic endeavor.
- **University Award for Outstanding Service and Co-curricular Involvement** - given annually at commencement to a member of the senior class whose service contributions to the University and participation in co-curricular activities have been of the highest order.

Orthodontics Department

The Brooks Rehabilitation College of Healthcare Sciences, School of Orthodontics offers an advanced specialty education program in orthodontics and dentofacial orthopedics in a 24-month program that combines didactic, clinical, and research components, leading to a Certificate in Orthodontics and a Master of Science in Dentistry (MSD). Students undertake an intensive, continuous, full-time course of study as well as supervised clinical training by expert orthodontic faculty in various contemporary orthodontic techniques. The course of study begins with orientation in July with course work and clinic starting in mid-August of each year. By the end of the first year it is expected that each student initiates comprehensive orthodontic treatment for at least fifty (50) patients after completion of a pre-clinical training course. Students are introduced to a variety of treatment philosophies, with an emphasis on pre-adjusted appliances and related techniques. Supervising clinical faculty present their philosophies in daily diagnosis and treatment planning seminars. A variety of clinical techniques are demonstrated and utilized in the school's state-of-the-art orthodontic clinical facility.

The field of accounting is often divided into two parts: financial and managerial. Financial accounting is concerned with reporting the results of the operations and financial position of a business firm to those both inside and outside of the management of the firm, including stockholders. Managerial accounting deals with the techniques, controls, systems, and reports used internally by the managers of an organization. The accounting curriculum at Jacksonville University is designed to provide a foundation for entry into either the financial or managerial areas of accounting. A license as a CPA for the financial accountant, a CMA for the managerial accountant, or a CIA for the internal auditor are the frequent goals of an accounting student. In addition to these professional opportunities, accounting students become excellent candidates for management positions in such areas as banking, investment houses, and brokerage firms. Many of the major accounting firms are heavily involved in management consulting.

FAA Air Traffic CTI Program

Jacksonville University offers a program for those who wish to become air traffic controllers under the Air Traffic Collegiate Training Initiative (AT-CTI). JU is one of the few schools in the nation selected by the FAA to participate in the CTI program.

The program allows qualified graduates to be hired by the FAA as air traffic controllers. To be eligible for hiring by the FAA through the CTI Program, students must:

- Hold U.S. citizenship
- Complete a four year degree in aviation management and flight operations (AVO) or aviation management (AVM)
- Meet CTI course requirements (see below)
- Be recommended by the university to the FAA
- Successfully complete (with a minimum grade of 70%) the Air Traffic Selection and Training (AT-SAT) Test administered by the FAA
- Be less than 31 years of age at time of hiring by the FAA
- Pass an FAA physical examination (including hearing and vision tests and drug screening)
- Pass an FAA background security examination

The CTI program is open to both AVO and AVM students. However, to receive CTI endorsement, all students must take AVM 405 (Advanced Air Traffic Control) and obtain a grade of "C" or better in this class. In addition, AVO students must complete AVM 403 (Basic Air Traffic Control), and all required aviation science

(AVS) and flight courses (AVO) with a “C” grade or better. AVM students who wish to participate in the CTI program must select the Air Traffic Control track, and complete AVS 101 and AVM 403 as well as all track-specific courses (AVS 102, AVM 306, AVM 405) with a “C” grade or better.

The program is designed to be a broad-based introduction to aviation and is not specifically a job preparation program for FAA Air Traffic Controllers. While participation allows qualified graduates to be hired by the FAA as air traffic controllers, it does not guarantee that students will be selected by the FAA.

Transfer of Credit - Transfer of Credit will not be allowed in the graduate curriculum.

Thesis Requirement - The thesis project is research comprised of two components: the submission of choreographic research/practice and a supportive exegesis. During the Summer II intensive, the student will submit a 3-4-page proposal for the research project to be approved by the Review Panel which is comprised of the Department of Dance faculty. The research process aims to engage students in a sustained enterprise, providing the opportunity to build on and develop skills and knowledge gained in the program.

The work in Term 5 in DANC550 Research-Based Project/Thesis focuses on the process of practice-as-research. During Term 5 Students will build committees to support their research, committees will include 3-4 individuals that the course professor must approve. The research within the DANC550 Research-Based Project/Thesis is intended to be a substantial research process that reflects the depth of study, in which students are expected to operate autonomously supported by a supervisor (course professor). The focus of DANC 551 Advanced Practicum in Term 6 is on the final research, final presentation of practice, collation of the documentation, and submission of final exegesis. The outcome(s) of the process constitute the work in the DANC551 Advanced Practicum. The final form of the research project submission will depend on the student's focus, but it must include two components, the submission of choreographic research/practice and a supportive exegesis. Upon final submission of the research project, the Review Panel may elect to have the MFA candidate complete an oral defense of the thesis. If the student's research project is not submitted in Term 6 the student must enroll in DANC 560 each subsequent semester until the completion of the research project. Faculty will periodically review individual student progress in meeting course goals and completing the research project.

Choreographic Research/Practice - The choreographic research/practice will include elements shown within a public context (for example: theatre performance, lecture-demonstration, video project screened in a public setting, installation). Normally a theatre presentation event is of 20-30 minutes duration; a lecture/

demonstration is approximately 30 minutes. Other forms such as video-dance, electronic events, and installations will depend on the specific parameters of the research and must be approved as part of the research proposal.

Exegesis - The practical elements will be supported by an exegesis elucidating the interconnections between concepts and practice throughout the process into performance and in performance, as well as, serving as an archive of the project overall. The Exegesis, not including the bibliography, will be a substantial document of approximately 60-100 pages.

Upon final submission of the research project, the Review Panel may elect to have the MFA candidate complete an oral defense of the thesis. If the student's research project is not submitted in Term 6 the student must enroll in DANC 560 each subsequent semester until the completion of the research project. Faculty will periodically review individual student progress in meeting course goals and completing the research project.

Choreographic Research/Practice - The choreographic research/practice will include elements shown within a public context (for example: theatre performance, lecture-demonstration, video project screened in a public setting, installation). Normally a theatre presentation event is of 20-30 minutes duration; a lecture/demonstration approximately 30 minutes. Other forms such as video-dance, electronic events and installations will depend on the specific parameters of the research and must be approved as part of the research proposal.

Exegesis - The practical elements will be supported by an exegesis elucidating the interconnections between concepts and practice throughout the process into performance and in performance, as well as, serving as an archive of the project overall. The Exegesis, not including the bibliography, will be a substantial document of approximately 60-100 pages.

Academic Standards

A graduate student will be placed on Academic Probation at the conclusion of any semester in which the student's cumulative GPA is less than a 3.0 (B). The student has the following one semester (or two courses) to raise the cumulative GPA to a 3.0. A graduate student will be dismissed from the program if the student does not raise the cumulative GPA to a 3.0 within one semester (or two courses) of being placed on Academic Probation. A graduate student placed on Academic Probation more than one time during the program will be dismissed from the program. A graduate student earning one grade of "F" in any graduate course will be dismissed from the program.

As such, an English major is excellent preparation for the graduate study of literature and communication, for medical school, law school, and secondary education. It opens the way to many positions in government, NGOs, and private industry, including editing and technical writing. The English BA is an excellent choice as a double major with other degrees at JU and increases students marketability in advertising, public relations, communication, sales, marketing, personnel management, systems engineering and programming. Within the major, in order to provide a firm foundation for more advanced study later, students take four broad-range survey courses, preferably early in the program. The JU Public Policy Institute (JU PPI), in cooperation with the Davis College of Business & Technology, offers an MPP- MBA dual degree program. In this program, students receive both an MPP degree and MBA degree in a year less than if the degrees were pursued separately. The JU MPP-MBA dual degree program is a three-year program. The total coursework consists of 63 credit hours. Public policy coursework constitutes 36 credit hours, including an internship (three credit hours) and Capstone policy project (six credits). The MPP internship requirement must be met prior to the third year of the Dual-Degree program and can be met through: an MPP internship, qualifying clerkship, professional experience, or, on written request (and upon written approval by the JU PPI Director), substitution of an approved PPOL elective. MBA coursework consists of 27 credit hours (not including Foundations courses), to be completed as prescribed by the Davis College. The MPP program will transfer twelve credits of MBA coursework for a total of 48 credit hours. The MBA program will transfer twelve credits from the MPP program, for a total of 39 credit hours.

MSMS is a rigorous, broad-based program where students train to improve their academic credentials and achieve admission to graduate programs in health sciences, often improving MCAT scores along the way.

Students can choose one of our two program delivery methods, both of which offer the same courses and degree. The full-time, in-person track is a one-year program that mirrors the first year of the LCME-accredited medical school curriculum. The part-time, online track features the same courses and can be completed in 20 months.

The program is designed to be completed in two to three years for full-time graduate students with 30 credit hours required within all 3 degree programs which includes a core four-course sequence. For the MS in MSC degree students must complete a successful thesis project based on original research with a public defense and approved by a thesis committee. 2. Students must receive a grade of “B” or better in each of the graduate level courses that are being applied to both degrees. Any graduate course in which a student receives a passing grade of “B-” or lower may be used to satisfy the BS degree, but not the MA degree. In this case, the student will have fewer than nine hours shared between degrees and will be required to take additional graduate courses as needed once he/she is pursuing the MA degree full-time.
3. No more than nine hours of graduate work (500-600 level) may be counted towards the bachelor’s degree and these can only be taken during the senior year (minimum of 90 earned credits). Nine hours of graduate coursework may be shared between the BS and MA degrees. Of these, six hours will be mandatory with two courses chosen from the four core graduate classes: MSC 501, MSC 502, MSC 503 or MSC 504 depending on course rotation, and three hours will be chosen from MSC 500- or 600-level electives.

Notes:

- a. Students must have completed MSC 310WR prior to taking MSC 501 and it may be necessary for students to enroll in summer sessions to complete both degrees within the five year period.
 - b. Students who take: 1.) MSC 502 would not need to take MSC 340, 2.) MSC 503 would not need to take MSC 306, or 3.) MSC 504 would not need to take MSC 308.
4. A student may at any time withdraw from the approved ABM program by informing the undergraduate and graduate advisor(s) in writing. For a student who withdraws from the ABM program prior to completing their BS degree, a student can petition the Department of Biology and Marine Science to apply any completed graduate credits towards their undergraduate degree. If a student elects to be re-admitted to the graduate program after completing their bachelor degree, the student would need to re-apply to the graduate program. Graduate courses that had been applied to their undergraduate degree cannot be applied for graduate credit.

The Fellowship is geared towards broadening and enhancing a Fellows background thus helping to prepare them for matriculation into an ADA accredited residency program in orthodontics upon successful completion of the program. Fellows participate in a diverse didactic and clinical orthodontic experience. Course work includes but is not limited to orthodontic record-taking, record-keeping, data basing, orthodontic diagnosis and treatment planning, and exposure to various clinical orthodontic theoretical, diagnostic, and therapeutic treatment philosophies and regimens. Fellows not only shadow current JU orthodontic residents in the clinic and assist them in a variety of chair-side experiences; they will be expected to treat approximately 30-35 of their own patients. The research component requires the Fellows to participate in collecting clinical research data, assist in preparing and expanding our clinical research database, and helping to develop teaching modules for orthodontic continuing education. Throughout the Fellowship, participants will gain experience with orthodontic practice management software, orthodontic diagnostic and case presentation software, imaging software, cone-beam computed tomography, digital photography and radiography, as well as exposure to a variety of orthodontic appliances and techniques including using soft tissue lasers and temporary anchorage devices in orthodontic practice. This one-year, non-accredited continuing education program in orthodontic clinical research is designed for the candidate who needs to augment his/her dental education. The program combines didactic orthodontic education, clinical training and intensive exposure to clinical orthodontic research.

The Master of Science degree in Respiratory Care requires a minimum of 90 semester hours of credit for graduation. This is an integrated program, requiring 29 semester hours of program pre-professional prerequisite requirements prior to admission to Jacksonville University for the professional phase (24 months). The pre-professional phase requirements may be completed at any accredited college or university and include the successful completion of a baccalaureate degree. Dedicated to clinical and academic excellence, the professional phase includes over 1000 hours of clinical practice. As a leadership program in respiratory care, this course of study aspires to provide graduates with the foundation needed to assume professional leadership roles in clinical practice, clinical specialty areas, research, education, and management. Upon completion of the program, graduates are eligible for the national board examinations in respiratory care as well as state licensure. Rush University has granted licensing to the curriculum and course content so the Master of Science degree in Respiratory Care can be offered through Jacksonville University. The MOU stands for seven years with Rush University receiving 30% of net revenue from the program prior to it transitioning to Jacksonville University entirely with CoARC accreditation at the conclusion of the agreement. All courses will be vetted through the Jacksonville University curriculum committee and would become part of the Jacksonville University catalog. Jacksonville University will hire two non tenure track faculty (Registered Respiratory Therapists): a program director and a director of clinical education. They will be responsible for program leadership, providing laboratory instruction, coordinating clinical experiences, and supervising and leading discussions in didactic courses (online lectures provided by Rush faculty). A limited number of practitioners will be hired as adjuncts for specific courses due to skill demands. All courses and assessments have been built and provided by Rush University as a baseline for Jacksonville University affiliated faculty to build from. All didactic coursework and clinicals will occur in a face-to-face environment.

The philosophy that guided the development of this course is twofold. First, academic research involves a process of activities rather than the application of isolated, unrelated concepts and ideas. Candidates in this course learn about how to conduct a review of current literature and scholarly work in topics they are interested in pursuing. Working closely with faculty, students learn strategies to get to problems worth researching (scope). The central premise of the course is training scholars to ask the right questions. Business research usually includes a hypothesis or question, hypothesis testing, data collection or field work, analysis, and recommendations or conclusions. Participants learn the sequence and flow of research activities and its central role in scholarly inquiry. Second, the business scholar today requires a large toolbox or applications to gather evidence and analyze information. No longer can we, as business scholars, rely solely on surveys or secondary data to make recommendations. Business researchers, whether conducting research or reading research to self- inform, need to identify the key quantitative and qualitative drivers to business; in order to decide what analysis is appropriate. Scoping the problem is the first step to making evidence-based decisions. A fundamental review of the most widely utilized research models and customer relationship management tools will enable business decision makers with a deeper understanding of how the results of data inquiries impact business results today.
